The Environment Some Incredible facts



Without doubt, most people will have heard about the Amazon, it's rainforests and rivers, but will have little perception of just 'how big' and just how 'important' this part of our planet is. From the simply awe inspiring 'Pantanal' to the wonders of the 'Guinea Shield, this part of our 'being' is one in which we need to be in tune with. The **Amazon** rainforest, also known in English as Amazonia

is a moist broadleaf tropical rainforest in the Amazon biome that covers most of the Amazon basin of South America. This basin encompasses **c.2,300,000 sq m** [25 times larger than the UK] of which 2,100,000 sq m are covered by the rainforest. This region includes territory belonging to **nine** nations.

The majority of the forest is contained within Brazil, with 60% of the rainforest, followed by Peru with 13%, Colombia with 10%, and with minor amounts in Venezuela, Ecuador, Bolivia, Guyana, Suriname and French Guiana. Four nations have "Amazonas" as the name of one of their first-level administrative regions, and France uses the name "Guiana Amazonian Park" for its rainforest protected area. The Amazon represents over half of the planet's remaining rainforests and comprises the largest and most biodiverse tract of tropical rainforest in the world, with an estimated 390 billion individual trees divided into 16,000 species.

Fact: The Amazon basin contains the largest number of freshwater fish species in the world -- more than **c.5,000 species**. The Amazon has some **1,100** tributaries, **17** of which are over 1000 miles long.

Interestingly, of all the species of fish 40% are sp. Catfish.

BUT the Amazon continues to be under threat, illegal gold mining, deforestation, species loss, habitat compromise, social impacts, the water cycle, climate, the list goes on.
