

 Color pallet for the 2025 Corvette to be reduced. Chevrolet announced that a total of seven colors available in 2024 will be replaced or eliminated for the 2025 model year.

The 2 colors that are being replaced are:

- Accelerate Yellow will be replaced by Competition Yellow.
- Amplify Orange will be replaced by Sebring Orange.
- The third new color for 2025 is Hysteria (purplish blue). It does look nice for sure, but it really needs to be more purple than blue.
- The five colors being dropped for 2025 are: Silver Flare, Hypersonic Gray, Cacti, Carbon Flash Metallic and Ceramic Matrix Gray.

The surprise dropped colors for 2025 are Silver Flare and Hypersonic Gray. No surprise that Cacti and Carbon Flash were dropped. The Ceramic Matrix Gray has been around since 2017 or 2018, so it had pretty much run its course.

The company is Decal Concepts and they produce all kinds of decals for Corvettes no matter the year or version. Easy to find








RANSDELL'S EXHAUST INSTALL

Dave Ransdell decided to replace his factory exhaust on his '18 Grand Sport convertible with a new Billy Boat exhaust system. It takes more than one pair of hands, so Dave invited a few of us over to give him a hand to make the switch. Enjoy the pics.

The first thing you have to do is remove the lower valance on the rear fascia. Lots of screws and bolts that have to be removed. However, once that's done, you can relatively easily remove the exhaust (from the cat back).





At this point, you then slip in both the new right-hand side and left-hand side exhaust. It takes some man-handling to get the exhaust pipes on the new exhaust to slip into the factory exhaust pipe. Time consuming to say the least – even a little frustrating.








From start to (almost) finish, we spent the better part of about 3 ½ hours on the install. We did break for lunch for about 45 minutes. There was also some joke telling, cleaning time, wrench throwing, etc.





HAGGERTY DRIVER'S CLUB ASKS LENO: STEAM OR TESLA – WHAT WOULD **YOU** CHOOSE?

More to the point, the question posed to Leno was "if you were able to somehow timetravel a hundred years into the future and you needed to drive someplace, and all you could find was a 1907 White steam car and a Tesla, which would you choose?

As intriguing as the question was, Leno was quick to answer. "I know that I would take the White because I would have it running way before the Tesla. A steam car is made out of simple mechanical stuff like pipes and valves and it can burn almost anything, while the Tesla – like all modern cars – has miles of wiring connecting the black boxes that make the car go. And though mechanical things may break, electrical stuff degrades, which is an important difference."




A relay may look brand new on the outside, while on the inside, it's dead. But, if you break the drive to the fuel pump on your old car or the pump diaphragm is torn or whatever, you can look at it and say "Oh, I see, it's not pumping, and this is the problem."

He also brought up an important point about modern cars. The "drive cycle". I learned about it because the original battery in my 2005 Ford GT finally started going down. So, like any other car in the garage, I threw in a new battery. Boink! A trouble light came on, and I said to myself "What did I do – I didn't do anything crazy here. I just installed a new battery in it!"

He hopped on the phone to Ford and someone told him that he had to drive the car to clear the light. So, he drives it for a couple of days and the light stays on. When he calls Ford back, they say "No. You gotta drive it some more – up to 200 miles". He ran three tanks of gas through it. Still, the light is on.

Seems that every modern car has a drive cycle, or a programmed set of parameters that the computer is looking for in order to reset itself. So after speaking to an actual Ford engineer, he told him that he'd have to follow the instructions EXACTLY – don't deviate at all. The instructions were something like this: Start the car with the air conditioner on. The turn the air conditioner. Drive the car exactly 3 miles. Turn left. The go 2 miles. Turn right. Hold the speed at 55 mph for three minutes. The light went out.

If you own a Tesla, you only find out that the car has certain features until after you've owned it awhile because there is no book to tell you this stuff. He bemoans having to "talk" to his Tesla to perform certain tasks, or finding

Gary, Joe, Cindy and I headed down to Bowling Green to participate in the 2024 Michelin Bash at the National Corvette Museum. It was difficult to catch all of the presentations that were given by various Chevrolet personnel and others.

I did attend the Ambassador's Meeting on Saturday morning. Several topics were discussed, so here are a few updates.

MEMBERSHIP

Current members of the National Corvette Museum should have received a digital copy of your Membership card. You can save it to your phone and when you visit the Museum you simply pull up your electronic card and show it to them.

If you do not have your digital copy of your card, simply go to the NCM website (www.corvettemuseum.org), click on membership and follow the instructions on how to download your digital card.



Now, some people just don't like the electronic card and prefer to have an actual hard copy of their card. No problem. To receive a hard copy membership card, just call (270) 781-7973. You'll be put in touch with someone that can take your information and send out your card.

If you are not a member, you should consider joining the Museum. There are several levels that you can sign up for: Individual Membership, Family Membership, Senior Individual Membership, Next Generation Membership, Lifetime Membership and Lifetime Legacy Membership.

MUSEUM R8C DELIVERY UPDATE

As you are all aware, the ultimate delivery of your new Corvette is Museum Delivery (mark R8C delivery on your order). Once your Corvette is built, you will be contacted concerning your delivery date. When you arrive to pick up your car, you will spend several hours with a delivery expert that will get you signed in, give you a tour of the Museum and (when available) take you on a tour of the assembly plant. It is the ultimate experience. The current cost of the R8C delivery is \$1,495.



Now, if you have a small child or grandchild that is following in your Corvette footsteps, you can also include a Museum delivery of their very own C8 convertible! For \$995, you can purchase a miniature, battery powered C8 (I think there are only 3 color choices). They'll have their very own parking space on Corvette Blvd complete with the same owner information lectern with their name and delivery information. This is a new program at the Museum, so information will be forthcoming on how to set this special delivery up. Your kid or grandkid will love it!

TADGE JUECHTER PRESENTATION

Due to some scheduling conflicts, none of us were able to attend Tadge's final presentation as Executive Chief Engineer for Corvette. Tadge announced his resignation last month, and his final day will be sometime in July.

I was able to watch his presentation on YouTube, and it was typical Tadge all the way through. Also making presentations during this time were Harlan Charles, Corvette Marketing Mgr. and Josh Holder, Chief Engineer (and many people's bet that he will be the next Executive Chief Engineer for Corvette).



There were many points that were made during the presentations. I have captured some of the more important highlights below.

- **Ninety-three percent**. That is the percentage of current Corvette owners that would buy another Corvette down the road.
- **Production rate**. As of the end of April, the Corvette Assembly Plant is producing about 300 Z06's every week. In February, the plant produced more Corvettes than any month in history.
- Car and Driver. They have voted the 2024 Corvette as one of the 10 Best cars.

- Motor Trend Magazine. The recently named Corvette as the most iconic car in the last 75 years.
- Ownership. The mean age of Corvette owners right now is 54, which is down a bit. The percentage of owners under the age of 35 has climbed to 11%, which makes it the segment leader for two-seat sports cars.
- HTC Corvette. The hard top convertible is the #1 convertible in the USA.
- Colors. So far, for 2024 Corvette production, the top three colors are Black, Torch Red and White, with each color holding 13% of production
- For 2025. It was announced that, for 2025 Corvette production, there are three new colors. They are Sebring Orange, Competition Yellow and Hysteria (kinda purple). There is also a new interior color called Habanero Red. Also, the center pad on the steering wheel will be leather for all models going forward. The center pad houses the air bag.
- **30**th **Anniversary Raffle**. It was announced that there will be a special Corvette Raffle held during the 30th Anniversary event. The color has not yet been announced, but there seems to be a lot of excitement about the color combo and model. It should be announced shortly.
- NCM Hall of Fame. It has been announced that Tadge will be one of the inductees for the Hall of
 Fame during the Anniversary event at the end of August. The nomination committee wasted no
 time in making that announcement. It's a great honor for Tadge.

THE NEW PLANT MANAGER

Another great photo op we got was a picture with the new Plant Director of the Bowling Green Assembly plant. Raymond Theriault (pronounced ter-ee-oh) took over for retired Director Kai Spande mid-year 2023.

Ray was mulling around on Corvette Blvd like everyone else. As he approached our table, I called out his name and he diverted right over to our table.

Ray is a very personable guy. We talked for the better part of 5 minutes. He did say that his appointment as Director is the ultimate dream job for him. He's excited about Corvette and the future of the car.

And, as you can see from the picture, he's a pretty tall guy. He didn't look that tall when we were talking. L.O.L!



DINNER AT TONY'S

On the second night, Rick Ray had made reservations over at Tony's at the Embassy Suites. It is one of the more upscale restaurants in the Bowling Green area. In addition to Rick and his wife Prema, joining us was Sam and DeEtta Balser from northern Indiana, Tom and Starling Brooks from Greater Dayton Corvette, Joe and Gary. This was only the second long trip that we have taken in the C8. On the way down, I reset the trip odometer just to monitor my mileage. After 93 miles (which had us roughly down on I-71, we were getting 32.5 MPG. I forgot to take a picture when we arrived back in Englewood, but if memory serves me correctly, we averaged about 27.5 MPG for the entire trip. You can see that, at 70 MPH, we're running at about 1,500 RPM in V4 mode.
