

Notes from the Pastor's Desk



¹⁴ And we urge you, brothers, admonish the idle, encourage the fainthearted, help the weak, be patient with them all. ¹⁵ See that no one repays anyone evil for evil, but always seek to do good to one another and to everyone. (1 Thessalonians 5:14-15 ESV)

Over and over again it is said that the number one issue facing Americans right now is inflation. I disagree. Yes, the rising cost of pretty much everything from gasoline to bread is increasingly on the rise. It is unpleasant, it is forcing families to make tough decisions, and it is putting tremendous pressure on those living on fixed incomes. More than that, no matter who you are, you are touched by it. It being universal in nature, virtually unavoidable, and persistent is why I think it gives the impression that it is the most significant issue facing our culture. We are reminded of its existence every time we go to a restaurant, buy medication, or pay our electricity bill. Imagine if there was something in this life that forced us, at every turn, to see the tears shed every day in family court, or the infant of drug addicted parents crying in hunger laying in soiled garments. What if we couldn't just pretend that the person in our extended family, or the child that sits next to ours on the bus, or that young man holding a sign on the corner wasn't really there. What if, just as we are forced to go to the gas pump, we were forced to pull over, and confront the issues our neighbors faced? What if we saw everyone's pain as everyone's pain and that it bothered us as much as \$5 gas?

Can you imagine a community where we bear each other's burdens, and not just the burdens that impact us personally (Galatians 6:2)? If that were the case, what would we list as the greatest issues facing us as a people today? Would it be the drug epidemic that continues to claim more and more lives? Would we list our children's mental health as a top concern seeing how they have struggled over the last three years? If we took a step back from the fray to stare at the increasing divide in our society, where hatred and condemnation are flung across political aisles, would we see it as the huge issue it truly is? Would we see the anger and resentment in our communities as the biggest issue? For me, I would list how we have lost sight of the most basic reality, that the people around us are people; people with families, feelings, needs, pains, and

value... immeasurable value. After all, it wasn't with gold or silver that Christ redeemed their soul, but with His holy, innocent, precious blood (1 Peter 1:18-19).

Woven throughout this article are stark rhetorical questions which ought to cut us all to our core, and expose what is too often lacking, at least in my heart. The truth is, as we examine ourselves, and list the issues that we face relationally in our communities across this world, there is no simple answer. The answer isn't solely found in more legislation, supreme court rulings, or protests. The answer is only found in a transformation of the heart and mind within the individuals of a community. A transformation that runs countercultural. It is represented in the words, "Help the weak... be patient... don't repay with evil... seek to do good." Over and over again in scripture we encounter our calling to rise above the chaos of this world and love with an understanding, compassionate, heart. Romans 12:15 tells us to rejoice with those that rejoice, and weep with those who weep. Ephesians 4:12 reminds us that we are to be kind to one another, tenderhearted, and forgiving as Christ forgave us. Peter instructs us to be united, be sympathetic, love one another, possess a compassionate soft heart, and be humble (1Peter 3:8). These are but a few times scripture reminds us that we are to love one another with an intentional love demonstrated first by how Christ sought us out and reconciled himself to us through His selfless sacrifice (John 13:34, 2 Corinthians 5:14-21). Some of the voices in the world might say that inflation might be the greatest issue facing us at this point in time. But we know better. The greatest issue is our heart, it always has been. Inflation is simply a convenient distraction from facing the mirror. At least it is for me.

This is the time of the year where we get outside and clean up around the house from the winter months. It is the time of the year where we try to make time to do all of that spring cleaning, both inside and out. Can we at least be as diligent with our souls as well? Let's take out the clutter. Wash the windows of our heart, and dust off the empathy we are to embody in this world toward one another. Not simply because it is the nice thing to do. But because when we look into the mirror we see, yes, a selfish sinner, but also a blood-bought child of God that has the privilege of showing others how God in Christ chose them as His child before the foundation of the world was set. More than that, that He would stop at nothing to call them His child as He looked down and saw their universal, unavoidable, and persistent helpless state, and demonstrated compassion by rescuing them. He did this by moving toward them, and bearing their burdens! Lean on Christ, run to Him and His word which is living and active. He will restore your soul, live in and through you as He alone supplies relief from the REAL greatest issue facing not only Americans but all of humanity in this time and place. To Him be all the glory!

What Do You Have That You Have Not Received?

Some of the disciples of John the Baptist were questioning him about the baptism and preaching of Jesus. John the Baptist replies to their questions in this way: "A person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven" (John 3:27).

Now, John the Baptist says this to show that Jesus, His teaching, and His baptism are from heaven. But this statement is true of everything – everything that we have and are in body and soul. In fact, this is what we are taught in the meaning of the Apostles' Creed in *Luther's Small Catechism*.

In the explanation of the Creed's First Article, we learn that God has made us and everything in the universe. Luther says:

"He has given me my body and soul, eyes, ears, and all my members, my reason and all my senses, and still takes care of them. He also gives me clothing and shoes, food and drink, house and home, wife and children, land, animals, and all I have. He richly and daily provides me with all that I need to support this body and life. He defends me against all danger and guards and protects me from all evil. All this He does only out of fatherly, divine goodness and mercy, without any merit or worthiness in me. For all this it is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey Him."

In the Second Article of the Creed, we learn that God sent His Son, Jesus, to humble Himself, taking the form of a servant. Luther writes:

"(Jesus) has redeemed me, a lost and condemned person, purchased and won me from all sins, from death, and from the power of the devil; not with gold or silver, but with His holy, precious blood and with His innocent suffering and death, that I may be His own and live under Him in His kingdom and serve Him in everlasting righteousness, innocence, and blessedness, just as He is risen from the dead, lives and reigns to all eternity."

In the Third Article of the Creed, we learn that the fruits of what Jesus Christ, the Son of God, did are given to us through the work of the Holy Spirit in the Church. Luther explains:

"That I cannot by my own reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ, my Lord, or come to Him; but the Holy Spirit has called me by the Gospel, enlightened me with His gifts, sanctified and kept me in the true faith. In the same way He calls, gathers, enlightens, and sanctifies the whole Christian church on earth, and keeps it with Jesus Christ in the one true faith. In this Christian church He daily and richly forgives all my sins and the sins of all believers. On the Last Day He will raise me and all the dead, and give eternal life to me and all believers in Christ."

Indeed, a person cannot receive even one thing unless it is given him from heaven. But how easy is this for us to forget about this?

How easy is it for us to think that what we have in this life is because we have earned it? How easy is it for us to forget that even all our skills, the abilities of our hands and minds – the very ethic to work diligently and to seek to get better at these skills – is given to us from heaven, just as John the Baptist said? How easy is it for us to forget that it is Christ alone – and the work of the Holy Spirit – that reveals His salvation to us, delivers it to us, and not our doing?

Sure, we have responsibility for coming to church, for delving into God's Holy Word, and for

praying without ceasing. But even these responsibilities are given to us from heaven, not to earn anything but in response to what He has accomplished for us.

A person cannot receive one thing unless it is given to him from heaven. Everything we have, and everything we are – in both body and soul – are gifts from God in heaven. Let us then respond in thanksgiving and give back to Him as He asks us to – with a first-fruits, generous proportion offering of what He has given to us.

are waiting to be read from your church library. Check out the Small Book shelf above the DVDs for titles that will capture your attention, but won't take long to read through on a quiet evening inside. – *Your library volunteers – Janie Carlson, Darlene Baltus and Shela Cline*.

BABYSITTER'S HANDBOOK, THE by Sarah Fletcher found at 649.1 Fle. Maybe there are some young people out there thinking about earning some money during the summer. There always seems to be the need for good babysitters. I was thinking of that a couple of weeks ago so I went to the card catalogue and found this book. Inside you'll find 15 chapters about how to do your job, what to expect, and what is expected of you. Included are suggestions for stories, games, and activities and hand forms to help you get all the information you need to do the best job possible. This book was put into circulation in 2007 from a Marie Mueller Memorial fund (maybe some of you remember Marie from the town library), but the information still holds true. – *Reviewed by Darlene Baltus*.

COUNTERFEITER by Moritz Nachtstern and Ragnar Arntzen found at 940.53 Nac. In 1945 Moritz Nachtstern sat down in his Oslo apartment and dictated the story of how he survived the Holocaust. First published in Norwegian in 1949, this English edition is complemented by a foreword by his daughter Sidsel. This must have been a hard story to tell and I found it a hard story to read. – *Reviewed by Darlene Baltus*.

GRANDMA'S ON THE GO by Carol V. Weishampel, Ed. D. found at Fiction Wei. A single mom and her passel of kids hit the road with guts and gusto. If you like to travel and camp, you will enjoy reading about trips taken from Texas to Montana and points leading from Austin to the state parks in Texas. Cooking over open fire? SOUND AMONG THE TREES, A by Susan Meissner found at 813.6 Mei. This is taken from the back of the book: A house shrouded in time. A line of women with a heritage of loss. As a young bride, Susannah Page was rumored to be a Civil War spy for the North, a traitor to her Virginian roots. Her great-granddaughter Adelaide, the current matriarch of Holly Oak, doesn't believe that Susannah's ghost haunts the antebellum mansion looking for a pardon, but rather that the house itself bears a grudge toward its tragic past.

Lutheran Island Camp (Summer Employment)

Hey there! We have a great summer planned for 2022! We can't wait for the Island to be full of campers laughing, playing, and learning more about Jesus. Our mission is the same as always--to nourish the whole person for joyful, Christ-centered life and service!

Unfortunately, staffing has been tough, and we are currently five days away from our deadline to decide if we will need to limit the number of kids who can come to camp each week due to a low number of applicants. Each summer we hire 20-25 college-aged individuals to fill leadership, cabin counseling, kitchen, maintenance, and wrangling positions. We currently have eight. This is where you come in!

Encourage any college-aged people in your life to <u>apply</u>! Remember, there is no "right" personality for the camp environment. Just like the Body of Christ needs all kinds, so does our camp staff! When you encourage a young adult to work at camp you are encouraging them to step out of their comfort zone and learn to be a strong, Christian leader. Let them know the benefits of working at camp! To name a few:

- Experience: Working at camp looks great on resumes! It shows future employers that the candidate worked in a fast pace, intense environment and succeeded. It implies that the candidate can be adaptable and has good problem-solving skills. A summer at camp can also double as an internship opportunity!
- Community: When people serve on summer staff, they get the opportunity to be a part of a community bigger than themselves. Lifelong friendships are made as a result of working on summer staff. The community people experience nurtures each individual's faith and brings them closer to Jesus.
- Faith building: There's no better way to learn something than to teach it yourself! All summer staff have the opportunity to teach or preach the Word of God to campers. Countless numbers of summer staff have had their faith lives transformed as they work to transform the faith lives of the campers. As part of the camp staff, individual get to directly live out their Christian calling to "make disciples of all nations"!

Working at camp as a college student encourages young people to fulfill their Christian calling, gain great experience for their future, and be a part of an incredible community of their peers. We ask that you reach out to the young adults that you know and let them know about this invaluable and transformative experience! God is good and we trust Him to take care of the mission of Lutheran Island Camp.

Witches Night

Towards the end of last month, I went for a walk around my town. I was confused when I saw several of the witch 'scarecrow' type figures outside of building and homes.

I told my Czech tutor about it, and she explained to me that the last day of April is 'Witches Night' in the Czech Republic. People make these witch figurines, and then when the sun sets, they build a bonfire and burn them.

The tradition is that by burning the winter witches, winter is officially over and the spring weather can fully settle in. Historically, these ceremonies were taken more seriously and burning the witches was seen as a way to ward off evil. Nowadays, while the tradition still carries on, it is a low-key event carried out by individual families. Czech people whom I asked about this tradition said that they view it as an opportunity for families and friends to gather together and celebrate the new spring season.

but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it" - Isaiah 55:11(ESV).

The more bold I become in attempting to speak in Czech, the more blunders I make. I have had a few instances this month where I will use a phrase that my students have taught me, only to realize that they jokingly taught me to say an offensive phrase or bad word without my knowledge.

Thanks be to God that despite our shortcoming and blunders, we can speak boldly about the hope we have in Christ because we are confident that God is the one in control, not us. He graciously allows us to be tools in His hands as He accomplishes His purposes and brings people unto Himself.

With that being said, I am now more cautious about using phrases that the youth I work with teach me. My students bring me so much joy and keep me on my toes.

May God continue to bless and keep you all in His gracious care.
