AT THE NATIONAL CORVET IE MUSEUM APRIL 27 -29, 2023



Last month, I showed you some of my more recent purchases of 1/18th scale C8 Corvettes from various manufacturers. I also tossed in a 1/12th scale C7 ZR1 and a '72 Chevy Blazer that comes close to replicating Jody Tiernan's 1:1.

This month, I thought I'd share some of my 1/24th scale Corvette models – all from **The Danbury Mint** and **The Franklin Mint**. Both Mints stopped producing 1/24th scale models years ago, so what I have in my collection is all I'll ever get from the Mints, unless I want to go out on the secondary market. I've been known to do that....a lot. Too much.

So, on the following pages are thirteen 1/24th scale diecast cars I pulled from my collection of Corvettes. My total Corvette collection (in 1/24th scale) numbers about 100 cars. All of them through the C6 platform are from either The Franklin Mint or the Danbury Mint. I do have a dozen C7 and C8 Corvette models in 1/24th scale, but those are not "Mint" quality models. They all look good parked together, but you can see the difference if you look close enough.

Instead of choosing standard models, I picked ones that were either specialty in nature or slightly off the wall.

First up, it's the 1978 Pace Car for the Indianapolis 500. Always one of my favorite pace cars and executed very well by The Franklin Mint.

Next is the Corvette Nomad station wagon. While it never went into production, it was a pretty neat concept from Chevrolet engineering.

Next is the Limited Edition Stars and Stripes C3 produced by The Franklin Mint. They made about 3,500 of these which was a relatively low number for Franklin Mint.



To the right is a wild concept of a '63 Split Window Pro Mod. Complete with a blown 502 V8, tubbed rear axle with fat tires, wheelie bar, roll cage and vertical-gate shifter. Even has that huge aluminum wing for down force. This one is from The Danbury Mint.

Next is a rockin' '61 Corvette Gasser. Small block V8 with velocity stacks. Magnesium wheels front and back. That old gasser stance. Removable top. Lots of photo-etched parts. Has a parachute out back to help in stopping. This one was also done by Danbury

Here's a '55 Salt Flat racer done by Danbury Mint. Full wheel covers. A big-block V8 up front. There's a parachute out back. The trunk has a small fuel cell, battery box and nitrous bottle. The license plate out back reads **230MPH**.

This is Roger Penske's '66 Corvette Racer. The car was released to Penske by GM as a C.O.P.O. Corvette, built with the first factory 427 L-88 engine and competition race package that included J-56 brakes, a 36 gallon fuel cell, F-41 suspension and that venerable M-22 "rock crusher" transmission. It won Daytona and Sebring consecutively and also won the NCRS American Heritage Award.

Here's the famous '59 Purple People Eater MK III Corvette. One of most renowned race cars in history, it was powered by a fuel injected 283 V8. In 1959, it secured the SCCA National Championship in the B/Production Class. This 1/24th scale diecast was produced by The Danbury Mint.



This is a 2006 C6 Corvette Police unit as imagined by The Franklin Mint. They did several different Police car versions that also includes a '90 Porsche (I have that one, too). The hood opens to reveal the LS7 V8 engine. It is a limited edition. At the time, I thought it would be neat to have a Corvette Police car in my collection.

This is a very special car. You all know Corvettes of Carlisle, that huge event held in Pennsylvania each summer since 1974. C of C was co-founded by a guy named Chip Miller. He was an avid Corvette guy through and through. Chip passed away back in 2004 of amyloidosis. One of his favorite Corvettes was this 1957 Aztec Copper Corvette convertible. The model was produced by Danbury Mint. Chip was inducted into the National Corvette Museum Hall of Fame in 2005.

That's a '67 Corvette L89 with the 427 cu.in. V8. It comes with side pipes, removable hard top, retractable headlights and a black hood stinger. Truly one of the best looking Corvettes out there.

You can say the same thing about this '68 convertible. Something about a dark green Corvette with that Camel top and Ralleye wheels. This one has the L89 427, too. Produced by The Danbury Mint.

The car that started it all. Ill-fitting body panels, that famous Blue Flame 6-banger with minimal horsepower and super thin tires. I mean, you have to wonder how Corvette survived those first several years (GM wanted to chop it from their line many times over the years). And now, today, it is a worldclass sports car. It has come a long way these past 70 years. The model, done by The Danbury Mint, was very well done (panel fit is much better than the real car).



Here are two "extra credit" cars from my '1/24th collection that I thought I'd toss in. First up is a 1997 Plymouth Prowler made by Danbury Mint. This was the first year for the Prowler, a concept-to-production car that actually came from a design thesis by no other than Chip Foose. It was produced from 1997 to 2002. I loved the car when it first came out, and was actually talking to a seller back in 2015 that had one for sale in the Dallas area. Unfortunately, he sold it before I could move on it, and the rest is, as they say, history.

The last car to show you is this 1934 Duesenberg J Walker Coupe. In 1934, the car cost \$25,000. It was built for Lilly Pharmaceutical president Josiah Lilly. It was the only Duesenberg ever built with an aerodynamic body.

The actual car weighs over 6,000 lbs (the chassis alone weighs 4,400 lbs). It is powered by an in-line-8, 420 cu.in. engine that makes 265 HP.



The 1/24th model in my collection is rare. I belong to the Diecast Car Collectors Club (since 1996). For about 15 years, the Club (shortened to D4C) issued a limited edition Club car to members. This Walker Coupe was the very last Club car issued in 2018. The total number of diecast coupes produced was less than 250. When the car came out, one of the officers from the D4C went to Jay Leno's garage and presented him with the first one. Jay, by the way, is the current owner of the Walker Coupe. Pretty cool.

So, that's it for this edition of **Diecast Update**. Hope you enjoyed seeing a small sample of my 500+ vehicle collection. If things get slow, I may go ahead and do a 3rd edition from my collection – maybe the big stuff.

 So, you want a Z06?. Fat chance! GM just announced the next dealer allocation for Z06. Zippo. Nada. No Z06 production. The next (and last) dealer allocation announcement is March 30th. It is unknown whether Z06 will be on it. Unless Dealer Stock Orders slated to be announced on April 5th contain Z06, that's the end of Z06 production for 2023. With GM previously announcing a hard order stop for Z06 on April 5th, we may have seen the last Z06's for 2023.

If they do announce dealer stock orders for Z06, you know the price will be astronomical (markups). You lose. Dealer (maybe) wins. Pathetic.









While perusing through the Ken Yost collection of Corvette News, I came across a piece in the Feb/Mar 1979 issue that was done on **GM's Milford Proving Grounds**. Established by GM back in 1924, it was the industry's first dedicated automobile testing facility.

Prior to the Milford site, most domestic car manufacturers just drove their cars in and around normal roads up in Flint. While this worked most of the time, there were incidences where accidents would happen involving the unsuspecting motoring public. Basically, you had automotive engineers testing vehicles to establish long-term durability while zig-zagging around people just out driving their cars. I mean, what could go wrong?



When the facility opened in 1924 -

- It covered 1,150 total acres
- Contained almost 7 miles of test roads
- Employed 50 people

In 1979, the facility was expanded and included -

- 4,009 acres
- 123 miles of test track
- 23 acres of office, labs and garage space
- Employed 2,500 people

By this time, the facility could perform just about any type of vehicle testing, which included the Barrier Building that allowed engineers to do year-round testing inside.

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Today, Milford is a world-class facility -

- Still over 4,000 acres
- 142 buildings
- 132 miles of test track
- Now, Milford employs 4,800 people

There's a saying at Milford that goes **each mile driven on the grounds is the same as 5 miles (8.0 km) in the real world**.

As you could imagine, a lot of testing can take place when you've got 4,000 acres to play with. Here are the highlights of Milford and some of the different tracks that can be used for testing.

The VDTA. This is the Vehicle Dynamics Test Area, also known as "Black Lake", that is a 67 acre (270,000 m²) pad of blacktop for vehicle dynamics testing. Waterfoul have been known to try to land on this "lake" of asphalt. At the ends of the VDTA are two semicircle tracks used for accelerating vehicles up to high speed before entering the pad. A controlled low-friction area made of ceramic tiles is on one side of the pad. Another area is coated with the asphalt sealant **Jennite** and can be watered down to produce a low friction surface.

The Oval Track. The oval track is a 3.8 mile circuit.

The Circle Track. The circle track encloses the VDTA and is a 4.5 mile (7.2 km) banked circle. It has five lanes posted with speed limits increasing towards the outermost lane. The speed limit for the outermost lane is 100+ mph (192 km/h). Due to the banking, each lane can be driven at its posted speed limit all the way around the circle without needing to touch the steering wheel, given proper wheel alignment and tire pressures. The track surface is extremely had "dolomite" concrete for wear resistance.

North/South Straightaway. This is 6.225 mile (10.018 km) in total length and includes 2.5 miles (4.0 km) straightaways.

East/West Straightaway. This is 3.1 miles (5.0 km) around and includes two 1.2 mile (1.9 km) straightaways.

The Seven Sisters. This is a short course featuring seven tight curves, some level, some banked. It is one lane that can be driven in both directions, so only one car is allowed on the course at a time. This is used for testing vehicles under transient lateral acceleration loads.


12 Mile Road. I laughed out loud when I saw this. 12 mile road is a straight section of pavement which duplicates the historical surface texture of a section of 12 Mile Road in Detroit. I spent many an hour driving 12 Mile Road over the years. I can understand why GM would want to duplicate it.

Ride and Handling Loop. This Loop is enclosed by the Circle Track and has varied surfaces and turns.

Vehicle Safety and Crashworthiness Lab. As the name implies, this lab includes all types of testing that proves out the crashworthiness of a vehicle. This also includes a rollover test facility.

On the following page is a map (from the 1979 feature article) that shows the 4,000 acre complex and all of the different roads, tracks, straightaways and surfaces. Towards the top of the map is what looks like a huge bottle opener. That's the 67 acre asphalt "lake" where GM does vehicle dynamics testing. Man, that's a lot of asphalt! If your monitor is big enough, you can expand the map out and you can read much more of the details of each area.

Now, you know more than you probably wanted to know about The Milford Proving Grounds. -

Below, this was the very first time that Joe sat in his car. It was right after it had come off the transporter on Thursday.




