Red James was a charter member of Council 7027. He was one of the earliest Grand Knights and then went on to serve as Financial Secretary. Through Red's generosity, both our council and Saint Rose of Lima Church obtained land parcels on which to operate.

Deacon's Teaching

All Hallow's Eve

The word "Halloween" is a Scottish shortening of the phrase, "Allhallow-even,"

phrase, "Allhallow-even," meaning "All Holy Evening," which dates to the 18th century. The English have a similar phrase, "All Hallows' Eve," with the same meaning. Both phrases denote the night before All Saints Day, November 1.

Known for its pagan beginnings, Halloween is mixed with Christian elements. Some of those pagan roots are attributed to the Celtic celebration of *Samhain*, the cult of the dead in the British Isles which existed prior to the Roman invasion in 46 A.D. Although little is known about these celebrations, it seems that the *Samhain* festivities observed a one-week series of events ending with "the feast of the dead" that marked the beginning of the new Celtic year. During this feast, the Druids communicated with their ancestors hoping to be guided in this life toward immortality.

Through Halloween's evolution over time, today's celebration has little to do with its religious beginnings. Elements have been added like costumes for the celebration of All Saints' Day in France during the 14th-15th centuries. During this period, Europe was stricken by the Black Death, which inspired a great fear of death. Masses were multiplied for the Faithful Dead, and many satirical representations appeared to remind people of their mortality.

The veil between the world of the living and the world of the dead was considered thin. Therefore, on All Hallow's Eve the souls of the dead were thought to come back to earth and walk among the living. It was believed that on that day souls of the dead could return to their homes, so people dressed in costumes and

lit bonfires to ward off those spirits.

The commemoration of canonized saints, especially the martyrs, appeared in various areas throughout the Church after the legalization of Christianity in A.D. 313. The primary reason for establishing these feast days was the desire to honor the great number of Christians martyred during the persecution of Emperor Diocletian. Sts. Ephrem and John Chrysostom attest to this in their preaching during the 3rd and 4th centuries.

While some have connected Halloween to earlier pagan celebrations, All Hallow's Eve has its origins in Catholicism. All-Saints' Day was fully established in the early 7th century under Pope Boniface IV (ruled 608-615) who consecrated Rome's Pantheon as a church in honor of the Virgin Mary and all the Martyrs. Pope Gregory IV (827-844) promulgated All Saints' Day in 837 and moved it to November 1.

How one spent the vigil of All Saints Day depended on where one lived in Christendom. It was in Ireland and Scotland and England that All Hallow's Eve became a combination of prayer and merriment.

Begging at the door grew from an ancient English custom of knocking at doors to beg for a *soul cake* in return for which the beggars promised to pray for the dead of the household. It is said that *soul cakes*, a form of shortbread and sometimes quite fancy with currants for eyes, became more important for the beggars than prayers for the dead.

In Scotland and Ireland, <u>guising</u> – children dis<u>guised</u> in costume going from door to door for food or coins – is a traditional Halloween custom. As recorded in Scotland, at Halloween in 1895 where masqueraders in disguise carrying lanterns

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made from scooped out turnips. They visited homes and were rewarded with cakes, fruit, and money.

The practice of *guising* at Halloween in North America is first recorded in 1911, where a newspaper in <u>Kingston, Ontario</u>, Canada, reported children going "*guising*" around the neighborhood. Another reference to ritual begging on Halloween appears in 1915 with a third reference in Chicago in 1920. The earliest known use in print of the term *trick or treat* appears in 1927 in the Blackie Herald of <u>Alberta</u>, Canada.

Halloween postcards between the turn of the 20th century and the 1920s commonly show children but not *trick-or-treating*. *Trick-or-treating* does not seem to have become a widespread practice in North America until the 1930s.

In England from the medieval period up until the 1930s, people practiced the Christian custom of *souling* on Halloween that involved groups of *soulers*, both Protestant and Catholic, going from <u>parish</u> to parish, begging the rich for *soul cakes*, in exchange for <u>praying</u> for the souls of the givers and their friends. In the Philippines, the practice of *souling* is called <u>Pangangaluwa</u> and is practiced on All Hallow's Eve among children in rural areas. People drape themselves in white cloths to represent souls and then visit houses, where they sing in return for prayers and sweets.

By the first decade of the 20th century Halloween was gradually

assimilated into American society and was celebrated coast to coast by people of all social, racial, and religious backgrounds.

A modern variant of trick-or-treating is *trunk-or-treating*, or Halloween tailgating. Children are offered treats from the trunks of cars parked in a church parking lot, or sometimes, a school parking lot. In a *trunk-or-treat* event, the <u>trunk</u> of each automobile is decorated with a certain theme, such as children's literature, movies, scripture, or <u>job roles</u>. *Trunk-or-treating* has grown in popularity due to its perception as being more safe than going door to door as well as solving the rural conundrum in which homes are built a halfmile apart.

Like Christmas and Easter, Halloween is another Catholic custom that has been usurped by modern culture and mainstream media and turned into something that rarely reflects its religious angle.

Catholics celebrate Halloween and are encouraged to use the day to reflect on Christ's triumph over sin, death, and the devil, and to give honor to the saints in heaven. But they should also know the history and origins of the holiday. At the same time, it's incumbent on the press to cover the Halloween story in a more complete manner.

RESPECT LIFE MONTH STATEMENT October 2021

Most Reverend Joseph F. Naumann Chairman, U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops' Committee on Pro-Life Activities

The month of October brings with it our annual observance of Respect Life Month. As part of the Year of St. Joseph declared by Pope Francis, this year's celebration highlights the example of that great saint.

As the faithful protector of both Jesus and Mary, we find in St. Joseph a profound reminder of our own call to welcome, safeguard, and defend God's precious gift of human life.

Despite the mysterious circumstances surrounding Mary's pregnancy, St. Joseph took her into his home at the word of the angel. He guided their journey to Bethlehem, found shelter, and welcomed the infant Jesus as his son. When Herod threatened the life of the Christ Child, St. Joseph left his homeland behind and fled with Jesus and Mary to Egypt.

Like St. Joseph, we are also called to care for those God has entrusted to us—especially vulnerable mothers and children. We can follow in the footsteps of St. Joseph as protector by advocating against taxpayer-funded abortion, which targets the lives of millions of poor children and their mothers here in the United States. We can imitate his care and provision by helping to start *Walking with Moms in Need* at our parishes, "walking in the shoes" of mothers experiencing a difficult pregnancy, especially low-income mothers in our communities.

At times, we may feel uncertain of our ability to answer the Lord's call. But He invites us to faithfully respond, despite our own fears or weaknesses: "My grace is sufficient for you, for power is made perfect in weakness" (2 Cor 12:9).

May we imitate St. Joseph's faithful trust and courage as we work to uphold the dignity of every human life. St. Joseph, defender of life, pray for us!

The Pro-Life Flag



While simple, the design of the Pro-Life Flag is highly symbolic of the pro-life message.

- The white background symbolizes non-violence in the womb as well as the innocence of the unborn child.
- The two baby feet represent the humanity of the unborn child. Baby feet have been a symbol associated with the pro-life movement since the iconic Precious Feet lapel pins were named the international pro-life symbol in 1979.
- The two pink hands represent the pregnant mother, holding and protecting her child.
- The white heart in between the feet symbolizes the pro-life movement's love for both the mother and her child.
- The circle shape formed by the hands evoke imagery of a pregnant mother's growing belly: a safe, secure, protected place for a developing child.
- The two stripes again emphasize the TWO distinct human lives present in a pregnancy. The stripes also form an "equals sign," stressing that the unborn child is equally and fully human, and therefore deserving of equal human rights. The stripes can also represent the role of both the father and mother in creating and raising a child.
- The colors blue and pink mean different things to different people. Traditionally, they have been the colors associated with baby boys and girls, but the two distinct colors also reemphasize the two lives present in a pregnancy: mother and child.

But here, Jesus gives that thinking a twist: If we want to be great in the kingdom of heaven, we must embrace humility and become servants. We must not seek headlines, but rather give of ourselves for the sake of others, for the common good. My brothers, let us forgo seeking earthly glory in favor of being selfless "team players" in building the kingdom of heaven.

This month, I challenge you to watch the "Leadership" episode of the Into the Breach video series and use the study guide to reflect on what true humility and service look like. Second, I challenge you to participate in the Faith in Action Soccer Challenge or Free Throw Championship program.

Questions for Reflection: Do you seek personal glory at the expense of others? Do you put your gifts at the service of God and your neighbor, or do you use them primarily to achieve praise and gain in this life? What is one concrete act you can do to grow in humility and give of yourself to others?
