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

Tempus fugit – Time Flies. Lent is upon us already. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fasting and abstinence from meat, and other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence from meat. Please see the information from the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops included in this newsletter for more information on the requirements for fasting and abstinence.

Lent is a time of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Frequently, the topic of giving something up for Lent comes up. One of the best explanations I've heard talked about this in terms of penance. Our offerings serve as reparations for our sins and the sins of others, and help strengthen our self-control in order to do God's will. At Easter, we should be further along on our faith journey than we were at Ash Wednesday.

Our **planning meeting** will be on Thursday, March **3**, at 7 pm. We have several activities and events to plan, and your input is important and very welcome.

Our **regular monthly meeting** will be on Thursday, March **10** at 7 pm. Please plan to participate in the meeting. In addition to our normal business, we will select our Knight of the Year and Family of the Year from among the knights and families of the month from April 2021 through March 2022. Please come to help choose the winners of these important awards!

Both the planning meeting and the regular monthly meeting are open to all knights, and both meetings are in-person and online. Please see the details elsewhere in this newsletter. Whether it's in person or online, please plan to share some time with your fellow knights.

March arrives and Lent begins on the very next day, March 2. We all know that Lent is the time of preparation for Easter. It begins on Ash Wednesday and ends with Holy Thursday. In order to prepare to celebrate the Lord's resurrection we are to exercise self-control and self-denial by fasting. We are encouraged to encounter Christ in the reading of Scripture and we are to serve others by the giving of alms.

When I was a kid, the "go to" self-denial was giving up chocolate...made those chocolate Easter bunnies most tasty! I think a lot of us are creatures of habit when it comes to self-denial. We continue on the same path, "giving up" the same things each year. Although self -denial is important as a practice, I've gotten a little older and a bit more introspective. I try to think of positive things to do rather than what I want to give up. Here are some of the things on a personal level that I'm going to try: Devote some time each day to reading Scripture. I'm not going to read whole books or commit to something I can't achieve, but for 10 minutes each day I'm going to read the Good Book. I think reading scripture every day is good habit to nurture.

Rather than "giving up" I'm going to try to "give away." It doesn't help anyone... other than me...if I give up chocolate again this year. But if I give away to the poor, that can have a positive effect on me and on someone else. God has blessed me with so many material blessings I can afford to part with some. And that includes money. I'm determined to be more generous this Lent.

As men of faith let's take advantage of some of the many program offerings during Lent. Some of these programs are done diocesan-wide, some at the local parish level, and many councils have special programs for prayer and reflection. If you are able perhaps you can lead or help lead a program at your council. I know for me, being involved with other men of faith strengthens me.

As we prepare spiritually for this new liturgical season of Lent, don't forget the temporal. Tempus fugit, memento mori! I am honored to carry on our blessed founder's vision of protecting Catholic families.

Deacon's Teaching By Deacon Chris Christopher Ash Wednesday and the Lenten Season

We again come to one of the two Great Seasons in the liturgical year, Lent/Easter [the other being Advent/

christmas] and it begins on Ash Wednesday, March 2nd this year.

Catholics, and many other Christians, will have ashes applied to their foreheads in the shape of a cross. People generally wear the ashes that symbolize penance, mourning, and mortality, throughout the day to publicly express their faith and penance.

Ashes are an appropriate expression of these nouns because they are "dirty". They humble us by reminding us that however proud we may be of ourselves, our accomplishments, and possessions, in the end as the words of the Ash Wednesday Rite include, "We are dirt, and to dirt we shall return." (Genesis 3:19) At the same time, having dirty faces reminds us that sin stains us, and we need to be cleansed of it through God's grace (Psalms 51:3-5, 9, 11-12).

The act of wearing the ashes is not a penance. Yes, we receive the ashes on a day of fasting, but they are merely a reminder that we will one day die, and that we must repent. When we receive the ashes, the words we hear either remind us that we will turn to dust or urge us to turn away from sin. Therefore, by publicly wearing ashes, we are not trying to draw attention to our fasting. Rather, we are reminding ourselves, and the world around us, of the importance of turning away from sin and that this life does not last forever. As the 2nd reading on Ash Wednesday proclaims, we cannot live as though we will never die. (2 Corinthians 5:20-6:2)

Regarding the season of Lent, why does the Church impose this 40 day 'burden' on us every year? After all, we know what it's all about after being through it so many times. Why should we set aside special days and seasons for these burdensome activities?

One answer would be that after the fall in the Garden, we became frail, fractured human beings easily succumbing to temptations of sin. In knowing this, Mother Church calls us back once a year to refocus our efforts on what it means to be a follower of Jesus and strive to grow in holiness so as to be with him in eternity. The Church recognizes that if we do not set aside time for these disciplines, many of us will

neglect them altogether and fall further away from being imitators of Christ. Mother Church knows best.

The message of this 'burden' - Prayer, Fasting, and Alms Giving - during Lent is that we should incorporate them in our daily lives to keep focused on our ultimate destiny. The value of prayer is immediately obvious. But why, one might ask, are fasting and almsgiving ways to holiness?

No discipline seems pleasant at the time, it's painful. Later, however, it produces a harvest of righteousness and peace for those who allow it to train them. When we make small sacrifices, such as giving up food and giving away alms, we detach ourselves from the things that we tend to love too much (EZ 16.49) - thus making more room in our lives for God.

In the life of ancient Israel, God himself set the precedent for designating special days for penance. Through Moses he commanded the people to observe an annual Day of Atonement (*Yom Kippur*) "on the tenth day of the seventh month..." Numbers 29:7 On this day, the people are to "mortify" themselves, that is, eat no food and do no work, so they could devote the day to repentance and prayer, asking God to cleanse them of their sins (Ly 16:29-34). In later times, the Jewish people set aside additional days and seasons of penitential fasting.

The practice of penitential days and seasons was continued by the early Christians (Acts 13:2-3) and became an established tradition in the Church. Lent, observed in the forty days before Easter, developed as a way of recalling our Lord's own forty days and nights of fasting in the wilderness while he prayed and battled with the Devil (Lk 4:1-13). Spiritually, Lent is not only a time for "giving up" something. It is a time for prayer and penance. Instead of "giving up" something, some people will benefit more by adding something...like a visit to church each day, or saying a prayer at the beginning of each day, or assisting a homebound person, etc. Sacrifice is only one way to prepare for Easter. Giving your time to God can be just as fulfilling.

Next month we'll look at **Holy Week and the Triduum.**



Deacon Chris Christopher's Retirement Talk

February 13, 2022 at Parish Breakfast in St. Rose of Lima Parish Hall

"Seventy is the sum of our years, or eighty if we are strong." Psalm 90 New American, Revised

I may have been strong at one time, but now that I am 80 I am not going to push it, nor tempt the Lord by asking for help to push it. One must be careful about what they pray...

I'm sure you've noticed that I've become a bit unsteady while navigating in the sanctuary during Mass. Fearing that I would embarrass folks by taking a tumble going up or down its steps, I've decided to step down rather than fall down. Therefore, I've decided to retire from my diaconal ministry, express my gratitude to God for letting me work in his vineyard, and let the Holy Spirit lead me where he will.

In 1993 I was admitted to the diaconal training program in England and was warmly welcomed by my British classmates. They not only 'took the mickie' out of me, British for 'teased me,' but affectionately referred to me as their "Token Yank."

Once ordained, I was also warmly accepted by my British parishioners and entered their parish and social life. The parish was made up of two rural churches, the largest of which on a good Sunday was attended by about 80 people – not families, individual souls. There was one priest and one deacon – me! But it was a wonderful experience because I was immersed in all aspects of parish life. Like Milton, rural England has few Catholics due to its religious history with King Henry VIII.

My wife Zee and I lived and worked in Europe for 37 years on US military bases. Upon retirement in June of 2004, I arrived in Milton; Zee remained in England one more year.

Not knowing a soul, I landed in Pensacola with two suitcases, rented a car, and got a room at the local Red Roof Inn. The next day I showed up at St. Rose of Lima and was warmly greeted by the office manager Connie Armstrong. Fr. Dennis O'Brian arrived a couple of months later.

My social life revolved solely around St. Rose of Lima and the Knights of Columbus. In the 18 years of living in Milton, the only addition to my social life was the Blackwater Pyrates. Other than the Pyrates, you all are the life around which my life revolves - and for which I have been grateful and blessed. I am honored by this

morning's expression of appreciation for my years here at St. Rose.

But it is with a very sad heart that I announce that we will be leaving Milton to live close to one of our daughters in Nashville, TN. At our ages, it is the prudent thing to do.

We don't know how much time it will take to make the move, but until our departure, I will be joining you in the pews.

I again thank you for so warmly welcoming this "Token Yank" to this parish and to Milton.


We will be receiving the Saint Joseph icon on March 7 through the 14th and have services surrounding the prayer week.




KnightCast – A New Video Series

Supreme Chaplain's Challenge by Archbishop William E. Lori

As they were about to part from him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good that we are here; let us make three tents, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." But he did not know what he was saying. ... Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my chosen Son; listen to him." (Gospel for March 13, Lk 9:33, 35)

Having witnessed the Transfiguration, the three apostles did not want to leave the mountaintop. But as the vision ends, God's voice directs them back to Jesus, who takes them back down the mountain. We might wish in our own lives for extraordinary experiences or "spiritual highs," but even if we are granted such experiences, we are not meant to cling to them. Brothers, may we be grateful for these enriching moments, if and when they come, but remember that we fulfill our God-given mission primarily within the daily duties of our ordinary lives.

Challenge by Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William E. Lori:

This month, I challenge you to withdraw from your normal routine each day to spend some time alone with God's word by reading and reflecting on the Gospels. Second, I challenge you to assist your council in planning for the Faith in Action Spiritual Reflection program.

Questions for Reflection:

Do you tend to seek one emotional religious experience after another, yet feel less motivated to live your faith in between these experiences? Do you recognize the Christian witness you must fulfill in your daily duties as a man, a husband, a father, and in your ordinary work and social interactions? Do you set aside time to participate in a spiritual retreat every now and then to reinvigorate your spiritual life?
