NCM AMBASSADOR'S CONVENTION

ach November now for the last 4 years, the National Corvette Museum has invited all of the Ambassadors to the Museum for the annual **Ambassador's Convention**. It's a two-day event designed to bring the Ambassadors up to speed with what is going on at the Museum.

The Convention is designed to support the goals of what an Ambassador is supposed to do for the Museum. That is, the Ambassador's program is to provide Corvette clubs/organizations a two-way communication link to the NCM. The Ambassador is the conduit for that link. He/she represents the NCM to each Corvette Club and, in turn, is the voice of each Corvette Club to the Museum.

I headed down to Bowling Green on Monday the 1st. Just your normal, leisurely 80 mph jaunt down I-75 to I-71 and then pick up I-65 for the ride into BG. I ended up staying at **The Synch Hotel** which sits on Corvette Drive and is only two minutes from the Museum.

One reason for choosing The Synch was that they have 4 garages available to guests. I figured that because the weather was supposed to be cooler than expected, I could just get up in the morning, head to the garage, back out and head over to the Museum. Ended up being a good idea. With frost each morning and a light rain on Monday overnight, the car stayed dry and I didn't have to wipe down the windows or – worse yet – scrape off the frost. It's a tight fit side-to-side, but room enough to squeeze out of the car. On the final night of my stay, I was joined in the next bay over by a Rapid Blue C8 that had just gone through the R8C Museum delivery. Smart guy.



THE CONVENTION

As I mentioned, this is the 4th Ambassador's meeting that has been held at the Museum. When Stephanie Morrill opened the meeting, she announced that this was the largest convention to date. We had 70 Ambassador's in attendance and they came from all over: California, Texas, Florida, Mississippi, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Wisconsin, Nebraska, Washington and many more states.



The agenda was full of speakers from within the Museum and the Assembly Plant. I'll break this report down by speaker and provide a brief outline of what was shared. I tried to take pictures during the event and I'll intersperse them throughout the following pages.


KAI SPANDE – DIRECTOR OF BOWLING GREEN ASSEMBLY

Everyone always looks forward to hearing from Kai. While his presentation was a re-hash of his speech from the Anniversary Event in September, he did provide some updates on production and where the plant stands on resuming public tours.

Most of Kai's talk centered around the 2017 addition of the new paint shop. Well, if you call 800,000 square feet a shop, then I guess it's a shop.

The paint shop came on-line in mid-to-late 2017, so most of the 2018's and all of the 2019's were painted in the new building. In the picture below, the bottom "half" of the facility (everything under the white roof) is the paint shop. It is 3 stories high and actually also has a basement. Here are some details that he shared:

- The paint shop is manned by 240 employees
- There is a strict protocol in place that employees must follow. They are provided lint-free outer garments, enter the plant through a series of air blow-off tunnels and walk on sticky floors when they enter to remove any contamination from the bottom of their shoes.
- All employees must adhere to a strict personal hygiene guide. The guide states what you can and cannot wear into the plant when it comes to



- There are 51 robots in the plant the majority of which are in the paint shop.
- There are 3 panel suppliers to the plant that supply the fenders, doors, deck lids and roof systems.
- There is one paint supplier Axalta (the old DuPont paint business).
- Bowling Green is considered the center of expertise within General Motors when it comes to painting composite panels. They are even consulted by other GM facilities that paint metal panels.
- Two parts are not painted at Bowling Green. Rear view mirrors are painted by the supplier and the Nacelles for the convertible are also painted by that supplier.
- Here's a tid-bit I wasn't aware of. If you order stripes on your C8, those are applied after the car is painted. It is accomplished by a 3rd party supplier that is located at the Bowling Green assembly plant compound. A great trivia question.

As for public tours starting back up at Bowling Green Assembly, it is not going to happen for a while. Paramount at BGA is employee safety – especially during the pandemic. Letting outsiders back into the plant not knowing their vaccination status presents a challenge to BGA that they are not willing to take on at this point. They very much want to resume plant tours and it is being discussed at BGA and Chevrolet. There will be more on this subject probably at Bash time next April.

Bummer.



DEREK MOORE – CHIEF CURATOR FOR NCM

Next up on the docket was Derek Moore. He provided an update on the site, the status of the archives, collection updates and Museum accreditation.

Exhibits and Visitor Experience

Coming summer of 2022 is the Hot Wheels – Race to Win exhibit. This behindthe-scenes look at the thrilling world of racing investigates the scientific process for designing superfast cars. Hands-on experiences, authentic race gear and captivating memorabilia will engage families in the process. Oh, and there may even be one or two Hot Wheel cars in the exhibit.

Collections

They continue work to move, reorganize and reconcile the collections. There are two collection buildings (old FOP and Collection Building #2). They are moving and rearranging vehicles on new Titan lifts so they can double stack vehicles in the collection.

The Library and Archives continue to collect documents related to the history of Corvette. They are culling the collection for items that should not be housed in the L&A. Since the 25th Anniversary celebration they have been selling books and manuals that do not fit the collection. Check out EBay under National Corvette Museum.

Deaccession Process

In 2019, the Collections and Exhibits Department began the process of deaccessioning artifacts from the NCM collections. To date, this has included two Corvettes. This is not a process that any Museum takes lightly. It helps to keep the collection relevant to Corvette and culls the collection of items that are no longer either relevant or important to keep.

American Accreditation Museum (AAM)

Derek and his staff have begun the process of becoming accredited by the AAM. Many museums have attained AAM accreditation, but only two automotive museums have earned AAM accreditation: The Studebaker Museum and the Auburn/Cord/Duesenberg Museum – both in Indiana. It is a long, arduous process that takes a couple years (at least) to accomplish. The AAM process goes through every operation of the museum to make sure best practices are being followed and everything is documented. Their first review is coming up in the next couple months. Stay tuned.

CHRIS SWEENEY - MEMBERSHIP

Chris provided an overview of membership, Museum brick lead-times and Ambassador Information. He will be stepping in to take over some of the membership and Ambassador responsibilities that were previously handled by Stephanie Morrill. Stephanie is now going to focus more on her position as Operations Manager at the Museum.




- The Museum currently has 36,207 members (all categories). Of the 36,000 members, 54% have the basic membership. Lifetime members account for 13.1% of all membership. The remaining 32.9% are family memberships. In 2020, all memberships generated over \$1 million in revenue for the Museum.
- There are 305 Ambassador's to the Museum. Not all Corvette Clubs are represented by an Ambassador. So, for this 4th annual convention, 23% of the Ambassadors were present.
- If you are looking to purchase a brick for display at the Museum (hexagonal, standard 4"x8" or larger), the lead time is now 12 to 16 weeks. In some cases, it will be longer.

DAVE SMITH - R8C DELIVERIES AND PDI

While Shane Webb supervises the R8C delivery program, Dave is responsible for performing the PDI on each vehicle, prepping and inspecting each new Vette before it heads out to Corvette Boulevard for delivery.

- There are 7 people in the PDI department that handle the day-to-day prep work on each new Corvette.
- Right now, the Museum can deliver between 8 and 9 new Corvettes each day. It takes anywhere from 3 to 5 hours to "deliver" a new Corvette for each customer.



- In addition to the R8C deliveries, the Museum is still doing Museum Experience deliveries. The NCM Experience offers a day in the spotlight with your Corvette. Your Vette receives an exterior detail and is then placed out on Corvette Blvd. Customers are then provided a tour of the Museum, membership to the Museum, a commemorative plaque and silver door jamb decal as well as the opportunity to purchase exclusive Experience apparel. The Experience can also be viewed via the live webcams. The cost is \$500 and worth every penny.
- I took advantage of the Museum Experience program back in 2016 and highly recommend it to any Corvette owner. If you're interested, talk to me.



DEB HOWARD - EDUCATION

Deb currently handles all educational activities at the National Corvette Museum. Everything from Vettecademy, school field trips and classroom sessions at the Museum.

Vettecademy, originally a video series geared towards children and young adults as a way to promote the Museum, has reached a much broader audience. Deb is looking for sponsors for the series. A sponsorship is \$200 per episode.



- The Museum also offers field trips for local schools. It's usually just one classroom per trip and includes Museum tour and educational information. A Club can also fund a Field Trip for \$300 per classroom.
- The National Corvette Museum is a Sensory Accredited Museum.

MARIAH – INFORMATION TECHNOLOGIES

Mariah touched on a few points when talking about Social Media (she's a huge Facebook fan), Newsletter judging and Website planning.

- Newsletter judging. Found out that the Newsletter competition is not judged internally or by anyone at the NCM. They actually use an independent, outside individual (a Corvette enthusiast) who judges all club entries based on certain criteria. He/she reviews each submission, scores each one and then ranks then 1, 2 or 3.
- As for newsletter submission, previous year winners can submit for the next year competition as long as there have been noticeable changes in formatting. If you submit a newsletter for competition and it is the same exact format as last year, it will not be judged.
- Parking lot banners for Clubs opens in January. They have around 25 spaces for banners. Cost is \$500. Banners usually fill up fast (Greater Dayton usually has a banner). At the end of the season, the banner is returned to the submitting club and are usually used as fund raisers.
- She touched on QR codes, website creation and newsletter templates. She recommended checking out WIX when it comes to creating or updating a website. She also highly recommend using QR codes in newsletters or club communications. Finally, a clever website for templates is CANVA.com. That's who the NCM uses. She showed examples in her presentation. Very impressive site. It's free for the basic stuff (which is a lot) or \$39/year for unlimited access.
- She reminded everyone that the Corvette Museum Store will have free shipping on all orders at or above \$50.00 through the Holidays.

ADAM BOCCA – NCM INSURANCE

Adam provided an overview of the NCM Insurance program. Adam heads up the insurance department and has 3 other people working for him in the office.

NCM insurance has been offering collector vehicle insurance since April of 2009 and is one of the fastest growing collector car agencies in North America.



- All policies issued by NCM are Agreed Value which means that you won't be penalized for depreciation. The value is established prior to the policy being written. If you total your vehicle, the agreed value is what you will receive.
- Mileage limits are set at 1,000, 3,000 or 6,000 miles. Any unused mileage from one year automatically rolls over into the following year.
- NCM currently has over 9,000 policies in force. Those policies cover about \$1.2 billion in owner assets.
- About 60% of all policies are written for Corvettes. The remaining 40% are mostly classics and other high-end vehicles. The most expensive car insured right now is a \$3.2 million Koenigsegg Regera. Google it. A very impressive car.

SHARON BRAWNER - PRESIDENT & CEO

Sharon has been with the National Corvette Museum now for about 60 days. She has been reviewing all Museum functions and developing a plan for continuous improvement. Some items that she touched on.

The recently announced 35,000 square foot expansion has been put on hold for the time being. While the Museum continues to study the idea, shovels in the dirt won't happen for probably at least 3 years – maybe more.



- The Museum needs to grow its audience focusing more on the younger crowd and families. The core audience remains strong, but growth will only happen by getting the youth excited about Corvette.
- The old Country Hearth hotel is now demolished and gone. While ideas for the property are being discussed, there is nothing concrete in the planning stages at this point.
- One of Sharon's main goals is making Bowling Green more convention friendly. There is a lot to do to entice organizations to come to Bowling Green. It sounds like this will be one of her key drivers going into the future.

TUNNELS TO TOWERS ROLLING 9/11 EXHIBIT

As a tie-in to the National Corvette Museums annual Vets & Vettes event, The **Tunnels to Towers Foundation** rolling exhibit was at the National Corvette Museum while the Ambassador's convention was taking place. We actually stood outside the Museum and greeted the semi and police escort as it rolled onto the Museum grounds. Kinda neat.



The Tunnels to Towers Foundation was started to honor the sacrifice of firefighter Stephen Siller, who laid down his life to save others on September 11, 2001. When he heard that the towers had been hit, he loaded up his gear (60 lbs on his back), and ran through the Brooklyn Battery Tunnel to the towers and headed up. He perished in the tower collapse and his remains were never found.

The Foundation was started by Stephen's older brother Frank to honor his ultimate sacrifice and to help wounded veterans and first responders recover when they return home. Since the Foundation was started, it has raised over \$250 million in support of our nation's greatest heroes and their families. The Foundation builds "smart homes", one floor homes that are outfitted with everything needed for wounded/handicapped veterans/first responders. The homes usually cost around \$1 million and are provided to the recipients mortgage free! In addition to the homes, the Foundation will pay off mortgages of veterans/first responders that have died in the line of duty. Over 95% of every dollar the Foundation takes in goes directly to their programs and services. Frank, Stephen's brother, CEO and founder of the Foundation, is an *uncompensated volunteer* of the Foundation, as are many of the other members.




Oh, and we eventually found a place to eat!

After driving around Preble County, we headed over to Richmond and accomplished the main goal of the day – eating at the Red Front Bar & Grill. Note: not a staged photo.




HAPPENINGS AROUND THE BCC

I CALL BULL-\$#!T ON CONSUMER REPORTS!

As reported in the latest *corvetteblogger.com* article, **Consumer Reports** has named the 2022 Corvette one of the 10 least reliable cars in its survey. Really? What. Did Chevrolet not pad the pockets of Consumer Report's editors?

In their recently released rankings, the new Stingray received a reliability score of 13 out of 100. The lower the number, the less reliable the vehicle is. They list the 6.2L LT2 engine, the new Tremec DCT, the drive system, paint and trim as **potential** problem areas.

"Our surveys take a deep dive into the numerous things that can go wrong with a vehicle" Consumer Reports explains on their website.

My take: sure, lots of things <u>can go wrong</u> with any vehicle. Maybe I'm living in a box, but I have not heard of too many complaints with the C8 Corvette, and I read a lot of articles each month on Corvette. Sure, periodic nits for a few things, but no one is screaming that there are any major problems with the car.

From what I can see, the biggest MAJOR issue with the Corvette is drivers not respecting the power of the vehicle. How many times (almost weekly) do you see pictures and articles of people (usually young drivers) crashing their new Corvette almost as soon as they purchase it. That is a people issue – it has nothing to do with the vehicle. I know, I know, Consumer Reports doesn't take driver fault into consideration. Still.

They try to appease readers by saying that on a positive note, Corvette wasn't the lowest rated vehicle on the list. That honor goes to the Mercedes GLE (8), followed by the Ford Explorer (8), the Mustang (9) and then the Chevy Silverado (11). The Lexus GS SUV was the highest rated vehicle on the list with Lexus being rated as the most reliable brand.

My headline above still stands.


