
In my travels around the area I often run into people who know the Knights of Columbus from our good works in the parish or community, our disaster

Deacon's Teaching By Deacon Chris Christopher

Is the Eucharist Truly the Body and Blood of Christ?

The Real Presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist is confirmed through the literal

interpretation of St. John's Gospel, 6:30-63, commonly known as "The Bread of **Life Discourse."** Jesus here promises to give his Body and Blood as our food and drink. This teaching is also found in four other accounts of the Last Supper (Mt. 26:26; Mk. 14:22; Lk. 22:14; 1 Cor. 11:23). From these scriptures it follows that Christ is present by "transubstantiation," the entire substance of bread and wine is changed into the glorified Body and Blood of Christ, retaining only the "accidents" of taste, color, and shape of the bread and wine.

This Bread of Life Discourse explains what the Bread of Life is and its implications, but it is not the institution of the Sacrament Eucharist – that occurred on Holy Thursday at what is called the Last Supper.

Jesus' Discourse on the Bread of life came just after the miracle of Feeding the Five Thousand while He was speaking in the synagogue in Capernaum. In this teaching moment He had to explain three times that He is literally "the bread of *life"* -- and each time he had to get a little more forceful in his language because his listeners were openly refusing to believe him.

1, Jn. 6:32-43: At first, He gently breaks the news that He is the Bread come down from heaven. But his audience murmured against him disputing his coming down from heaven because they said they knew his mother and father; how could he come down from heaven? Picking up on this, Jesus said, "Stop your murmuring..."

#2, Jn. 6:47-52: Jesus then ups the ante in saying He is the living bread come down from heaven and who ever eats this bread will live forever, saying "... and the bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world." On hearing this, the Jews didn't just murmur, but quarreled among themselves in asking, "How can this man give [us] his flesh to eat?"

#3, Jn. 6:53-58: Exasperated, and to make sure that his listeners had no misunderstanding of what He was teaching, Jesus had to resort to very clear, crude, and earthy language, "Amen, amen, I say to you...Who ever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day."

It's interesting to note in this third section that the verb *eats* is not the classical Greek verb of a human eating, but that of an animal eating: "munch" and "gnaw". In wanting to make sure that he was not speaking metaphorically or symbolically to his audience, Jesus had to resort to very crude, unmistakable earthy language.

Further, when many of his listeners said, "This saying is hard; who can accept it?" and walked away, He didn't call them back to explain the teaching in more palatable language (Jn. 6:60)

It must be understood that without accepting the urgings of the Holy Spirit, one cannot come to accept Jesus' teaching in this Bread of Life Discourse. And the same can be said at the institution of the Eucharist on Holy Thursday, when after saying the blessing, Jesus broke the bread, gave it to his disciples and said, "Take and eat; this is



my body." Then taking the cup of wine He said, "Drink from it, all of you, for this is my blood of the covenant which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins."

One cannot approach the Eucharist with a materialistic mentality; if we do, we fail to appreciate that with God there is no past or future, He exists in the eternal present. And so it is with Jesus when we receive his Body & Blood, soul

and divinity, that He instituted at the Last Supper when He commanded his disciples to repeat it in his memory, "Do this in remembrance of me."

What happens at the altar during the consecration of the bread and wine in becoming the body and blood of Christ is a miracle, a great mystery instituted by God for his children.

This month, I challenge you to pray every day as an individual or as a family, asking the intercession of Blessed Michael McGivney to live in a more prayerful home, perhaps using the prayer for his canonization. Second, I challenge you to assist your council in the Faith in Action Family Prayer Night or Family Week program, incorporating devotions to Father McGivney into your efforts. Questions for Reflection: Do you maintain good and regular habits of prayer in your home? Where is there room for improvement in your family prayer life? What is one specific thing you could do to deepen your own prayer life?



"It was 1960 when a group of young men who were members of the Knights of Columbus, it was council 2312 in Monterrey Mexico, wanted to find a new and special way for their Knights' council to celebrate the appearance of the Blessed Virgin Mary to Juan Diego, which had taken place in 1531 hundreds of years earlier but had radically changed the lives of the people of Mexico. The Knights came up with the idea of running a rose to the Basilica of Our Lady of Guadalupe. The Rose was chosen to commemorate the roses that the Blessed Virgin asked Juan Diego to gather from the frozen earth on the top of Tepeyac Hill. He found at the top of the hill a miraculous garden with roses that were not native to the area. He placed the roses in his cloak, his tilma, and he returned to Our Lady and Juan Diego explained that Our Lady then arranged the roses in his cloak. When he opened his cloak in front of the Bishop Zumarraga who wanted proof of the visitation of the

Blessed Virgin, the Bishop did not believe him. The roses poured out onto the floor and there inside the tilma, the cloak, was this remarkable portrait and image of Our Lady and image that you and I, we all know now today as the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe. This apparition then led to the massive conversion of the Mexican people who prior to this visitation were disinterested in the church and disinterested and uninvolved in faith. The Silver Rose, which will be visiting our parish tomorrow, is a token of faith and love for God, for His mother who said yes when asked to become the mother of our savior. It continues to travel throughout the United States and the Silver Rose ... will arrive on the feast day of Juan Diego on December the 9th at the shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe Basilica in Mexico."
