 Corvette 2025 Model Year. It was recently announced that the start of production for 2025 Corvette will be on Monday, September 9th. The end of production for the 2024 model year will be Friday, September 6th.

The 2025 Order Guide was made available on June 10. You should be able to go on-line and configure a 2025 Corvette. Order placement for a 2025 won't begin for at least another 30 days. We should hear more very soon.



 GM names Juechter's successor. It was previously announced that Tadge Juechter, Executive Corvetter Chief Enginer, is retiring after 47 years at GM. Now, GM has named Tony Roma as the new Executive Chief Engineer for Corvette.

Tony currently serves at the Chief Engineer for the Cadillac CELESTIQ. In addition to Corvette, Tony has also been named Executive Chief Engineer for the newly formed Global Corvette and Performance Cars team. He officially assumes his new positions effective July 1st.



Also, Tony will assume leadership of the Luxury and Performance Car team currently led by Brandon Vivian who has been moved to the Advanced Vehicle Development Center as Executive Chief Engineer and Brand Strategy Coordinator.

During his 30 years at GM, Tony has spent time working on Corvettes and numerous Cadillacs including CTS, ATS and the Celestiq. His work on the V-Series and then Blackwing has distinguished Cadillac as a serious luxury performance contender.

Tony has a passion for cars. His current personal stable of cars includes a C4 ZR1, a C6 ZR1, a C8 Z06 and he hopes to acquire the C8 ZR1 when it is released. He also owns a CTS-V wagon.



HOW TO SAFELY DECONTAMINATE YOUR PAINT AND HELP BRING BACK THAT FACTORY SHINE

Not too long ago, I re-did a previous article that appeared in Flags on how to clay bar your Corvette (or any vehicle). Periodically, I'll head out to the garage and spend a few hours clay-barring my Corvette just to remove whatever contamination has accumulated on the paint since the last time I used a clay bar.

I've been approached recently about the process of how to use a clay bar effectively. While I am not a professional detailer, I've spent a considerable amount of time using a clay bar, doing paint correction with an orbital polisher and even applying ceramic coating. You probably couldn't match my results with that of a professional detailer, but my results have been pretty good in my eyes (which are now 70 years old and aren't what they used to be). Of course, neither are most of my other parts, but that's a conversation for another day.

So, let me touch on the basics of clay barring. As I state at the top, anyone can safely and effectively decontaminate their paint by using clay and a good lubricant (i.e. detail spray). Just follow the simple steps below, take your time and don't overthink the process.

WHAT YOU NEED

First, wash your car. Make sure that you remove any dirt, grime and loose stuff from your paint. This is important. You don't want easy-to-remove contamination on your paint that will build up on the clay and induce or cause damage to your paint.

Next, purchase a clay bar kit. You can find these at just about any auto parts store or on-line stores. As you are all aware, I'm a big supporter and purchaser of Adams Polishes. They are a one-stop shop for anything car care related. Not that they are the best or the most/least expensive, I just trust their products. I've been using Adams Polishes for about 9 years, and have never really had a reason to use any other car care product.



BEFORE YOU GET STARTED

The key to knowing that you've done a good job with the clay bar is that you need a starting point – something that helps you quantify that you've done a good job. The easiest and simplest way to do that is by using a plastic bag.

Any thin plastic bag will suffice. Place your hand inside the bag and gently rub the painted surface of your vehicle using a back and forth motion. What you should feel on the palm of your hand is almost like very fine particles of sand projecting through the bag. What you are doing is picking up (through feel) all of the contamination that is in your clear coat. It can be brake dust, tire dust, industrial contamination and/or environmental contamination. It is trapped in the clear coat. This is your starting point.





STEP 1 – PREP YOUR CLAY

On the right, this is what the clay bar kit looks like supplied by Adams. It contains a white bar of clay (packaged), along with a plastic oval forming tool.

Take the clay and break it into two pieces about 3" x 3". Flatten the clay out on a smooth surface to make it a little thinner so it fits on the fingertips of your hand. Take the oval forming tool and press it into the clay so that it makes indentations/ridges in the clay. If you don't have the Adams tool, take a knife and score the clay cross-ways. You want the surface of the clay to be rough so that it picks up contamination better.



STEP 2 - LUBRICANT

The lubricant that you use will be some type of detail spray. Again, Adams has several products that you can use. There is their normal detail spray (the bubble-gum smelling stuff), Slick & Slide (a new product that works great as a normal detail spray or one of their Graphene detail sprays.

STEP 3 – MICROFIBER TOWELS

Needless to say, the only towels that you want to use when clay barring are microfiber. Don't use soft diapers, paper towels or cotton rags. They'll all induce scratches.

I use a couple different types of microfiber towels. After using the clay bar, I'll take a thin microfiber towel (A) to remove the coating of detail spray. These towels can be purchased in rolls of 50 that fit in a paper towel dispenser and you just peel off one at a time. They can be washed and reused if they don't get too soiled.

After the initial wipe, I'll go back over the area with a plush microfiber towel (**B**). This removes any excess spray and yields a nice finish.

STEP 4 – THE CLAY BAR PROCESS

You are ready. Pick a surface area to begin with. I suggest an area no more than 2' to 3' square – maybe smaller. A door could be broken down into two

areas. The hood or deck lid might be three separate areas. Choose a surface area that you are comfortable with.


To the right, I've sprayed detail spray onto the surface. Make sure you cover the area well. Remember, the detail spray is acting like a lubricant for the clay bar. Take the piece of clay, set it on the paint that has not been sprayed with detail spray. You will not be able to slide the clay across the surface.

As you are spraying the surface and rubbing the clay bar across it, you'll get a feel for how much detail spray you need to keep the clay sliding smoothly. If the clay bar hangs up on the paint, spray more detail spray. Use liberal amounts. I know, I know, the stuff is \$12 or more a bottle. Like they say, it is what it is. You'll eventually find the balance.

Rub the clay bar across the surface using back and forth motions. This will pick up the lion's share of the contamination. Do not use circular motions when rubbing the clay bar on the paint. This could induce scratches into the clear coat that would eventually need to be buffed out prior to applying a coat of wax or ceramic coating.

Repeat this process until you have finished the entire vehicle.





STEP 5 - THE FINAL STEP

After you have finished clay barring the entire vehicle, go find that plastic bag, place your hand inside and rub the surface that you have clay barred. I'd almost recommend that you perform this step periodically during the clay barring process. That way, if you've missed a spot or are not happy with how smooth the surface is, you can go back and repeat the clay bar process until the surface is nice and smooth.

That is what you are looking for here. You should not feel any contamination on the palm of your hand after you have clay barred the paint. It won't be ultra-perfect – some contamination that is deep down inside the clear coat or into the paint layer may not be pulled out with the clay bar. But you should get the majority of it with the clay.



KEY POINTS/THINGS TO WATCH FOR

By all means, this is not a complete list, but I thought I'd touch on some of the dos and don'ts that you should be aware of when using a clay bar. In no particular order:

- Use enough detail spray so your clay slides easily across the paint. If you feel any resistance, spritz more detail spray on it.
- Make sure that you flip your clay over periodically. If it gets dirty, flip it over or fold it on to itself and spread it out. If your car has a "normal" amount of contaminant on it, you should be able to use just one chunk of clay for the entire car. If it gets too dirty, don't be afraid of replacing it with a fresh piece of clay.
- Speaking of dirty clay, here's a tip. If you are wiping the clay across the surface of your vehicle and
 the clay slips out of your hand and falls to the ground, toss it out and get a fresh piece of clay. That
 clay will pick up any type of contaminant off the floor. You don't want to rub that across your paint.
 Err on the side of safety. If in doubt, toss it out.
- You can clay bar your headlight lenses, trim pieces, tail light lenses, chrome trim and your wheels.
 When doing your headlight and tail lights, use copious amounts of detail spray.
- Depending on the amount of contamination on your paint, don't be afraid to switch out your microfiber towels occasionally, especially if they're getting dirty.
- Use that plastic bag often. Get a feel for how the paint feels on your hand before you clay bar and after you clay bar. You should notice a marked difference in the feel. This can also be true if you clay bar a brand new vehicle. You'd be surprised how much contamination there is on the paint when it comes off the assembly line.
- Once you've finished clay barring your vehicle, you should then be ready to perform paint correction (if you are so inclined) and then ceramic coating.
- If you have no plans to do paint correction or any type of ceramic coating, you will need to apply a
 good wax to the painted surface. That clay bar removed most of your contamination and, along
 with it, most of your wax.

If you have done your clay barring correctly followed by a fresh coat of wax, your paint should certainly have a better shine to it. Maybe not as good as the day it was new, but a few levels better than when you began the process.

Feel free to drop me any questions that you might have. I'll certainly share whatever knowledge I have with you.
