Notes from the Pastor's Desk



^{ESV} **Matthew 21:9** And the crowds that went before him and that followed him were shouting, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest!"

Crowds can be dangerous. They can be unpredictable, and amazingly easy to influence with just a little anxiety and fear.

Remember what happened in the wilderness, at the base of Mount Sinai, when the crowds were nervous about how long Moses was taking to come back? Remember how they convinced Aaron to take all the gold they had brought from Egypt to make a calf so they would have something to worship? They had just walked across the Red Sea on dry ground for crying out loud! In that light, we shouldn't be too surprised how the shouts of Palm Sunday with the Triumphant Entry turn to the shouts of murder and death in less than six days with the words "crucify him". Crowds have power. This is why the Pharisees feared them when they followed Jesus, and why Pilate ultimately gave in to their demands.

From a young age on the playground, in the halls of middle school to the football bleachers at high school we want to be associated with the right group. Perhaps you were not in the popular one, the athletic group, or the band. Perhaps your group was somewhere in between or even outside of the norm. But groups and crowds have always been a part of our lives. It even carried with us into adulthood in terms of where we work, who we socialize with, and even might travel with. We of course do it pronouncedly through our political association, who or what we vote for, and which commentators we watch on the television. Too often we allow these

crowds of people to determine our identity, shape our response to social issues, and even influence the words that come out of our mouths.

What crowds have shaped your life? Has your voice, once used to shout the Hosannas of Palm Sunday, been swayed by the world to condemn your neighbor, hurt your spouse, and separate you from the friends you once held dear? If you're anything like me, you can point to any number of times the crowd you found yourself in altered your voice and behavior by influencing you and your choices (Proverbs 13:20; Romans 12: 2, 16:17; 1 Corinthians 15:33). Sure, we aren't the people who yelled "crucify him" on that tearful Friday, but we do as much with our actions, our resentment, our snap judgments, and our self-preservation in the eyes of the world. We demand His death with our words and actions, and we do it easily without thought every day.

Crowds are dangerous, but they can also be a gift from God. Remember Exodus 17 when the nomadic tribe of Amalek came and attacked the people of Israel? Remember how Moses was instructed to raise up his staff, and when he did the people of Israel would prevail in the battle? It was in that battle that Moses was so tired he couldn't hold up his hands anymore, so Aaron and Hur stood by his side and held his hand up for him. They even got a rock for him to sit on and rest as they held his arms. They did this until the sun went down. Crowds, even if they are made up of just two or three individuals, can be the greatest blessing. They can speak to us words of encouragement (1 Thessalonians 5:11), pronounce our forgiveness when we desperately need it (2 Samuel 12:1-13), and even remind us of God's presence among us. Remember, when two or three are gathered in His name, there He is among them (Matthew 18:20).

Among the crowds of God's people, we are given the gift of confessing how we have often failed and attempted to run with the crowds of the world. We are given the gift of contemplating how we have demanded the death of our Lord in our sin. Yet our Lord in His mercy has paid the penalty of our sin and brought us into the company of His Kingdom where an unshakable eternal identity is given. As we wrap up the season of Lent and begin the season of standing in the rays of Easter Victory, let us remember the significance a crowd can make in our lives. Let us take inventory about what is influencing our heart and mind. How we have fallen into the trap of defining ourselves by the categories of this world seen in political affiliations, social groups, and even our chosen careers. Let us intentionally focus

on Palm Sunday and on Easter morning, rooting ourselves in the shouts of Hosanna and especially the comfort spoken to the crowd gathered at the empty tomb, “Why do you seek the living among the dead?” (Luke 24:5). May we regain our primary identity as being citizens of Heaven (Philippians 3:20), holding each other up in the sure confidence that comes from knowing that our Lord lives! To God be all the glory!



You'll want to check out some newly donated books from our Library AngelZ: the If I Run series: **IF I RUN**, **IF I'M FOUND** and **IF I LIVE** by Terri Blackstock, 813.54 Bla and the Guardians of Justice series: **FATAL JUDGMENT**, **DEADLY PURSUIT** and **LETHAL LEGACY** by Irene Hannon, 813.54 Han. We've also received **THE BEGINNING** by Beverly Lewis, 813.54 Lew, **THE SECOND HALF** by Lauraine Snelling, 813.54 and two adult DVDs: **BONHOEFFER, AGENT OF CHANGE** and **AMAZING GRACE**. These books and DVDs are located on the 2022 shelf.

LONG WALK TO WATER, A by Linda Sue Park, FIC Par. The author based this short story largely on the childhood experiences of Salva Dut, who was born in

Sudan. He now makes his U.S. home in Rochester, New York, where Ms. Park also lives. He was born in a small village in southern Sudan and he stayed in refugee camps in Ethiopia and Kenya for many years before he came to America.

COLLATERAL DAMAGE by Lynette Eason, 813.6 Eas. Bk 1 of the Danger Never Sleeps series. Taken from the back cover: “Honorably discharged from the Army after an explosion nearly killed her, former military psychiatrist Brooke Adams has set up shop to help others, but her days of helping military personnel is over. She’s got her own battles to fight from her time overseas, and she’s not equipped to take on more...Former Army Special Ops Sergeant First Class Asher James could handle anything that the war sent his way. The only thing that scares him now is sleep. As the shadows close in, the nightmares begin...Finally convinced that he needs help, Asher makes an appointment with a counselor. When he arrives at her office, she isn’t there – but a dead body is. When it becomes clear that Brooke was the real target of the attack – and that her secrets go even deeper than his own – Asher vows to protect her no matter what.”

HOSTILE INTENT by Lynette Eason, 813.6 Eas. Bk 4 of the Danger Never Sleeps series. Taken from the back cover: “Ava Jackson entered the military shortly after high school, but her mother’s illness forced her to request an early discharge. She already lost her father while deployed, and there’s no way she’s going to let her mother die alone. But after a visit to the nursing facility where her mother lives, Ava is attacked walking back to her car. Fortunately, FBI Special Agent Caden Denning arrives in time to help fight off her attacker...Caden reveals to Ava that she may hold the key to the murders of three families, and he needs her help before anyone else is harmed. The hits show a pattern, and clearly the killer has an agenda. But if Caden and Ava can’t discover what it is, Ava may be next on the list.”

BURIED SECRETS by Irene Hannon, 813.54 Han. Bk 1 of the Men of Valor series. Bones are discovered buried shallowly in an isolated field being excavated for construction. Local police chief, Lisa Grant, is called in to investigate along with a handsome ex-Navy Seal, now a county investigator. The investigation slowly uncovers deeply hidden secrets going back more than 20 years. There is also a budding romance that builds along with the investigation between Chief Grant and the county investigator. All this while the shadows from the past creep closer by a force to be reckoned with, that wants to prevent the truth from being revealed.

Excitement mounts. It was a good read, hard to put down. – *Reviewed by Corinne Hultman.*

THIN ICE by Irene Hannon, 813.54 Han. Bk 2 of the Men of Valor series. Taken from the back cover: “If Ginny Reed is still alive – who is the woman buried in her grave? After losing her parents and her sister, Christy Reed has been mired in grief. Now, life is finally starting to feel normal again – until an envelope addressed in her sister’s handwriting arrives in the mail. And the note inside claims she is still alive...FBI Special Agent Lance McGregor, a former Delta Force operator, is assigned to reopen the case...but he’s coming up with more questions than answers. Is Christy a pawn in a twisted cat-and-mouse game – or the target of a sinister plot? As Lance digs deeper, one thing becomes clear: someone in the shadows has a deadly agenda.”

TANGLED WEBS by Irene Hannon, 813.54 Han. Bk 3 of the Men of Valor series. Finn McGregor ends his 6 year Army Ranger career after a near death injury and lingering guilt over combat events. He decides to spend some quiet time in the backwoods of Missouri to try to get his life back on track. His stay is anything but tranquil – he meets a beautiful troubled woman, stumbles into the middle of a meth operation, and encounters a sheriff who has his own battles to fight. Finn’s combat skills will soon be needed when danger threatens. Very well written Christian novel with a true-to-life message of love and redemption. A good read for all, especially mystery/thriller lovers. – *Reviewed by Corinne Hultman.*

Messy at Family Camp

Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths. Proverbs 3:5-6

In 2018 we held family camp out at Camp Bluewater for the families of First Lutheran. It turned into a fun few days of getting to know the children and other families from church. So many memories have been made over the years out there and we continue to create more to be shared. I would like to invite you to be part of this year's family camp at Camp Bluewater June 5th-9th. The theme is Messy.

Life can be so messy and sometimes it can be hard to navigate through the messiness if we don't have the right tools to do so. God quips us with the right tools to guide us and help us through our messiness. During the four days at Camp Bluewater we will look into Messy Lies and how Abraham lies about Sarah and how God sees them through this mess. We will also look into Messy Pride and the fall of Samson. Messy Plans the kids will learn how impatience can create a mess. We will look at the story when Moses kills the slave driver and how God saw him through that mess. The last lesson we will focus on will be how to clean up the Mess. We will look to Jesus for forgiveness just as he forgives Peter's denial. With the messy theme we will be getting messy ourselves with squirt gun tie dye shirts, making oobleck, slime, elephant toothpaste and so much more! You won't want to miss this opportunity to be in God's word with the friends and family from First Lutheran while getting messy in God's Word.

Family Camp is more than just getting together to do fun stuff, it's about being together in God's Word. I have seen firsthand what comes out of family camp and the relationships that are formed not only with each other but with Jesus. Those that attend will experience stepping out of their comfort zone to try something new or to be friends with someone that is so different than them. It's about learning responsibility. Watching the bonds form the children really turn into a family. They look out for each other, help each other, and guide each other.

There will be opportunities for the youth to have a leadership role in planning games and activities. See below for questions regarding family camp this year.

Adult Volunteers are a big part of family camp, and it wouldn't be possible if not for them. They are needed to help instill values, be a role model, and encourage youth in their faith. Being an adult leader is so much more than just showing up. You are showing the youth that you care about them and their faith. Youth need at least five adults in their life, outside the home, to help them to discover who they are, cultivate abilities to shape their own lives, learn how to engage with and contribute to the world around them being a Christian. If interested in being an adult volunteer, choose the areas your skills will be best used.

Skit leader: This position will work with a couple children to prepare and practice the skit for the lesson for the day. The skits will take place on Sunday evening, Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday mornings. 1 volunteer needed.

Object lesson leader: This person will lead the short object lesson before the main lesson of the day. They will be needed Sunday evening, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday mornings. 1 volunteer needed.

Small group leaders: The children will be split into small groups to discuss the main lesson. The volunteers will be needed Sunday evening, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday mornings. 4-5 volunteers

Morning Devotion: The morning devotion will be right after the children wake up and right before they plunge into the lake, so if you are an early bird and love to read out of the Bible this is for you. 1 volunteer needed Monday-Thursday morning at 7:30.

Kitchen Crew: The kitchen crews are an important part of family camp. It can take so much time preparing meals, and that can take away time from watching the youth. We are looking for several volunteers to fill this need. Breakfast will be at 8:30, lunch at noon and dinner at 6:00. You can volunteer for an entire day, for all breakfasts or just for what you are available. You have the option to specify on the volunteer form what you are willing to help with. The attendees of family camp get hungry with all the outdoor activity, making sure they have the nutrients to keep going is extremely important. Several volunteers needed.

Lifeguard: If you are a certified lifeguard and are willing to donate your time, we will be at the waterfront in the afternoons from approximately 1:30-5:30 Monday-Wednesday.

Games: You come up with the games either small group or large group. This is flexible and can work around your schedule either morning, afternoon, or evening. Schedule needs to be known in advance. 1-2 volunteers needed.

Crafts: You can come up with your crafts or see what is available at the church. This volunteer position is flexible and can work around your schedule either morning, afternoon, or evening. 1-2 volunteers needed. Schedule needs to be known in advance.

If you are interested in coming out for the day to be a part of family camp, you are welcomed to do that! We are flexible, but it must be known, and registrations need to be in. All volunteers if working directly with the youth will need to pass a background check.

Congregation picnic and fireside devotion by Pastor Lovejoy will be on Wednesday, June 8th. The picnic will start at 5:00 and devotion will follow.

If you still have further questions, please reach out to me. Registration forms are located on the bulletin board by the fireplace, or you can download them off the website at flcgr.org/youth Registration forms for camp and volunteers need to be turned in no later than May 23rd.

I'm looking forward to partnering with the adult volunteers to share the love of Jesus with the families of First Lutheran Church during family camp.

Family Camp Q&A

1. Who can attend family camp? Any member or relative of a member of First Lutheran.
2. Is it only for children? No, we encourage the whole family to participate and attend family camp.
3. What age can attend without parents? That will depend on the child. If the child can stay away from home without incident, they may attend. We will not call parents in the middle of the night unless there is an emergency.
4. Can I bring a friend? As much as we want to share this experience with our friends, we are keeping family camp to only members or relatives of members.
5. Will there be a lifeguard on site? No, we do not have a registered lifeguard. It is required to have all adults at the lakeside when swimming. Because we don't have a lifeguard, lifejackets are required at all times.
6. What is the cost of Family Camp? Because we have gracious donors and people who believe in this ministry we are able to use those gifts to pay the reservation fee. We are charging \$40 per person to cover the cost of crafts, supplies and food for the stay.
7. Are scholarships available? Yes, we have a camp scholarship fund available for anyone who needs financial help. Fill out the form and turn it into the Family Ministry Program Director. All applicants remain anonymous.
8. Are electronics allowed? Cell phones are allowed and there are rules in place such as no phone during the day and if they become a problem we will keep them for the night.
9. Is there a landline? No. The adults onsite will have their cell phone with them at all times.

10. What are the sleeping arrangements like? Camp Bluewater has two wings. One wing will be all boys and one wing will be all girls. There are also two sets of restrooms down each wing. There are bunkbeds and full-size beds available to sleep on.
11. How many people can attend family camp? It has 33 beds, and the three smaller rooms have a queen size bed.
12. When is check-in and out? Check-in will be at 3:30 on Sunday evening and check-out will be at 11:00 on Thursday morning.
13. Can we only stay a few nights? Yes, we want to be flexible with families and their schedule. If you can only stay for a couple of days be sure to put that on the registration form. The cost for a partial stay will be \$25.
14. Do I need to bring my own waterfront activities such as a fishing pole or lifejacket? No, they have several onsite.


