## THE COVER PAGE PHOTO

During the 29<sup>th</sup> Anniversary event at the National Corvette Museum, we were introduced to the new "Wonder Wall" that now surrounds the inside perimeter of the Museum's spire. It covers about 270° around the perimeter. The individual panels that make up the wall are 7 - 8 feet tall and each panel is about 12 feet long. Interconnected, they can show a continuous video that surrounds you or each panel can be individually programmed to show something different.

After a 30 minute presentation about the wall, there was an empty space where one panel had been removed. In that space there was a covered car. No one had any idea what was beneath the cover.

When the cover was removed, they unveiled what is now believed to be the world's very first Corvette – or VIN #001.



The car is owned by a private individual who spoke at the unveiling and provided some background on how he acquired the car and how he did the research to conclude that this is, indeed, VIN #001. I'll do a complete story on this in an upcoming issue of Flags.

#### NATIONAL CORVETTE MUSEUM'S 29<sup>TH</sup> ANNIVERSARY EVENT

**As most of you know, I travelled** down to Bowling Green, KY to attend the annual Anniversary Event at the National Corvette Museum. Instead of doing any of the organized drives, I bit the bullet and sat through all of the speaker presentations (Chevrolet engineering updates, the Assembly Plant presentation, the Board of Directors event, Mobil 1 talk, the Ambassador's meeting, Corvette Racing presentation and the Spire Society recognition event). I also attended a two-hour classroom session with Paul Koerner, Chevrolet's crack regional service advisor/tech.

When I wasn't in meetings, I walked around the facility, took a bunch of pictures and spoke with quite a few people I've come to know over the years.

#### **C8 CLASSROOM WITH PAUL KOERNER**

When I signed up for this class, I was not aware that the class was for C8 owners. I guess I don't read well. At any rate, it turned out great as we had actually purchased a C8 less than 5 days before I left for the event. Prophetic.

For years, Paul was a service technician at a Chevrolet dealership out on the east coast. He specialized in Corvettes. He became well known in the Corvette community over the years. For some time, he has been giving classroom instructions and presentations at the National Corvette Museum. If you have ever attended one of his presentations, you walk away amazed at his knowledge of Corvette – all years.



Last year, Chevrolet approached him about working directly for them as a field service rep for 34 dealers on the east coast. He hired on with Chevy last fall and is busier than ever.

The two-hour class that I attended was \$80.00 and there was a limit of 10 for the class. It was two of the best hours that I have spent in quite some time. I ended up having a lot of questions for him and was both taken back by his knowledge and surprised at some of his comments.

Check out the banter on the next page. For those of you that own a C8, I think I captured some good tips and helpful information.

#### The Banter

 Question. What is Chevrolet's bottom line on the transmission filter change? Can it be changed earlier than 7,500 miles? First, Chevrolet recommends that the transmission filter be changed at or slightly before 7,500 miles – not before. For new owners of C8, that first filter change is on Chevrolet within the first year. Check with your particular dealer on whether or not that time period can be extended. Paul indicated that anywhere between 7,000 and 7,499 miles is suggested.

I found out that the filter on my '21 was actually changed at 3,400 miles. Paul's response was pretty blunt; *that's unacceptable*, especially for a dealer than handles lots of Corvettes. He strongly suggested that I make arrangements to have it changed again prior to 7,500 miles.

- Remember, when checking the engine oil on a C8, **ALWAYS** check it after the engine has warmed up and the car is running. All C8 oil systems are dry sump.
- When changing oil, always inspect the cabin air filter.
- You should also sign up for the My Chevrolet app. It is chock-full of useful stuff (maintenance reminders, tips & tricks, etc.).
- **Tire rotation**. At every oil change, rotate the tires whether you are running all weather (non-Z51) or Pilot Sport 4s. All new(er) Michelin tires can be rotated left-to-right no problem. Helps even out tire wear.
- Wheel alignment. If, for whatever reason, you need a wheel alignment, have it done with a full tank of gas.
- Ceramic brake pads. Good thing I asked. I told Paul that I was planning on installing ceramic pads on my C8 just like I did on the C7. His answer: do not put ceramic pads on a C8! Unlike the C7's anti-lock brake system, the C8's system is electronically controlled by a computer module. The coefficient of friction of the pads is constantly monitored and adjusted as you drive and brake. Ceramic pads change the coefficient of friction and will more than likely toss a check engine light at you. He suggested that you ceramic coat your wheels to help with brake dust. I further went on line and discovered that Hawk Performance has brake pads that are non-ceramic, high performance pads that work on the C8 and won't upset the anti-lock system. I'll probably go with those pads over the winter (if not before).
- **Front lift system**. Someone reported an issue with their front lift system. Paul reminded everyone that the lift system (hydraulic) is actually filled with DOT brake fluid. If there are issues with the front lift, take it to your dealer. If all is well, then it is recommended to have the fluid changed every five years.



 AFM/DFM (active fuel management). All C8's are equipped with AFM. The main reason for AFM is to help Chevrolet meet ever more stringent mileage requirements set by the government. This means that as you get up to speed (say, you're on a highway and set the cruise to 70 mph), you'll notice that the engine drops from 8 cylinders to 4. If you go to pass another vehicle or don't maintain a constant speed, you will move back to 8 cylinders. It is normal, it happens seamlessly, you won't feel it and you won't notice the engine switching back and forth. The new AFM system on Corvette is state-of-the-art.

I noticed on my drive down to Bowling Green that I was usually running on 4 cylinders. I have to tell you, I could never tell whether it was running on 4 or 8. However, my fuel mileage did surprise me. From Dayton to Bowling Green (roughly 280 miles), I averaged 34.3 MPG! For the total trip down and back including in-town driving, I averaged 31.1 MPG. Not too shabby.

- **Key fobs**. The C8 comes with two fobs. If, for whatever reason, you need additional fobs, you can program four fobs and the car will remember each fob. Of course, the fobs are around \$600 each and Chevrolet has to program them.
- Electronic (computer) modules. The C8 is loaded. The coupe has <u>60</u> different computer modules while the hardtop convertible has <u>70</u> modules. Yikes!
- Winter storage. Everyone has their own idea on how to store a Corvette for the winter (or prolonged storage). Paul recommends that you change your oil just prior to putting the car up for the winter. Also, more critical, is gas. Always store the C8 (or any Corvette) with only ¼ tank of fuel and add the appropriate amount of fuel stabilizer. Run the engine for 5 minutes to make sure the entire fuel system has fuel-stabilized gas in it. In the spring, start the car and drive to the nearest gas station and fill the tank. That gets fresh fuel flowing and flushes out what remains of the stabilizer. Also, as long as your Vette is on a tender, there really is no need to periodically start the car during the winter.
- **Top tier fuels**. The C8 is designed to run on 91 octane gasoline. If you can move to 93 (if it's in your area), use that. The top three top-tier fuel suppliers are **Shell**, **Valero** and, believe it or not, **Costco**. Their fuel blends meet stringent octane and additive requirements. Other fuel things to keep in mind:
  - The C8 is engineered to run on E10 (ethanol) blend if that's all you can get. If you try E15, it will probably throw you a check engine light.
  - Do **NOT** use gasoline labelled E85 or any flex fuel. You *<u>will</u>* get a check engine light.
  - The maximum octane for Corvette is 100 and is for track use only.
  - Octane rating means resistance to fuel detonation in the engine. The higher the octane rating, the more resistance the engine has to cylinder/fuel detonation. This means that the higher compression allows for better fuel burn and better gas detonation. In the long run, it keeps the engine components cleaner and means less carbon build-up in the cylinders.

Maximum cargo limitations. Boy, this question stumped Paul (first time he had heard it) and created a lot of interesting conversation. One couple brought up the fact that on the label on the driver's side door jamb, it states maximum weight capacity of occupants AND cargo is not to exceed 423 lbs. Not bad if each occupant weighs around 160 lbs. That would give you a cargo capacity of 103 lbs. However, if (as was the case of another couple behind me) the two occupants weight a total of 400+ lbs., then they have a cargo capacity of less than 23 lbs.

No one had ever asked this question to Paul in the past. Indeed, those numbers are correct as Paul went on-line and searched the GM site.

Bottom line, Paul is going to speak to Josh Holder, Chief Engineer for Corvette and get his take on those numbers. Whenever Paul is stumped or needs clarification, he defaults to Josh. More on this down the road (Paul is going to get back to us). When I hear, I'll let you know.

• **Towing**. Should your C8 not start while on the road and you end up needing a tow, Paul suggests that you find a tow company that can put the Vette on wheel dollies and use a flat-bed truck. A lot of tow companies are so-equipped. You want to make sure that the front end is boosted high enough that it doesn't scrape as it is pulled up onto the lowered bed. Be clear when calling a tow company that you have a Corvette especially if it has ground effects.

Paul is the real deal when it comes to Corvette knowledge. If you have any question about any Corvette model (any year), you can contact Paul and he'll get back to you with an answer. He's a busy guy, so he may not get back to you immediately. Rest assured he'll get you an answer. His email is:



#### Plant updates with Ray Theriault (pronounced Ter´-e-o)


I was a tad late to Ray's presentation. In July of this year, Ray took over for out-going Plant Director Kai Spande. Kai had been in charge of the assembly plant for the last nine years. He decided to take a buy-out from GM and retired early (mid-50's).

Ray has a different presentation skill than Kai. He tends to speak faster, which makes you expend a little more effort listening. He still did a great job bringing everyone up to speed on what's going on over at the assembly plant.

The crux of his presentation focused on how long it takes to bring a new Corvette to market from a plant perspective. From start to finish, it is a nine-step




process, from a virtual review to slow build to first production build to saleable production.



Step #4 in the process is the First Slow Build. How long does that first slow build take? In the case of C8, that first build took **three weeks**.

In the picture to the right, that is the very first C8 prototype to roll off the production line. Driving it off the line is Tadge Juechter, the Executive Chief Engineer for Corvette. In the passenger seat is former Plant Director Kai Spande. And, yes, the car was camouflaged during the assembly process.




As for Bowling Green assembly, right now they are building 180 Corvettes per day on a two-shift operation. It remains to be seen if 2023 will set the record for most Corvettes ever built in a model year. I think it was 1979 that holds the record (St. Louis Assembly). At worst, production will set a record for the most Corvettes ever built at Bowling Green Assembly.

There was a question from the audience about semi-conductors and the supply chain. Ray was able to say that the semi-conductor supply has greatly improved throughout the model year. Corvette does get priority over the other GM assembly plants, which tells you a lot about the plant and profitability of Corvette for GM.

## **Mobil 1** Presentation

I don't remember ever sitting in on a Mobil 1 presentation in the past. This time, I did make sure that I would attend their presentation.

It was put on by Tony Esposito (live with the audience) and Cliff Salvesen (via Zoom). Cliff is the Mobil 1 field representative and travels extensively around the world supporting Mobil 1's activities.



Cliff was live from Sebring, FL. It was probably the best Zoom call that I've ever been part of. No delays, great picture and great sound. Well done.

#### Stingray / Z06

The Corvette C8 Stingray/LT2, 6.2L, 495 HP, 470 lb/ft of torque uses Mobil 1 Supercar 0W-40

The Corvette C8 Z06/LT6, 5.5 L, 680 HP, 460 lb/ft of torque uses Mobil 1 Supercar 5W-50

When it comes to oil change frequency, GM recommends changing your oil at least once per year or 5,000/7,500 miles typically. If you don't hit 5,000 miles, you should default to once per year. The main reason for changing you oil is the possibility of moisture contamination and/or other contaminants.

You notice, especially on C7 and C8, that your oil life will decrease even when the car sits for extended periods of time. That's because the oil life is calculated by both age and miles using algorithms. Again, it all has to do with the possibility of contamination as the car sits.

Mobil 1 is celebrating 30 years of being the sole supplier of engine oil for Corvette.

#### Corvette Racing by Pratt Miller Motorsports

On June 23<sup>rd</sup>, Pratt Miller announced the creation of Corvette Racing by Pratt Miller Motorsports. Effectively, Pratt Miller takes over the responsibility of handling all aspects of Corvette racing. Their first official race will take place starting with the 2024 Rolex 24 at Daytona. They will campaign a pair of the new 2024 GT3.R-spec Corvettes.

Eventually, they will build 20 Z06 GT3.R's. The base GT3's will be manufactured at the Bowling Green assembly plant. The cars will be shipped to the Pratt Miller facility in Michigan and be finished.




- 70% of the engine in the racing version of the GT3.R car is the stock factory Z06. The remaining 30% are components added by Pratt Miller. The difference is price. A stock 5.5L Z06 engine will set you back about \$30k. Once Pratt Miller adds their goodies to it, the price soars to \$260k.
- All wind tunnel testing of the GT3.R was performed in a static wind tunnel at Pratt Miller. The car is mounted in the wind tunnel that has a moving road surface that the car sits on. The car can be driven to maximum speed while not moving in the tunnel. They showed a few pictures of a GT3.R in the tunnel. Very different way of wind tunnel testing a vehicle.
- The one person that Corvette Racing has had for years that is not yet with the new Corvette Racing team is Doug Fehan. He has been a staple for the Corvette team for 25 years. So far, no word on whether or not Doug will join the team.

#### Corvette Team Update - Harlan Charles and Josh Holder

The primary focus here was speaking to end-of-year statistics for the 2023 model year, discussing the upcoming E-Ray and Corvette competition. As most of you know, Harlan is the Marketing Mgr. for Corvette and Josh is the Chief Engineer for Corvette. With the rumor mill buzzing that Tadge will be retiring soon (he won't talk about it), I think Josh is the Executive Chief Engineer in waiting.


I can tell you that they are excited about the E-Ray. If you look at the highlight slide to the right, it really is the very first year-round capable Corvette. And, at a combined 655 HP, it truly is a powerful performance car.

One word about the hybrid badge. This really is an I.C.E. sports car with an electric motor assist when called on. It is not really a hybrid. The electric



motor will only allow you to go about 5 miles. Enough to get you quietly out of the neighborhood in the morning. After that, it's all about the 6.2 L LT-2 engine. You cannot plug the E-Ray in. The electric motor is re-charged using the batteries and/or regenerative braking. That said, call on that motor when needed for performance and LOOK OUT! Zero to 60 MPH in 2.5 seconds. When launched from the line, the E-Ray simply out performs the competition in the quarter mile.

Competition? On the next page, we have a slide that shows you exactly which cars Chevrolet says are the direct competitors to the Corvette E-Ray. Note the differences in both performance, engine output and, most importantly, price (MSRP).



Of course, you have McLaren, Ferrari and Porsche right there which is not a surprise. Then you have Lexus and Acura because they are also electrified.

A couple weeks ago, I watched a Haggerty video where the E-Ray went up against a Lamborghini and a Ferrari. In the quarter mile race out of the hole, the E-Ray simply walked away from both for about a 1/4 mile. While it did finish first by a few car lengths, the Ferrari was catching up quickly. At the end of the day, that massive HP in the Ferrari would have eventually passed the E-Ray with no problem.

A few years ago at either the Bash or the Anniversary event, I listened to Tadge Juechter explain to the audience that adding features to the Corvette adds weight, so they contemplate those features versus the effect on performance.

Well, apparently, features trump performance, especially when it comes to safety.

You can see that, for the upcoming 2024 model year, Chevrolet has added automatic



emergency braking, forward collision alert, front pedestrian braking (that's probably a EU requirement), a following distance indicator, lane keep assist/departure warning and intelligent auto high-beam assist. With the exception of the front pedestrian braking, we have all of the other features on our F-150. I can tell you that all of them have been used frequently and truly help to make your vehicle safer on the road. I'm glad to see Chevrolet has added those features on the upcoming models.

Right after the raffle for the 2024 Red Mist Corvette, we gathered for the official group photo for those who were in the Museum. I stuck around for the picture. Can you find me?

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arlier this year, I logged on to Rick Conti's YouTube channel to check out his weekly vlog. I just happened to catch a video of a gentleman that stopped by Coughlin Chevrolet to say hello to Rick while on his trip home. He was driving a 1963 Corvette convertible. It was a great video that highlighted lots of features of the '63.

Fast forward to Lancaster. I was walking around the center of town and happened across a 10'x10' tent with an older couple sitting in it. Lo and behold, it was the gentleman from the Rick Conti video.

Not bashful, I introduced myself to him (and his wife) and told him that I had seen the video. At that point, he just started talking to me about his '63, the history and where the car has been. Ended up to be a 30 minute conversation that I'll not forget.

His name is Steve Stone. Steve is in his mid-80's. He lives in Madison, WI with his wife of 60-some years. He is a Vietnam-era veteran. The car, again, is a 1963 Corvette convertible that he ordered new back in late 1962. It has been in his possession since that time. As it sat in Lancaster, the car had 622,000 miles on it!!! It has been driven in all lower 48 states, Washington, DC and all of the Canadian provinces.

Steve does his own engine rebuilds (he has two engines that he can swap out – one of which is the original that came with the car). It is a radio-delete car, so he pipes in his music through 2 interchangeable I-pods. Portions of the car have been re-painted over the years (the paint on the doors has roughly 250,000 miles on it). He has a top-notch paint guy that can blend that gloss black paint perfectly, so you can't see any differences between panels. At the moment, he's running oversize Michelin tires all around which has really improved the ride and handling on the road.

n Saturday, September 16<sup>th</sup>, a group of BCC members drove over to West Milton to take part in their annual downtown Car Show. The weather was perfect – a great night for a car show.

Apparently, everyone else and their mother thought the same thing. By the time we arrived with our six cars, the parking was full. We were able to squeeze three of our cars in at the south end. 
Here are some tidbits from the Club and Corvette nation for October 2023.



Quick Jack for sale. Now that I've moved on to the C8, I can no longer use my Quick Jack lift. This unit will work on any C1 – C7 Corvette. I have used it probably a  $\frac{1}{2}$  dozen times since new (originally purchased by Larry Atchinson but never used). Comes with the Left and Right lifting jacks, the hydraulic compressor, all hydraulic hoses. liftina pads. instructions and extra fittings. The jack has two lift positions - about 8" off the ground or 12". Great for working on your tires/wheels and lower portions of your car. If you put jack stands under the car, it is also safe to work underneath your car. The two lifting units will actually fit underneath your car (at least on the C7 and C8) for convenient storage.

Asking \$450 for the unit. The cart in the picture is NOT included. If you are interested, reach out to me. If needed, I'll deliver it to you (the lifting jacks are heavy). (937) 416-6529 if interested. If no answer, please leave me a message.
