

# Notes from the Pastor's Desk

And Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness <sup>2</sup> for forty days, being tempted by the devil. (Luke 4:1-2<sup>ESV</sup>)

In-between college and grad school I took a job that involved remodeling houses. I remember one home in particular that had a basement that no one would go into. Everyone who came into work on the home would stand at the top of the stairway, peering into

the darkness of the lower level, trying to muster the courage to descend, but with zero success. There was something about that space under the house that made everyone shudder, or as one 275-pound brick-mason put it "gave him the "heebie jeebies."

There are times when we find ourselves standing on the threshold of rooms when our heart sinks, we fear danger is looming, or when the darkness seems too unsettling. For some it is the hallway leading to the marriage counselor's office. It could be the office that we work in as unforgiveness or undealt with wrongs loom. It might even be the living room that every night before was a place of relaxation, but tonight is the place where you are being asked to admit your wrongs. It is definitely experienced in those places we all fear one day that we'll be, like the oncology department at Mayo, or the funeral home here in town. There are a lot of "dark" rooms that we are called to enter, and the thought of doing so is far more terrifying than that dark basement of that house so many years ago. It is overwhelming to be asked to enter any of those rooms and taking that first step sometimes almost feels impossible.

Doing what is impossible for us is what Christ demonstrated after His baptism when He was led by the Spirit into the wilderness to confront Satan. In that single act our Lord was pointing all the way back to the first day of creation as the word of God penetrated the darkness of the void to bring about light. When the Word Made Flesh, Jesus Christ, walked into the darkness of the wilderness to face our greatest enemy, He was working toward bringing about restoration and reconciliation between God and mankind. The work that Jesus did in the wilderness cannot be overstated. He came to that

place, boldly, and strove with the devil for forty days being tempted in every way (Hebrews 4:15), when we could not last a single hour, minute, or fraction of a second. The light that was the light of all mankind (John 1:4-5) descended into the realm of disorder once again, and the power of God's word was once again demonstrated. But this of course is not the only time Jesus demonstrates His power as the Word Made Flesh by taking on the darkness. There will be a Friday soon when the sun will fail to shine (Luke 23:44). There will be the blackness of a borrowed tomb, the hopeless gloom of a tearful Friday night, Saturday, and Sunday morning. The Word of God would meet them all, confront them each in time, and show that no amount of darkness could overcome Him (John 1:5).

Without Jesus, creepy basements would not be our biggest problem. We would be constantly forced into situations of helplessness, where each experience the reality of our weakness in the face of guilt, and death. However, with Christ, we have the light of God, His Word, to move to rooms like that of marriage counselors, office buildings, and living rooms overshadowed with shame and guilt, as our consciences scream out from our soul, rejoicing that we have forgiveness to revel in with each other. With Christ we have the ability to step through the threshold of the oncologist's office, and if necessary the funeral home, confident that death no longer haunts us. We are more than conquerors through Christ who gives us strength each day to face the enemies He has already destroyed (Romans 8:36-39). What Jesus began at His baptism, then as He descended into the wilderness to confront Lucifer, and finally stripped him of His power through the cross and empty grave, changes everything for us! It takes all of the moments of darkness in our lives and turns on the lights, ripping through all of the terror, helplessness, and hopelessness we otherwise would experience every day.

The weeks went by as we all worked on that house with the foreboding basement. Finally, the day came when we were finished and one of the contractors brought a new employee to show him the job site. Before we could warn him of the basement, he walked over to the stairwell, flipped on the light, and headed down as he asked what the basement looked like. We all stood there in amazement. Mostly because none of us had ever noticed the light switch. What a difference light makes. We all followed the young man down the stairs to see for the first time the room we all had avoided for weeks. We laughed and made fun of each other for the rest of the afternoon... off the clock of course.

It is a powerful thing when fear can be replaced with laughter. Now many years later, I experience that same thing in much more powerful ways in hospital rooms as families pray and sing over the beds of their loved ones. I see it as families cry but smile at a graveside, knowing they will see their lifelong friend in Glory. I am even given the

same privilege when I hear the wonderful words of forgiveness touch a terrorized conscience of a wife as she receives the balm of forgiveness in my office from her husband. Light overcoming darkness... that is what this time of the year is all about. We begin in the wilderness, but we will end in the garden of an empty tomb. May you be moved in your life to flip on this Light of Christ in the rooms you find yourself in, regardless of the situation, that all fear and despair may be removed. To God be all the Glory.

Everything we have and everything we are is a gift of God's providential care. We understand that we're not islands unto ourselves, and that we could not exist without those who have gone before us and are alongside us. God has given us forefathers in family, country, and faith. We are recipients of what God worked through them. We know that God provides for our well-being through these means.

He gives us farmers and ranchers of all sorts so that we can eat. But more than that God created and gave us all the things that those farmers and ranchers cultivate. He gave us the corn, the beans, the wheat, the cows for milking, the steers for grilling. He gave each of those things, properties for our nourishment and sustenance. Without God creating and instilling in those things their taste and their nutritional value, we would not exist.

He gives us doctors, surgeons, nurses, and hospitals. He gives us medicine and medical instruments. Again, he gave us all things that go into making those medicines and medical instruments. He instilled in those things the properties that can be utilized for that purpose. Without God creating and instilling those healing properties into those things, and without God creating the ability within man to find this out and press it into service of our medical needs, we would not enjoy the kind of health we do now.

But there's more. He gives us gainful employment through our employers and provides for the necessities of life through the labor of our hands: "Then Moses said to

the people of Israel, 'See, the Lord has called by name Bezalel the son of Uri, son of Hur, of the tribe of Judah; and he has filled him with the Spirit of God, with skill, with intelligence, with knowledge, and with all craftsmanship, to devise artistic designs, to work in gold and silver and bronze, in cutting stones for setting, and in carving wood, for work in every skilled craft. And he has inspired him to teach, both him and Oholiab the son of Ahisamach of the tribe of Dan.' (Exodus 35:30–34)


And one step back from that, He has created and given us hands. And attached to those hands are arms with strength. He created us with minds in order to make those arms and hands move to accomplish the work set before us. And He has given us reason and senses. That mind, because of the reason God has instilled in it, is able to work through difficult problems before we press those arms and hands into labor. It allows us to grapple with concepts and run through scenarios instead of having to experience every situation personally. It allows us to learn from the mistakes as well as the accomplishments of others. This can be done for our entire body, all our skills and talents, everything that makes us ... us. So that everything we have AND everything we are is a gift from Him. This is what we confess in the First Article of the Creed when we say that we believe in God the Father Almighty, maker of heaven and earth.

But that is just the First Article of the Creed. We confess two more articles that deal with God's provision for our spiritual well-being: That He sent His son to die and be raised on the third day for our justification. That He delivers that justification through the Means of Grace (Baptism, preaching, the Word of God, and the Lord's Supper). And to give you those Means of Grace, He gives pastors and teachers, etc. Again, this could be expanded and expounded upon. So that literally everything that we have and everything that we are – in this life and the next – is an inexpressible gift from God.

And it is for this, all of this, that we give thanks. And that is what stewardship is all about – giving thanks for God's provision for us. To give thanks is more than having an attitude of gratitude, more than just a feeling in our hearts. It is an action. It begins in the heart, but it doesn't stay there. It works its way out through the mouth in praise for God's gifts and in love and charity through the hands to our neighbors in family, country, and church. "For all this is my duty to thank and praise, serve and obey him" (Luther's Small Catechism, 16).

So give thanks to God for His inexpressible gift – for everything we have and everything we are. Do this not in word only but also in deed.

I have arrived! On December 6th I received a phone call saying that my Czech visa had been approved and on December 11th, it arrived in the mail along with my passport. The moment I have been waiting for! After my passport arrived on the 11th, everything went very quickly. I secured my plane tickets, packed, said final goodbyes, and flew out from the States on December 20th. I flew from Sioux Falls to Chicago, Chicago to Munich, Germany, and Munich to Prague. In Prague, I was picked up by LCMS missionary Cindy Wrucke. The first two weeks in the Czech Republic were jam-packed. I spent a few days with Cindy in Prague, then Cindy and I went to Havirov and spent Christmas Eve and Christmas Day with my supervisor Ben and his wife Becca. Even though Christmas was different than usual, the message of Christmas remains the same no matter what the time-zone is! We all had a great time with one another.

#### The Work Begins

Now that I am here and beginning to get settled in, I am starting to step into my roles. Here is a look at some things that I am getting involved with so far: Riga Luther Academy: In total, I currently will be serving as an English tutor to eight different men. There are currently six men associated with the Riga

Luther Academy whom I am tutoring. I am also tutoring a pastor based in Slovakia, and the Lutheran Bishop of Spain. Out of the eight men, I have so far met and had tutoring sessions with five of them. I am eager to meet the others! Local Czech churches: This week, I had meetings with two pastors from different local Lutheran congregations. I loved talking with these pastors and learning from them about the history, struggles, strengths, and overall life of their congregations. The pastors and I discussed different English-language learning opportunities that I can provide through their churches. I am very excited to get these groups and activities up and rolling. Online opportunities: This spring, I will be assisting with an online program called English Conversation Partners. This program is an opportunity for people here in the Czech Republic to meet over Zoom, with volunteers from the States, and practice their English through conversations. Starting in two weeks, these sessions will take place every week for an hour for a total of six weeks. I have been working on the conversational curriculum for this program.

**Youth Retreat:** In addition to visiting Prague, getting settled in, and spending Christmas with fellow missionaries, I also was able to attend a youth retreat in a neighboring town and meet some of the young adults that attend the local Lutheran churches.

I found a local tutor and have continued my language learning journey with weekly in-person classes. My tutor is great and very kind and encouraging. I am eager to continue hearing and learning the language

I rang in the New Year in a new country. Despite the unfamiliarity of a new country, I know that God is with me every step of the way. None of us can be certain about what 2022 will hold, but, we can be certain that our God is the same yesterday, today and forever (Hebrews 13:8). May we fix our eyes on Christ in this new year and in the days to come. May God continue to bless and keep you all in His gracious care. – **Hayden**

# Youth News

Youth group started because there was a need for children to be around other children. In March of 2020 everything shut down. God created us to be around other people and not to be alone. Parents saw what this was doing to their children. They were being isolated, and Zoom wasn't cutting it for them. It was teaching the kids how to handle everything on their own. Parents got more involved in their schoolwork. Most families

came together during the last two years, but some were ripped apart. Some families couldn't handle the burden of having their children home all day with them.

Youth group is a place for children to come and be themselves in a welcoming environment. It has been 2 years since then and youth group is still meeting. It started with a few kids that would show up and then by the end of the year more and more children came. High school youth group started a year later. Today youth group is a vibrant ministry in our church.

There are three adult leaders and average 15 students per session. We meet on Wednesday evenings form 6:30-8. We have an opening activity, lesson, games, snack, and discussion. There are some Wednesdays when we don't get to our game because the discussion is so rich. The children are hungry to learn more about the triune God.

The ministries at First Lutheran aren't about the numbers and how many people attend. It is about what we do in the time they are here. It is about listening to one another and hearing their story and applying God's word to it. It is about what that person is going to do with the information they have learned. We will never know the impact we have on our community. That is not something we can measure.

When possible, I try to attend M3, Making Meaning out of Multiple Data Sets. The MN Extension for Youth puts this training on every year through Itasca Network for

Youth. I really like this training, because I am able to dig into how the ministry is working and how I can better my teaching. I used High School youth group as the ministry I took apart. Tijanna Lattimore came with me to help dig deeper into what the youth experience. We go over attendance, youth outcomes, youth experiences, and quality practices.

What I learned was we get distracted easily and move off topic, so I had the youth decide what we should do to stay on topic. They came up with great ideas. We decided that if we get off topic more than five times, we will not play any games. Well needless to say, we stayed on topic most of the night. When the youth are the leaders, they invest more into the ministry. They are more than capable of being leaders in our church.

It has been fun to watch the youth engage in conversation on the topics we discuss. They are wanting to learn more and more. We don't give kids enough credit and accountability. In reality this generation knows more than we ever did at that age. Their knowledge is amazing. The older we get we forget what it is like to be a child. So many of them show leadership skills. The youth even decided to have a youth representative at the board of youth/education meetings. They will take turns three months at a time.

Moving forward with our ministries at First Lutheran we need to keep in mind that it's okay to fail. It's okay for us to not have all the answers. It's okay for us to just sit in silence with someone when they are hurting. How can we reach more children in our community that doesn't have this kind of church family?
