<u>COURSE OBJECTIVES:</u> This course is designed as an overview and introduction to the various people, techniques, styles, purposes and requirements of and for live theatre in our society. We will cover a broad range of topics, all related to the world of theatre.

You may switch within your group, as long as every position is covered and it is a mutual agreement between the two partners. The oral presentation is a short(2-3min) presentation about a particular figure in American Theatre. A statement of why you feel they were important and why. This of course will require research, so I am also requiring a written list of sources(an informal bibliography if you like)

<u>COURSE OBJECTIVES:</u> To establish and develop the technique required to perform in the Musical Theatre. Using various exercises this course will help establish the basic physical requirements for a beginning dancer as well as enhance and refine the technique of more experienced dancers.

To explore and establish different styles and expand the body's flexibility, strength, endurance and control. Although technique is essential in all dance classes the focus of this course is also the expression of character, emotion, conflict, relationships and how they are expressed through dance.

SINCE WORKING IN THE THEATRE REQUIRES AN ABILITY TO LEARN CHOREOGRAPHY QUICKLY AND PERFORM IT WITH STYLE AND FEELING, THE COURSE WILL ALSO STRESS THE DEVELOPMENT OF "QUICK-PICK-UP" SKILLS.

CLASS REQUIREMENTS:

<u>Attendance is mandatory.</u> There is an allotment of two unexcused absences per semester. In the case of emergencies or extended illness, the student must speak to the professor as soon as possible to determine a course of action. This is a studio and study course designed to continue the development of Acting technique and each individual's acting instrument. This course provides more extensive techniques for a student who wishes to develop a professional acting ability and will bolster confidence, effectiveness in social situations, perceptions of human interaction and presentation abilities of the non-performance oriented students.

Through various exercises, assignments and scene work we will identify the essential tools for an actor. Relaxation, concentration, trust, courage, focus and imagination will all be challenged and expanded or refined.

Since an actor's instrument is their body, we will be getting very physical in class. Interaction both physically and emotionally with other students is essential to success in this course. We will do various physical exercises to warm up the body and explore its expressiveness.

<u>TEXT:</u> There is a text required for this course *Impro* by Keith Johnstone. We will discuss the book in class, but it is also a valuable tool to apply to other work throughout the semester. Periodically I will be handing out other reading material as well.

ATTIRE: Since physical activity is essential to working in this class students should dress in clothes that do not restrict movement. Footwear should be either sneakers or dance shoes-- no heels, platforms or open sandals. As the weather gets colder, it is recommended that students dress in layers for health and comfort. NO JEWELRY. Small post style earrings in pierced ears are acceptable. For scene presentations, students should suggest the character and situation as close as possible(not full costumes)

To explore and establish different styles and expand the body's flexibility, strength, endurance and control. Although technique is essential in all dance classes the focus of this course is also the expression of character, emotion, conflict, relationships and how they are expressed through dance. That is not to give the impression that dancing with good technique is not essential to success in this course. Students are expected to take responsibility for developing any technique deficiency they might have. It is highly recommended that students are concurrently enrolled in either a Ballet class and/or a Jazz Dance class while they are taking this course.

<u>Course Objective</u>: To identify and develop the skills and knowledge required to successfully perform in the Musical Theatre. This course is designed to encourage and facilitate the synthesis of techniques and knowledge acquired through study in dance, music and theatre.

Work in this class will include learning song and or scenes from in a variety of Musical Theatre styles and various composers and lyricists. Each student will add at least three new songs to their repertoire and meet the challenges of work on musical scenes. Work will include song analysis(both text and music), the exploration of music as subtext and dramatic catalyst, character development and expression, physicalization and relationships. The course will also cover professional audition preparation and some basic business of "show business" material.

In addition to the performance material, each student will also research a particular composer, and give a short presentation, including a list of at least 10 songs written by the composer which would provide good audition material.

The text required for this course is:

On Singing On Stage by David Craig

A Recommended book is <u>The American Musical Theatre Song Encyclopedia</u> by Tom Hischak

All students must have a personal, small, cassette recorder for every class. Time will be provided for recording of accompaniment when new material is assigned.

In addition students are required to have a 2"-3" loose-leaf binder for their "book" all music assigned must be placed in the binder, properly mounted and marked for auditions or other performance opportunities. Music and scenes will be assigned throughout the semester and it is each student's responsibility to obtain the materials required.

Listening Log:

Each student must keep a separate journal of Musical Theatre recordings listened to during the semester. At least one score per week. Entries must include a basic synopsis, character breakdown, a brief response to the material and specific songs and characters that would be appropriate for you. This log will be reviewed two or three times during the semester. Always bring it to class.

You are required to see at least one performance of the following productions:

GYPSY

October 26-29 November 2-4 in DOWD Mainstage Theatre.

COLO MAR COMEDA

December 5-9 in the DOWD Lab Theatre

GRADING: Final grades will be determined in the following manner:

Attendance is mandatory. Students are allowed 2 absences for the semester. Opportunity to "makeup" or re-schedule missed assignments or presentations will be at the discretion of the instructor. Grades will be lowered for work not presented on time. Final grade will be lowered by .5 for each absence beyond two.

ATTIRE

Students should most often dress in clothing that is comfortable and allows freedom of movement. For final presentation of scenes, student should suggest as well as possible the appropriate clothing for the character. For song presentations and mock audition, students should dress appropriately for a professional audition.

This is a course aimed at students with a serious interest in musical theatre performing. Classtime is not intended for learning of material, but aimed at the analysis and performance of that material. Success in this course requires students work diligently on all material assigned. Every student should always **be prepared to perform every class** once material has been assigned. Unpreparedness when called on to perform will impact your grade significantly.

This is a studio and study course designed to continue the development of Acting technique and each individual's acting instrument. This course provides more extensive techniques for a student who wishes to develop a professional acting ability and will bolster confidence, effectiveness in social situations, perceptions of human interaction and presentation abilities of the non-performance oriented students.

Through various exercises, assignments and scene work we will identify the essential tools for an actor. Relaxation, concentration, trust, courage, focus and imagination will all be challenged and expanded or refined.

Since an actor's instrument is their body, we will be getting very physical in class. Interaction both physically and emotionally with other students is essential to success in this course. We will do various physical exercises to warm up the body and explore its expressiveness.

TEXT: There is a text required for this course *Impro* by Keith Johnstone. We will discuss the book in class, but it is also a valuable tool to apply to other work throughout the semester. Periodically I will be handing out other reading material as well.

ATTIRE: Since physical activity is essential to working in this class students should dress in clothes that do not restrict movement. Footwear should be either sneakers or dance shoes-- no heels, platforms or open sandals. As the weather gets colder, it is recommended that students dress in layers for health and comfort. NO JEWELRY. Small post style earrings in pierced ears are acceptable. For scene presentations, students should suggest the character and situation as close as possible(not full costumes)

REQUIRED PERFORMANCES:

You are required to see at least one performance of the following productions:

GYPSY

October 26-29 November 2-4 in DOWD Mainstage Theatre.

COLO WAR COMEDY

December 5-9

You must submit a 3-5 page critique about the performance. The paper should NOT be a plot synopsis, but a reaction to this particular production of the play. Qualities and values discussed and presented in class should be observed and discussed as they relate to the production being critiqued. **GRADING:** Final grades will be determined in the following manner:

Attendance is mandatory. Students are allowed 2 absences for the semester. Opportunity to "makeun" or reschedule missed assignments or presentations will be at the discretion of the

instructor. Grades will be lowered for work not presented on time. Final grade will be lowered by .5 for each absence beyond two.

This course continues the "improv" techniques developed in Acting I but also stresses the use of text in scenes and monologues.
