Sunday School Lesson: Psalm 23 (part 3)

Today's HOPE (main point): We can find comfort in our our Shepherd who restores us and leads us.

This month's theme has been COMFORT, and we've been looking at Psalm 23 to see how the Lord is our shepherd- how He guides us, leads us, and comforts us.

So let's start by reciting (or reading) the first 4 verses of Psalm 23 and then review what we've learned.

The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want.

- 2 He maketh me to lie down in green pastures: he leadeth me beside the still waters.
- 3 He restoreth my soul: he leadeth me in the paths of righteousness for his name's sake.
- 4 Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil: for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff they comfort me.

We started with verse 4, talking about the shepherd's rod and staff, and then we backtracked to learn about the ways God provides for us and protects us.

What can you tell me about what we have learned so far? (take answers...give some time...may need a little prompting...)

Main points to bring up if no one can remember them: the rod is used for fighting off enemies, it symbolizes God's power and protection; the staff is



used to bring sheep back into the fold when they've wandered off, it symbolizes God's guidance and lovingkindness; God provides for our needs so that we lack nothing; sheep only lie down when all their needs have been met and they feel totally safe and at peace, only God can meet those needs for us and cause us to rest in Him; sheep need help finding pure water, God Himself is our living water in Jesus Christ.

Now let's go to verse 3. He restoreth my soul... The Old Testament was originally written in Hebrew, and the Hebrew word for restores helps us understand what David meant when he wrote this. In Hebrew, the word David used here means "to turn back, to bring back, to return to."

We've learned some interesting things about sheep so far, and there's another fact about sheep we should know as we consider this verse. Sheep often get themselves turned over on their backs and then cannot get up again by themselves. Once a sheep gets into this position, it struggles frantically with its feet up in the air, unable to stand up. As it struggles, gases begin to build up inside the sheep's stomach and then its circulation gets cut off. If not found quickly and stood back up, the sheep will die within a few hours or a few days, depending on the weather.

Sometimes, like sheep, we find ourselves on our backs, spiritually speaking. Let's look at how sheep end up on their backs so we can see if there's a connection to us.

Often sheep will end up on their backs because they chose a soft place to lie down. They choose a comfortable, soft, rounded hollow in the ground and then they roll over on their backs. What about us?



Sometimes in the Christian life, we look for the easy place, the comfortable place where we have no hardships or demand for endurance and self-discipline. There is great danger in that! When we do that, we can easily fall into the sin of pride, self-indulgence, and self-reliance.

There are two other reasons that sheep end up on their backs-- they have too much wool or they are too fat. When their fleece becomes too long and heavily matted down with mud and debris, it's much easier for them to end up on their backs. Being too fat has a similar effect; their extra weight makes them less agile and nimble on their feet.

This reminds me of what scripture says about being weighed down with sin. Hebrews 12:1 says, Therefore, since we also have such a great cloud of witnesses surrounding us, let's rid ourselves of every obstacle and the sin which so easily entangles us, and let's run with endurance the race that is set before us.

We can become weighed down with sin, with the cares of the world, with working too hard for material things...there are many things that can knock us off our feet and find us helplessly on our backs, like sheep.

When a shepherd finds a sheep on its back because it has too much wool, he will shear the sheep. And this is not a pleasant process; sheep don't like it! But it's necessary for their safety. If the sheep is too fat, the shepherd will take steps to adjust its diet and increase its activity. God will do the same for us when we are weighed down with sin. He will help us get rid of the things that are harming our souls.

Hebrews 12: 5-6 says, "My son, do not regard lightly the discipline of the Lord, Nor faint when you are punished by Him; For whom the Lord loves He disciplines, And He punishes every son whom He accepts."

Did you know that shepherd must constantly be on the lookout for sheep who have ended up on their backs? Because it can be so dangerous for them, the shepherd always counts his sheep and if one is missing, he immediately goes to look for it because time is of the essence once a sheep has landed on its back.

That understanding of a shepherd brings a new special significance to what Jesus said in Luke 15: 3-7...

Luke 15: 3-7 And so He told them this parable, saying, 4 "What man among you, if he has a hundred sheep and has lost one of them, does not leave the other ninety-nine in the [c]open pasture and go after the one that is lost, until he finds it? 5 And when he has found it, he puts it on his shoulders, rejoicing. 6 And when he comes home, he calls together his friends and his neighbors, saying to them, 'Rejoice with me, because I have found my sheep that was lost!' 7 I tell you that in the same way, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous people who have no need of repentance.

Jesus, our Good Shepherd, longs to find His lost sheep and to restore our souls!

Let's go the next part of Psalm 23, verse 3. What comes next? He restoreth my soul.....? (Wait for residents to recall or read next part...He leads me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake.)

Another thing I learned about sheep is that they are creatures of habit. When left to themselves, they will follow the same trails until they become ruts. They will graze the same paths until the grass is gone and the ground is barren. This results in the ground becoming filled with parasites that then infest the sheep. So the greatest single safeguard that a shepherd has in handling his flock is to keep them on the move.

Scripture makes it pretty clear that we are like sheep. God uses the metaphor all throughout the Bible. Isaiah 53:6 says, We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own way."


That means that we do what we want. I carry out my own ideas and act in the way I want to act. Just as sheep will blindly and habitually follow one another along the same paths until they are worn and barren, so we often insist on hanging on to the same habits and behaviors that we've seen are proven to destroy people's lives. Proverbs 14:12 says, "There is a way that seems right to a man, but in the end it leads to death."

Jesus, our Good Shepherd, says "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me." John 14:6 He will lead us in paths of righteousness if only we will follow.

What about when we don't want to follow? Sometimes, just like a sheep keeps gnawing at a favorite grazing spot, we have a favorite sin, something we don't really want to walk away from.

The good news is that God, through the Holy Spirit, will help us in those times. Sometimes we have to pray, "God help me to love you more! Help me to hate my sin." If we are earnest in our desire to obey, to follow Him, He will help us. Philippians 2:13 says, "For it is God who works in you to will and to act in order to fulfill his good purpose.

One of the best things about the gospel of Jesus Christ is that He will help us obey Him! He knows we can never be good enough on our own and we need help. The Spirit will help us obey by reminding us of scripture and by giving us endurance and encouragement.

Jesus Calls Us


- 1. Jesus calls us, o'er the tumult


