

GRAND KNIGHT'S REPORT

DEACON'S TEACHING By Deacon Chris Christopher

Can Catholics Be Buried in Non-Catholic Cemeteries?

The two sections I found in the Code of Canon Law dealing with Catholics being buried in cemeteries are cited below. I will then try and apply them real life situations:

- Can. 1180 §1. If a parish has its own cemetery, the deceased faithful are to be buried there, unless another cemetery has lawfully been chosen by the deceased person, or by those in charge of that person's burial. §2. All may, however, choose their cemetery of burial unless prohibited by law doing so.
- **Can. 1240 §1.** Where possible the Church is to have its own cemeteries, or at least an area in public cemeteries, which is duly blessed and reserved for the deceased faithful.
 - **§2.** If, however, this is not possible, then individual graves are to be properly blessed in due form on each occasion.

Can. 1180: The statement, "If a parish has its own cemetery, the deceased faithful are to be buried there..." is not intended to restrict the ability of the faithful to choose where they will be buried. Rather, it is meant to ensure that they will be able to be buried in the parish cemetery, i.e., the pastor is to grant permission for and preference to parishioners over non-parishioners if room is limited, etc. It is not meant to limit the ability of the faithful to choose their place of burial, as is made explicit by the remainder of this canon. The ability of each person to choose the cemetery in which he will be buried is expressly protected as long as no other law is being violated.

The reference to other prohibitions by law appears to refer to particular laws that may exist in specific countries or dioceses. The Church's universal law does not appear to contain any such prohibitions.

So, the faithful have the ability to choose their place of burial, and it does not have to be a Catholic cemetery. They are free to be buried in their family plot unless something else intervenes, which is highly unlikely if you just want to be buried with your family.

Sometimes people are concerned about whether they should be buried in "consecrated ground," such as is found in a Catholic cemetery. While their graves can be blessed, which is desirable, it is not a sacrament and will not affect one's eternal destiny. It is a way that the Church intervenes on behalf of the dead to implore God's blessing on them. It is not, however, something available only in Catholic cemeteries.

Can. 1240: So, in the case of a Catholic being buried in a plot that belongs to a non-Catholic family, the thing to do would be to simply have that person's grave blessed (the rite for this is found in the Order of Christian Funerals—the Church text used in this case). So one need not scruple on this point.

If one feels that it is best to be buried with their family, the Church's law provides for this. It is understandable to want to be buried with one's family, who may not be Catholic and are buried elsewhere, so that after death your extended family members may still visit your grave, take care of it, and remember you. It's a way of maintaining a connection with those you have left behind.

One might get some extra prayer if buried in a Catholic cemetery, but the Church prays for all of the departed, regardless of where they are buried. Also, one might get more prayer from non-Catholic relatives than one thinks. The heart knows things about the way to the dead that the head sometimes doesn't. Non-Catholic family members often talk, i.e., pray *to* departed loved ones—out loud—even though it isn't part of their theological tradition. It's only natural to also ask God to help, be merciful to one's departed loved one.

There is also the fact that *not* being buried with one's family could send a very confusing signal to them. In at least some cases it could be taken as a rejection of the family. That might not be rational, but people do get irrational at funeral time. For a person in that state of mind, it would be evangelistically unwise to set up a Catholic Church vs. the family paradigm in the minds of the bereaved.

It is fair to say that this is a complex and sensitive subject, with decisions being best made by those most involved and with the most knowledge of their own family situation. [Adapted from Jimmy Akin]

Blackwater Pyrates Annual Free Vessel Examination Day Saturday 20 May.

Whether your vessel is motor, wind or man powered, the Blackwater Pyrates - in conjunction with the US Coast Guard Auxiliary – is sponsoring a free water vessel examination day on <u>Saturday 20 May from 9 am to 12 pm at Carpenter's Park</u> and <u>Russell Harbor</u> boat landings in Milton.

Vessels passing the inspection will receive a sticker for the vessel acknowledging the pass. As this is **not** a law enforcement inspection, vessels not passing will be given a checklist of deficiencies, but **not** a citation. Within reason, deficiencies will be corrected free of charge by the Auxiliary and Blackwater Pyrates on the spot.

Council 7027 Awards Scholarships


Every year Council 7027 Awards three college scholarships to deserving high school seniors who are members of St. Rose of Lima Parish. This is an ongoing awards program, funded and budgeted for by the Council and awarded through a selection committee of eight brother Knights.

Meeting as a committee for a three hour examination of the applications, the three required parts of each application are graded individually by each of the eight committee members. The three scholarship winners are determined by averaging the scores awarded by each committee member for each parts of the applicant. To make the selection as fair as possible, all identification on the application documents is redacted so that the evaluations process is totally anonymous and equal for all. The three scholarship winners for 2017 are:

Olivia G. Surdel from Pace High School awarded \$1,400 Ashley T. McCormick from Milton High School awarded \$1,300 Haley M. Scott from Milton High School awarded \$1,300

These are three outstanding young members of our parish and are most deserving of these scholarships. It should be noted, however, that there were two other applications examined by the committee and their credentials were equally impressive. But, the selection process indicted that the three winners collected more points during the evaluation process. All applications were competitive and the final scoring was very close.

Congratulations to all the fine high school seniors who took the time and made the effort to submit an applications. A particular note of congratulations to the three winners of our 2017 Scholarships. We only wish we could have recognized all of our applicants with a scholarship.


