Right before we left she'd put the 20 lb. sign in the window for the iceman.

Wealthy planters, especially Germans, kept "Sunday houses" in town to visit on weekends.

Everybody came to town on Saturday. There were as many horse-drawn wagons and horses tied to hitching posts as there were cars. Saturday was provisioning day.
