

Executive Director's Report

It is gratifying to know that after seventeen years the Crescent Valley Resource Centre (CVRC) is still relevant and active in the neighbourhood. Our work benefits not only CV families but the broader community, too.

Through our programs and services, and the strong staff connections with residents, individuals and families have more opportunities to enhance their well-being and enjoy a trusted support network.

Activities such as the Crescent Valley Running Club, bi-weekly bingo, resident-led art club, and neighbourhood pot-luck gatherings are examples of how the CVRC acts as a catalyst to enhance positive experiences for neighbourhood residents. Residents met with community partners at CVRC to address concerns in the neighbourhood. Programs such as our family literacy events attracted parents and other family members to enjoy reading books, playing board games, doing puzzles and craft activities, and gathering as a



community. Through our food security initiatives, and a partnership with the North End Food Bank Association, we supported residents' nutrition needs. Initiatives such as the Saint John Bike Share Program and the Growing Place Community Garden are used by folks from throughout the city. We are thrilled that partners such as UNBSJ Promise Partnership, Horizon Health, Saint John Family Resource Centre, and Saint John Newcomers Centre choose to bring their programs to the CVRC - thus meeting residents where they are.

I want to thank all who have contributed to CVRC through generous donations, grants, and other support; your efforts are essential in keeping the CVRC run effectively. Our Board of Directors plays a key role in the success of the CVRC, and my sincere thanks goes to them. In 2024 they were integral in reworking our strategic plan to create a document that guides our work.

The amazing staff of the CVRC work tirelessly to create a welcoming gathering spot in the neighbourhood. In 2024 **112** Income Tax Returns were prepared for residents, ensuring they would receive the benefits they are entitled.

In 2024:

- ✓ FOOD SECURITY INITIATIVES: Healthy Breakfast, Emergency Food Packs, Food Purchasing Club, Summer Squad Snacks & Meals, Family Drop-in Playgroup Snacks, The Growing Place - Community Garden & Greenhouse, Costco Partnership - Weekly Food Donations for Residents
 - 1109 take-out healthy breakfasts provided.
 - Emergency Food pack/food supplement program assisted **200** individuals.
 - As a Centre, purchased 25 Food Purchasing Club produce packs for distribution at no charge to area families.
 - **1472** lunches/snacks provided to Summer Squad participants.
 - A total of 2806 participants accessed food security programs.

✓ SAINT JOHN BIKE SHARE PROGRAM

- Received, repaired, and redistributed over 1000 bikes and helmets for residents throughout the city since the program's inception.
- In 2024, **175** bikes were repaired and given out through the Saint John Bike Share Program.

✓ FAMILY LITERACY

- 2456 literacy program participants, and 376 books lent to 329 library patrons.
- 76 resume building services and assistance appointments.
- "Winter Squad" Christmas break camp & "March Break Hang Out" camp for children aged 6-12, (educational crafts, games, activities and reading).
- Summer Squad summer camp for children 6-12 yrs.
- Community Garden Drop-In summer events for children, **3 x week**, including story tent.
- **Daily**, informal kids/teen drop-ins to play games, other activities and completing volunteer work.
- Themed surprise bag "giveaways" for Christmas, Halloween, Easter, and Eid.
- Earth Day sunflower growing kit giveaway.
- Mother's Day / Valentine's Day card making events.
- 8 Book Giveaway events for various ages.
- Board game nights for all ages.
- 18 Bingo sessions for adults.
