This is a studio and study course designed to introduce the basic elements of Acting technique and begin to develop each individual's acting instrument. This course provides a strong foundation for a student who wishes to develop a professional acting ability and will bolster confidence, effectiveness in social situations, perceptions of human interaction and physical expression

Through various exercises, assignments and scene work we will identify the essential tools for an actor. Relaxation, concentration, trust, courage, focus and imagination will all be challenged and expanded or refined.

Since an actor's instrument is their body, we will be getting very physical in class. We will be adhering to social distancing guidelines and wearing masks in studio for all in person class meetings.

<u>ATTIRE:</u> Since physical activity is essential to working in this class students should dress in clothes that do not restrict movement. Footwear should be either sneakers or dance shoes-- no heels, platforms or open sandals. As the weather gets colder, it is recommended that students dress in layers for health and comfort. NO JEWELRY. Small post style earnings in pierced ears are acceptable.

### Performance Video assignment

You will be given videos to watch online about acting and actors approach to the work. You will also be assigned a recording of a full performance to watch. A three to five-page paper will be required, addressing the ideas of character, objective, obstacle, tactics and how the specific actors express those in their work.

Attendance is mandatory. Students are allowed 2 absences for the semester. Missing class on a scheduled presentation will significantly lower the grade for that assignment. An assignment may not be "made up" after a second missed presentation.

#### PHYSICALTY:
