

NEWHAM COMMUNITY SAFETY SURVEY

In the realm of discourse surrounding crime and community safety, the present survey emerges as a pivotal and timely addition, holding the promise of being an invaluable resource for comprehending the prevailing sentiments and concerns that permeate the community. This empirical endeavour is poised to contribute substantively to the ongoing dialogues pertaining to these vital issues, fostering a deeper and more nuanced understanding of the prevailing sentiments and anxieties experienced at the grassroots level.



Abstract

This briefing report presents the outcomes of a meticulously conducted survey undertaken by the Newham Muslim Forum in collaboration with Plaistow's Community Assembly in the London Borough of Newham, spanning from the 27th of September to the 9th of October, 2022. With the primary objective of elucidating residents' perspectives on community safety, this survey engaged approximately 200 respondents to shed light on issues concerning violence and crime in this diverse and multifarious borough. Our findings reveal a pervasive sense of insecurity, as 72% of respondents reported consistent unease, with 41% characterising their environment as "usually unsafe" and an additional 30% as "very unsafe." Moreover, 83% expressed dissatisfaction with Newham's safety, emphasising an urgent need for improved safety measures.

Analysis of open-ended responses uncovered a prevailing sentiment of invisibility among law enforcement agencies and local authorities, highlighting the importance of police visibility in engendering a sense of security. Key themes from the survey encompass concerns about safety, the imperative for greater community engagement, and addressing underlying social issues. Notably, terms such as "gangs," "drug," "youth," and "knife crime" recurred frequently, indicating critical areas for intervention.

This survey offers valuable insights that advocate for a re-evaluation of current policing and community safety policies, emphasising the need for greater community engagement and a reallocation of resources. The data, containing 604 open responses, serves as an invaluable resource for comprehending community sentiments and anxieties, fostering a deeper understanding of grassroots-level concerns. Interested stakeholders and collaborators are invited to utilise this dataset for policy discussions and strategic initiatives aimed at fortifying community safety in Newham.

Introduction

To foster a safer and more secure community environment within the London Borough of Newham, the Newham Muslim Forum, under the aegis of its civic commitment, undertook a survey spanning from the 27th of September to the 9th of October in the year 2022. This survey, meticulously conducted, had as its primary objective the elucidation of Newham's residents concerning community safety matters. Notably, the survey emerged as a consequential component of our collaboration with Plaistow's Community Assembly.

Newham, a borough distinguished by its multifarious "Voluntary, Faith, and Community" sector, offers a fertile landscape for exploratory investigations into these facets' essential role in nurturing a sense of safety and security among its residents. The Newham Muslim Forum, in alliance with the Plaistow's Community Assembly, has embarked on a significant endeavour dedicated to unearthing insights that might pave the way for the empowerment of local communities, enabling them to assume a more active role in safeguarding their neighbourhoods.

This briefing report is a repository of pivotal insights derived from the meticulous curation and analysis of data gleaned through the survey. Within the diverse expanse of Newham, a demographic mosaic housing more than 350,000 individuals, our survey managed to engage approximately 200 respondents who graciously lent their perspectives and experiences to inform our research findings. We present this briefing with utmost humility and reverence designed to illuminate the intricate tapestry of residents' sentiments concerning violence and crime within the Newham community.

The primary aim of this report is to provide a discerning and insightful perspective, offering valuable guidance not only to our organisation but also to the broader spectrum of stakeholders invested in enhancing service provisions and creating an environment of unparalleled safety within the borough of Newham. The amalgamation of these collective efforts aspires to carve a path toward realising a Newham where all residents can thrive in an atmosphere of tranquillity, security, and collective well-being.

Methodology

In pursuit of a comprehensive understanding of residents' perspectives on community safety in Newham, this study meticulously orchestrated the following methodological framework:

Research Question: The central research question underpinning this investigation pertained to the sentiments of Newham's residents concerning community safety, emphasising their perceptions of violence and crime in the borough. Specifically, the study sought to gauge residents' prevailing opinions and concerns in this regard.

Sample Population: The survey targeted the residents of Newham, a borough with diverse demographics and backgrounds. Although Newham is home to over 350,000 individuals, it is essential to acknowledge that the survey data primarily represents those who voluntarily participated, a factor that may have introduced a degree of self-selection bias.

Sample Size: 200 individuals participated in the survey, offering valuable insights and experiences. It is noteworthy that the sample size, although robust, may not fully represent the entire Newham population, given the voluntary nature of participation and limitations in the survey collection tool.

Sampling Strategy: The survey was conducted voluntarily, allowing residents to self-select into the study. Consequently, the sampling strategy can be characterised as non-probability convenience sampling. While practical and resource-efficient, this approach may introduce certain demographic biases into the data, as evidenced by the underrepresentation of under 24-year-olds and residents from specific geographic regions.

Methods: Data collection was carried out through a quantitative structured survey, wherein respondents were asked a series of questions pertaining to community safety and crime in Newham. The survey data was organised into columns with question headers and labelled with letters for easy reference, allowing for subsequent analysis and discussion.

Survey Design: The survey was focused on gathering nuanced insights into residents' perceptions of safety and crime. The questions were carefully framed to facilitate a comprehensive understanding of the issues, and the data was subsequently cleansed and anonymised to protect the privacy of respondents. While efforts were made to ensure a relaxed approach to data cleansing, some demographic details, such as the age category of 55-64 and specific geographic areas like Maryland, were inadvertently omitted.

Analytic Framework: Data analysis involved organising and summarising the responses to key survey questions. The analysis aimed to provide an in-depth understanding of the sentiments expressed by residents, thus forming the foundation for subsequent discussions and recommendations.

Ethical Considerations: A paramount ethical consideration was to protect the

anonymity and privacy of survey participants. All data was cleansed and anonymised, with sensitive or identifying information removed. Additionally, efforts were made to ensure no foul language or negative references to ethnicity remained in the dataset.







Survey Key Insights

The survey conducted within the precincts of Newham yielded several salient key insights, each of which bears academic articulation:

- 1. **Pervading Sense of Insecurity**: A substantial majority of survey respondents expressed a palpable sense of insecurity in their living environment. Remarkably, 72% of those surveyed reported feelings of consistent unease, with 41% characterising their sense of security as "usually unsafe" and an additional 30% as "very unsafe."
- 2. **Dissatisfaction with Safety**: A striking 83% of respondents articulated strong disagreement or outright opposition to the statement asserting Newham's safety for themselves and their families, indicating a prevailing sense of dissatisfaction and apprehension regarding the borough's security.
- 3. **Perceived Disparities in Safety**: The data further revealed that 71% of survey participants believed that safety within Newham was not uniform, with some areas being perceived as less safe than others. This finding underscores the nuanced nature of residents' perceptions of safety.
- 4. **Underreporting of ASB/Crime**: Curiously, despite the prevalent sense of insecurity, 45% of respondents admitted to not reporting any incidents of anti-social behaviour (ASB) or crime within the past six months, highlighting a potential gap in incident reporting and community engagement.
- 5. **Dissatisfaction with Police Response**: Among respondents who did report incidents to the police, a substantial 65% expressed dissatisfaction with the manner in which their ASB/crime reports were handled, raising concerns about the effectiveness and responsiveness of law enforcement agencies.
- 6. Low Confidence in Policing and Local Authority: A significant majority of over 75% of survey participants held negative opinions concerning the effectiveness of both the police and the local authority in safeguarding residents. This sentiment was particularly pronounced, with 88% expressing disappointment with the local authority's performance in the same vein.
- 7. **Importance of Police Visibility**: A remarkable 86% of respondents emphasised the importance of police visibility as a factor contributing to their sense of safety, underscoring the significance of proactive policing strategies.

This preliminary analysis of the survey data reveals profound and pervasive sentiments of insecurity and discontent among Newham's residents. A deeper examination of the extensive comments provided by participants promises to uncover more intricate nuances within these overarching trends. Moreover, it is evident from these findings that the community recognises the constraints of limited public resources experienced by both the police and the local authority. Nevertheless, these findings advocate for a re-evaluation of current policing and community safety policies, emphasising the need for greater community engagement and a reallocation of resources to address the concerns that matter most to the residents of Newham.

The following are comments that come from open responses in the survey. There are 604 entries with several personal stories and respondents expressing deeply held feelings.

Initial scrutiny of the survey data has unveiled a resounding undercurrent of frustration among residents, echoing a prevailing sentiment of invisibility attributed to both law enforcement agencies and the local authorities. Respondents have unequivocally articulated the paramount importance of visibility as a potent factor in engendering a sense of security. This observation resonates as a central tenet in evaluating future community safety strategies, underscored by the compelling insights derived from the survey.

The survey's insights, extracted from a comprehensive examination of the responses, underscore the salience of specific keywords and themes. Notably, the terms "gangs," "drug," "youth," "stab," "East Ham," "street," "asb," "Fly-tipping," "litter," and "rubbish" recur with frequency, reflecting the pronounced significance of these issues in residents' perceptions of safety and community life. These keywords also manifest as pointers to potentially critical areas for intervention and policy development.

Additionally, the survey data reveals a rich tapestry of emerging themes. The top ten themes identified from the survey's extensive dataset encompass a spectrum of concerns and recommendations, reflecting the complexity of community safety dynamics within Newham:

- 1. Community safety and well-being, including strategies to address crime rates and antisocial behaviour.
- 2. The imperative for greater community engagement and trust-building entails active listening to residents' concerns.
- 3. Concerns about safety and security, particularly concerning the welfare of women, the elderly, and vulnerable groups.
- 4. Calls for enhanced policing visibility and activity, encompassing foot patrols, arrests, and the effective utilisation of CCTV while concurrently endorsing community-led solutions.
- 5. The necessity for investments in the younger demographic and formulating action plans

- to address gang activity and youth delinquency, with a specific focus on community-based programs.
- 6. The significance of community-led initiatives, such as neighbourhood clean-up campaigns, youth-oriented programs, and communal events, fosters a sense of unity.
- 7. The call for improved street lighting, increased surveillance through cameras, and the removal of rubbish to cultivate safer and more hygienic neighbourhoods.
- 8. Critiques of the council and authorities for perceived inadequacies in crime combat and safety enhancement, advocating for greater accountability and responsiveness.
- 9. Worries about violence, knife crime, and homicides, along with the necessity for deescalation training for law enforcement and emergency responders.
- 10. Concentration on addressing underlying social issues, encompassing poverty, addiction, and mental health, as integral components of crime reduction and community safety enhancement.

The present survey is fortified with a wealth of data, spanning over 15 pages, which encapsulates these key themes and their associated nuances. It serves as an illuminating source of empirical evidence, affording a foundational framework for robust policy discussions and strategic initiatives aimed at fortifying community safety in Newham. Recommendations

To enhance community safety, this research project has delved into a comprehensive examination of multifaceted factors contributing to the well-being and security of Newham residents. As we navigate the community dynamics, law enforcement, and local government, a distinct understanding of the synergies and potential areas for improvement becomes paramount. The preceding sections of this report have presented an analysis of the current state of community safety, drawing upon empirical data and practical insights. This research is conducted uniquely through the voices of those directly impacted, as the recommendations offered stem from the insights and experiences shared by individuals who participated in the primary research.

We have enumerated forthcoming recommendations below, rooted in the collective wisdom of our community, designed to fortify the resilience of our local government and law enforcement agencies. This inclusive approach not only seeks to dissect prevalent challenges but also to benefit through opportunities for constructive engagement and collaborative initiatives.

Local Government

Implementing the following recommendations requires a coordinated effort involving various London Borough of Newham council departments, community organisations, and residents to create a safer and more equitable living environment.

1. Invest in more lighting and visible deterrence including cameras towards building out crime:

- a. Increased lighting and visible surveillance can significantly deter criminal activities, particularly in high-crime areas.
- b. Well-lit areas create a sense of safety, and cameras can act both as deterrents and aids in solving crimes.

2. Cleaner streets – reduce fly-tipping:

- a. Regular street cleaning efforts and strict measures against fly-tipping contribute to a cleaner and more pleasant environment.
- b. Community engagement and education can also play a role in reducing littering.

3. Invest in community and youth centres:

- a. Financial support for existing community and youth centres can continue to provide safe spaces for individuals and community groups.
- b. Using these centres for crime prevention through educational programs can

help address the root causes of criminal behaviour.

4. Better communication:

- a. Quicker and more responsive communication from council departments can improve public satisfaction and trust.
- b. Actively resolving issues promptly demonstrates a commitment to addressing community concerns.

5. Tackle high crimes and support organisations:

- a. Prioritising efforts to combat high-crime areas demonstrates a commitment to public safety.
- b. Supporting organisations that work on crime prevention and rehabilitation can have a positive impact.

6. Enlist monthly resident forums:

- a. Monthly forums provide a platform for residents to voice concerns, ask questions, and engage with local government.
- b. Marketing these forums effectively ensures broader community participation.

7. Prevent inequal development and "donut" effect:

- a. Balancing investments in different areas prevents some areas getting left behind and promotes equal development.
- b. Ensuring all neighbourhoods, including those in central Newham, receive attention helps create more inclusive communities.

8. Increase patrols in parks and other public places:

- a. Increased patrols in parks and public spaces enhance safety and create a more secure environment for residents.
- b. Engaging with the community to identify areas that need attention can be beneficial.

9. Reduce betting shops, especially in East Ham:

- a. Addressing the proliferation of betting shops can contribute to community well-being.
- b. It may involve reviewing regulations and zoning laws to control the density of such establishments in specific areas.

10. Create a resident focused parking system:

a. A resident focussed approach to parking may encourage local growth and people to feel less stressed and safer.

Law Enforcement

Implementing the following recommendations can contribute to a more effective and community-oriented approach to policing. It involves building strong relationships, fostering transparency, and ensuring that law enforcement efforts are aligned with the specific needs of the community they serve.

1. Increased visible patrols:

- a. Visible police presence can act as a deterrent to criminal activity.
- b. 24/7 patrols address safety concerns at all hours and help build trust within the community.

2. Better response to public concerns:

- a. Quick and efficient responses to public concerns demonstrate a commitment to public safety.
- b. Timely responses also enhance the community's confidence in the police force.

3. Different methods of engaging, share more information on the activities:

- a. Transparency in sharing information about ongoing police activities fosters trust and understanding.
- b. Regular updates on law enforcement initiatives can help the community stay informed.

4. Respond to individual and group complaints and be easily accessible:

- a. Responsiveness to individual and group complaints shows a commitment to addressing community concerns.
- b. Easy accessibility to law enforcement personnel improves communication and builds rapport.

5. Diversity and culturally appropriate place-based approach:

- a. A diverse police force can better understand and serve a multicultural community.
- b. A place-based approach ensures that law enforcement strategies are tailored to the specific needs of different neighbourhoods.

6. Work with the community – active community policing:

- a. Collaborative efforts between the police and the community create a partnership in ensuring public safety.
- b. Community policing involves officers actively engaging with residents, building relationships, and proactively addressing concerns.

7. Regular community action forum meetings:

- a. Community action forum meetings provide a platform for open dialogue between the police and the community.
- b. Regular meetings allow law enforcement to gain a deeper understanding of local issues and concerns.
