Notes from the Pastor's Desk



At that time the disciples came to Jesus, saying, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven?" And calling to him a child, he put him in the midst of them and said, "Truly, I say to you, unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven. Whoever humbles himself like this child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 18:1-4)

Despite the rising costs of everything, millions of Americans are hitting the highways this time of the year on their family vacations. Among the sea of vehicles flooding the roadways is my own. Equipped with our car top carrier loaded with everything we couldn't leave home without, our trunk bursting with luggage, and floorboard littered with snacks, we began our adventure. Before we could hit the county line the noise from the back seats was resurrecting the memory of the scenes from a Griswold summer vacation playing in my head. "How long is the drive today?"; "Where are we stopping?"; "What's for lunch?"; "It's too hot; it's too cold; turn the radio up; turn the radio down... I have to go potty." At times, the incessant asking was just too much for me to bear! After a solid day of driving, I settled in my bed, opened up my devotional book, and read the text above from Matthew. I laughed out loud! The greatest in the kingdom are those who are like children?! That must be a joke.

But it is not a joke. The joke is how we adults think we can do anything in this life to earn a place of honor in the Father's house. That our "good works" should be tallied up and a wage of prestige afforded us because of how great we can present ourselves to be. That night I was settling into bed with a feeling of accomplishment, patting myself on the back for how I patiently endured my children, how I sacrificed where I wanted to stop for lunch so they could have their nuggets, and how I never raised my voice except at that driver as we went through Chicago. Oh, I had built quite the case for myself on how and why I was a pretty great dad that day. If you're like me, it is easy to fool yourself into thinking you're so sacrificial, all the while, looking inward at how well you're doing it. All kidding aside, I was horrible at being sacrificial that day and that verse above stopped me in my tracks as I tried to fall asleep.

As I began to relive the day in my memory, I caught glimpses of my kids asking for things that my wife and I had already bought and packed because we knew they would need it. They

would simply express their needs, with the certainty that their parents would supply for them, such as meals and opportunity to use the bathroom. They never panicked, doubted, or felt desperate. Right down to our four-year-old, they all felt like they would be cared for; not because they earned it or proved to be the greatest. No, because they knew they were loved and trusted in that love. That night as I made these revelations, I thanked my Father in Heaven that my children could experience the kind of love he shows me through my flaws and mistakes.

As Jesus speaks these words anew into our hearts now, he does so, reminding us of what our Father sacrificed for us, that we might be called the Children of God. By supplying us what we need for this body and soul every day, even before we could ask for it, chiefly the sacrifice that would provide for our forgiveness and secure our eternal life: His own Son's blood on the cross. Simply reflecting trust and love back toward him as a child would toward their parents is all that matters and all that is necessary. We are simply asked to wait, believe, be still, and watch our Father be our Father. There is nothing in this life that we can accomplish that could be added to the title, "God's Child." So, humble yourself each day as the child you are!

Humble yourself and see God provide, and boy does he. Like as he supplies the patience I need to drive through Chicago and the love I need to offer to my kids. In addition to all of this, he gives me joy that even touched my heart that night as I laid awake in bed and thought about how He supplies everything I need to care for my kids, knowing that everything they have is from Him.

You might be struggling with some questions of self-worth. You might be wrestling with inventing new ways to prove yourself to those around you. You might even be wondering where you're going get the patience, endurance, or next meal you so desperately need. The answer to all of these life situations is found in this verse above. You are a child of the most-high God. He loves you; He makes you a member of his family through the death of his son. "He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things?" (Romans 8:32) The gift might not look like you want it at first, you might even miss it if you're not looking, like I missed the all-day the lesson my kids were teaching me in the car. But, at the end of the day, He will deliver because he has already delivered your soul. To God be the Glory!

<u>A TIME TO DANCE</u> (book 1) and <u>A TIME TO EMBRACE</u> (book 2) by Karen Kingsbury, 813.54 Kin. These two books must be read in this order. You may have seen the TV movie based on book 1, but the book is far superior to the movie. A family strongly committed to God and each other struggles to maintain their faith as pressures of life drive them further and further apart from each other, from God, and even their community's support. This excellent Christian author has again crafted a realistic and poignant story of loss and restoration. – *Reviewed by Alice Hill*.

GRANDPA'S MUSIC: A story about Alzheimer's by Albert Whitman, found in Juvenile books. This book lovingly portrays the story of a family dealing with Alzheimer's disease. The colorful illustrations and large type make it an excellent choice for reading to groups of children. Grandpa comes to live with his family in their home. Each family member has responsibilities for his care. He loves singing and playing the piano which encourages his ability to communicate as his Alzheimer's disease

progresses. In the end he enters an elderly care facility. The book is written to increase understanding of Alzheimer's disease by young children ages 4 - 10. (Review taken from Libraries Alive.)

Books 1, 2 and 3 of the TALL TIMBER TRIOLOGY by Margo Hansen, 813.54 Han. This series titled **GREATLY BELOVED**, **ONLY BELOVED**, and **BROTHER BELOVED** is set in the logging industry of Grand Rapids, Minnesota from 1888 to 1908. Though we're all thoroughly familiar with this subject, the author has done much research on logging in that time frame. She has managed to craft a unique story of two separate families when a stunning revelation leaves them with an unsolvable problem. The story also contains much personal witnessing by family members to each other. A surprisingly interesting series. – *Reviewed by Alice Hill*.

NINE LIVES TO ETERNITY by Scott D. Gottschalk, 92 Got. This book is a true story of repeatedly cheating death; an inspirational and faith-driven human triumph, and has truly made an impact on readers around the world. This life-affirming book outlines each of the author's twenty-seven brushes with death. Scott believes in guardian angels, because he's personally been touched by angels. He was raised on a livestock and cropping farm in southeastern Minnesota near the small village of Byron. He and his wife now live in central Minnesota near the small village of Kimball. "From the very day of my most recent encounter with death, I've concluded that God's plan for me is somehow not yet finished. I passionately believe that the Lord has a mission for me, and until my job on earth is finished, I will not be called to my heavenly Creator no matter how dangerous my situation or how severe my injuries may be. For this reason, I'm completely convinced that my Lord and Savior has blessed me with a message that needs to be shared through the words of this book," Gottschalk shares. "Hopefully, the messages about my own personal witness to our Lord may in fact make an impact in your own life."

The Ceremony of the Offertory

Have you ever noticed the subtle ceremony involved in receiving the offerings during the Divine Service? After all the offerings have been collected, they are brought forward and given to the pastor or one of his assistants. The pastor then turns toward the altar, and as he slightly bows his head, the collection plates with the offerings in them are raised slightly to the Lord and then placed either on the altar or a table for the offerings. Why do we do have this ceremony? And what does it teach us? For that is what ceremony does; it teaches, as the Augsburg Confession tells us, what we need to know about Christ (AC XXIV, 1–3).

Originally, this ceremony included more than simply bringing forward what was collected in the offering plates. The elements for the Holy Communion—the bread and the wine—were brought forward along with the offering plates. As the offering plates and the elements were lifted toward the Lord, and placed upon the altar, the elements would be put in the center and the altar, now made a table, would be set for the Lord's Supper.

These gifts brought to the altar came from the sweat of the people's brow. It is the bread and wine, the fruits of the peoples' labor in this fallen world. After six days of labor and toil, the people would bring a generous proportion for the Lord's work. It was set upon the altar and offered to the Lord for Him to take up and press into His service for His gracious work in and among them.

For what they offered to the Lord from the sweat of their brow, the bread of anxious toil, came back to them as the bread of life, the bread come down from heaven that whoever eats this bread and drinks this cup would receive life through the forgiveness of their sins.

This is not unlike what the Lord did for His people in the Old Testament:

You shall tithe all the yield of your seed that comes from the field year by year. And before the Lord your God, in the place that he will choose, to make his name dwell there, you shall eat the tithe of your grain, of your wine, and of your oil, and the firstborn of your herd and flock, that you may learn to fear the Lord your God always. And if the way is too long for you, so that you are not able to carry the tithe, when the Lord your God blesses you, because the place is too far from you, which the Lord your God chooses, to set his name there, then you shall turn it into money and bind up the money in your hand and go to the place that the Lord your God chooses and spend the money for whatever

you desire—oxen or sheep or wine or strong drink, whatever your appetite craves. And you shall eat there before the Lord your God and rejoice, you and your household.

What a blessing! God provides for us in all things. He provides bread from the sweat of our brows, and He receives this from us in the first fruits offerings we give to Him in thanksgiving and praise. He receives and turns it into spiritual bread, heavenly bread, the bread of eternal life and gives it back to us so that we might have joy. So, the next time you are in the Divine Service, watch this ceremony in wonder, that the Lord gives back to us, what we have given to Him so that we may rejoice in the salvation He has won upon the cross and gives to us in His supper.
