

and hard work over the past year. Anne, Justin Shepard, Laila ElBaghdadi, Rachel Milne, Char Levesque and a group of enthusiastic summer students have been the face of CVRC in the community. It is important that we acknowledge that they are



seeing an increasing complexity in community needs, and that they too are impacted by the successes, challenges, and tragedies within that community.

Thank you also to the Executive Committee and Board members for their support of CVRC. We continue to make progress in important areas including financial management, policy review and strategic planning.

To generate the revenue to support CVRC programming, it takes a lot of time and energy on the part of treasurer Ann Barrett-Mazerolle, Anne and the staff to prepare successful applications for funding from multiple doners in an increasingly challenging financial environment. This year the Board approved new and/or revised polices on Personal Information Protection, Incident Reporting, First Aid and Hours of Work. Various community organizations partner with us to help meet the needs of the community. Organizations such as the Saint John Family Resource Centre, North End Food Bank Association, Saint John Newcomers Centre, UNB SJ Promise Partnership and Horizon Health are key collaborators and together we are building positive neighbourhood relationships.

For example, Emera New Brunswick has consistently supported the neighbourhood through donations to CVRC; NB Social Development who we work with to support and advance our newcomer and vulnerable population; and UCT Jack Kidd Council #755 who in 2023 nominated CVRC for the UCT Bridges of Friendship Award, only one award was given in Canada and CVRC was the winner. Finally, we could not do this without our board of directors; they guide us, they advise us, they listen to us, and they collaborate with us to be better.

#### **Neighbourhood Navigator**

The Neighbourhood Developer project ended in May 2023 with the GSJ Community Foundation. However, funding was found through the Department of Social Development, the position has been retitled the "Neighbourhood Navigator", and the program was expanded to include all five priority neighbourhoods in Saint John.

## In 2023:

- ✓ 2023 marked the fifth season of CVRC's community garden project, **The Growing Place.** 
  - All plots (68) were used, with over a dozen gardeners on the waitlist.
  - 185 lbs of produce was grown in four designated plots and donated to the North End Food Bank, however, much was discarded while awaiting AIM fire test results.
  - Two summer students cared for the garden and held recreational, literacy and craft events for children over a 12 week period. Two educational workshops were hosted.

#### ✓ OTHER FOOD SECURITY INITIATIVES:

- **1198** take-out healthy breakfasts were served.
- Emergency Food pack/food supplement program assisted **756 people.**
- As a Centre, purchased 18 Food Purchasing Club produce packs for distribution at no charge to families.
- **1772 lunches/snacks** provided to Summer Squad participants.
- A total of **3289 participants** in food security programs.

#### ✓ SAINT JOHN BIKE SHARE PROGRAM

 Received, repaired, and redistributed over 1000 bikes and helmets for residents throughout the city since the program's inception.

#### √ FAMILY LITERACY ACTIVITIES

- In 2023, there were **1741** participants in literacyrelated events and activities such as Activity Books, giveaways, Summer Squad, resume building, community library, and seasonal events.
- Distributed over 250 books, and 75 puzzles, toys and board games, and 661 literacy kits/treat bags.
- Library services utilized over 115 times.
- Resume services utilized over 50 times.
- Summer Squad, community garden game and literacy events saw **300** participants.
