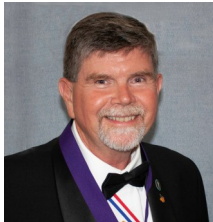

Deacon's Teaching

Ordinary Time Between Christmas And Lent

When we think of the Church's yearly cycle, we typically think of the two 'great seasons' of Advent/Christmas and Lent/Easter. These seasons celebrate what could be thought of as the "main events," namely, the incarnation, birth, passion, death, resurrection, ascension of Jesus, and the descent of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. But there is also a third important season called Ordinary Time.

Technically, Ordinary Time has two parts but it remains one season. The short first part begins right after the Christmas Season and runs until the day before Ash Wednesday (when Lent begins). The second part begins the Monday after Pentecost and runs until the First Sunday of the next Advent.

Ordinary Time (Latin *tempus per annum*) is just like any other season in the liturgical calendar; it celebrates very specific times in the life of our Lord: his earthly ministry, major events of the Gospels, the miracles, the parables, the calling of the twelve, the sermon on the mount, the bread of life discourse, etc. We get all that and more during this season.

Ordinary Time is not something plain, unimpressive, or unexciting as the word is used today. Its weeks are so identified because they are numbered. The Latin word "*ordinalis*" stems from the word '*ordo*' from which we get the English word order, meaning 'numbered' or 'ruled', and refers to numbers in a series. We call them ordinal numbers and thus its weeks are ranked in order: The Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, The Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, The Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time, etc. Thus, the numbered weeks of Ordinary Time represent the ordered life of the Church—the period in which we live our lives neither in feasting (as in the Christmas and Easter seasons) nor in more severe penance (as in Advent and Lent), but in watchfulness and expectation of the Second Coming of Christ. The Gospel for the Second Sunday of Ordinary Time always features either John the Baptist's acknowledgment of Christ as the Lamb of God, or Christ's first miracle—the transformation of water into wine at the wedding of Cana.

Ordinary Time is that part of the year in which Christ, the Lamb of God, walks among us and transforms our lives. There's nothing "ordinary" about that!

As a side note, in total there are 33 or 34 weeks in Ordinary Time depending on how some of the feasts fall during the year. There is a 1st Week of Ordinary Time but no 1st Sunday of Ordinary Time because when the Christmas Season ends, the Sunday following it is always the feast of the Baptism of the Lord.

The normal liturgical color for Ordinary Time is green (for those days when there is no special feast) and represents hope - like the hope we feel when we see the first buds in springtime. Green vestments and altar cloths have traditionally been associated with the time after Pentecost, the period in which the Church founded by the risen Christ and enlivened by the Holy Spirit began to grow and to spread the Gospel to all nations.

The message to us is to use Ordinary Time in applying what we learned during the two 'great seasons' to our everyday lives. We are called to grow in holiness by following the examples our Lord and Savior gave us during his lifetime as a human being.

According to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, "*The Sundays and weeks of Ordinary Time, on the other hand, take us through the life of Christ. This is the time of conversion. This is living the life of Christ. Ordinary Time is a time for growth and maturation, a time in which the mystery of Christ is called to penetrate ever more deeply into history until all things are finally caught up in Christ.*" Thus the goal, toward which all of history is directed, is represented by the final Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe.

Like all liturgical seasons, Ordinary Time is meant to be lived! We're not to be passive receptors of the liturgy – or at least we shouldn't be. We are called to be active participants! Participating in Ordinary Time means participating in the everyday life of Jesus.

Next month we'll take a brief look at the **Season of Lent.**

12 Days of CHRISTMAS

There is one Christmas Carol that had always baffled me. What in the world do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans, and especially the partridge that won't come out of the pear tree have to do with Christmas?

From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of their Church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember.

1. The partridge in a pear tree is Jesus Christ. Christ is symbolically presented as a mother partridge which feigns injury to decoy predators from her helpless nestlings, much in memory of the expression of Christ's sadness over the fate of Jerusalem: *"Jerusalem! Jerusalem! How often would I have sheltered thee under my wings, as a hen does her chicks, but thou wouldst not have it so..."*

2. Two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments.

3. Three French hens stood for Faith, Hope and Love, the three theological virtues.

4. The four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke & John, or the four evangelists.

5. The five golden rings recalled the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament.

6. The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.

7. Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit, Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel (right judgment), Fortitude (courage), Knowledge, Piety (reverence), and Fear of the Lord (wonder and awe), or the seven sacraments.

8. The eight maids-a-milking were the eight beatitudes.

9. Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit--Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self Control.

10. The ten lords-a-leaping were the Ten Commandments.

11. The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.

12. The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.

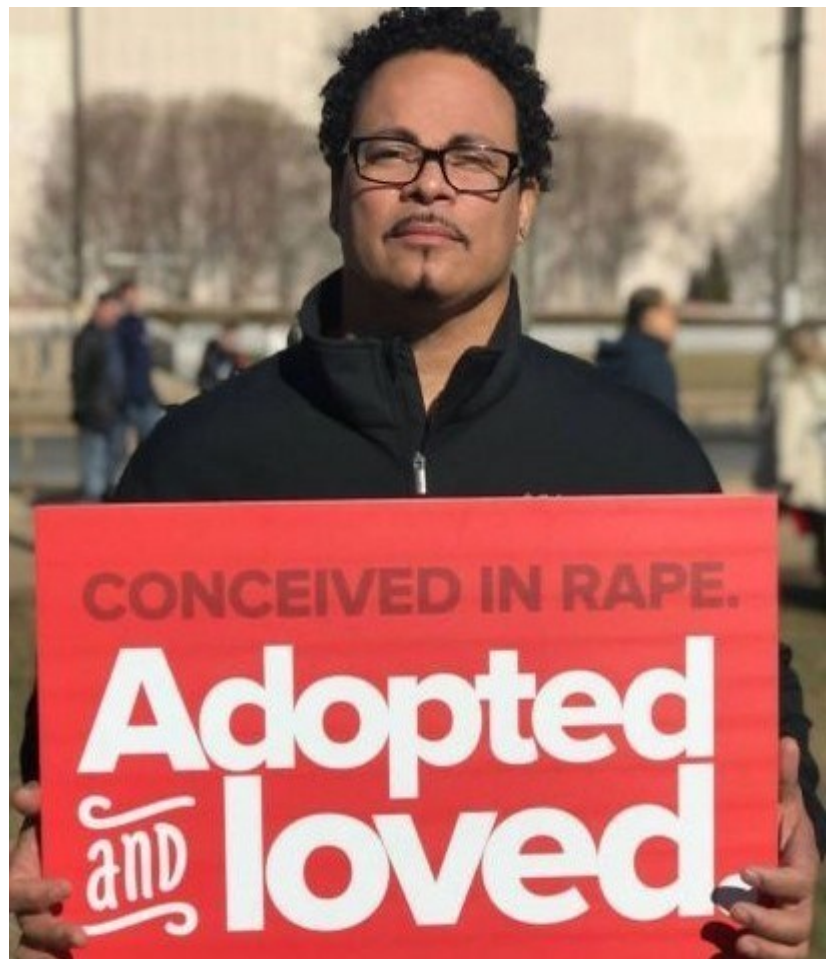
