As a boy growing up in southern Minnesota, I enjoyed Easter. Easter was a time marked by several Worship Services (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday & Easter). It was also a time in which I enjoyed colored Easter eggs and Easter candy. The Easter egg is an ancient symbol of new life, which for some people has been associated with pagan festivals celebrating spring. For us as Christians the Easter egg is meant to represent Jesus' resurrection. Just as a new life (a small chicken) emerges from the egg so Jesus emerged from the grave to give us "new life".

The week before Easter is known as "Holy Week", including Maundy Thursday, commemorating the Maundy, which means "command", and Last Supper, as well as Good Friday, commemorating the crucifixion and death of Jesus. This year we are doing something very special at First Lutheran for our Good Friday Worship Service. The Worship Service will help us to get in touch with the importance of the crucifixion and the price Jesus has paid for our sins. Plan now to attend our very special Good Friday worship Service at 6:30 pm on Friday, April 2!

In <u>Western Christianity</u> the Easter Season begins on Easter Sunday and lasts seven weeks, ending with the 50th day, <u>Pentecost Sunday</u>. In <u>Eastern Christianity</u>, the Easter Season ends with the coming of the 40th day, the <u>Feast of the Ascension</u>, when Jesus visibly ascended into heaven. Easter is a religious <u>holiday</u> commemorating the <u>resurrection of Jesus</u> from the dead, described in the <u>New Testament</u> as having occurred on the third day after his <u>burial</u> following <u>his crucifixion</u> at <u>Calvary</u> c. 30 AD. It is the culmination of the <u>Passion of Jesus</u>, preceded by <u>Lent</u>, a 40-day period of <u>fasting</u>, <u>prayer</u>, and <u>penance</u>.

Janelle and I have been Blessed and continue to be Blessed with the privilege of Worshipping our Lord and Savior here at First Lutheran as our time will soon be coming to a close. We will continue to cherish each moment that we have here at First Lutheran until we go out the door and return to Hibbing.

Enjoy the Blessings of Easter and the "New Life" that we have in Christ Jesus!!!

Greetings to our gentle First readers! As always, we encourage that you stop by and find a couple of books, and maybe a DVD, to bring home to while away the quiet cold days of winter. Please let us know if you have any books or authors to suggest we look into

THE EDGE OF BELONGING by Amanda Cox, 813.6 Cox. "When Ivy Rose returns to her hometown to oversee her late grandmother's estate sale, she soon discovers that the woman left behind more than trinkets and photo frames – she provided a path to the truth behind Ivy's adoption. Shocked, Ivy seeks clues to her past, but a key piece to the mystery is missing... Twenty-four years earlier, Harvey James finds an abandoned newborn who gives him a sense of human connection for the first time in his life. His desire to care for the baby runs up against the stark fact that he is homeless." This is a dual-timeline story and it kept my interest throughout, though at times I got confused and had to do some rereading! It was well worth the time it took to read and I totally recommend this book! – Review by Janie Carlson.

LEAVING NOVEMBER by Deborah Raney, 813.54 Ran. "Faith and love triumph in this small-town story of overcoming the past and finding hope for the future. **LEAVING NOVEMBER** gently plays the heartstrings and embraces the spirit in the name of love."

THE CAMERA NEVER LIES by David Rawlings, 813.54 Raw. "When Daniel inherits an old camera from his grandfather, he notices an inscription on the bottom: 'No matter what you think you might see, the camera never lies.' Daniel begins using the camera, but every time he develops his photos, they threaten to reveal secrets that could sabotage both his marriage and his career – and destroying the life he has worked so hard to build." The author says that the theme of the book is about the price of accepting honesty with others and ourselves. This was a really strange and interesting book. <u>A PROMISE KEPT</u> by Robin Lee Hatcher, 813.54 Hat. Allison felt sure that God's answer was yes – that He promised to heal and save her marriage to Tony. But as things got worse and Tony finally left and a divorce followed, she knew she had misunderstood what God had told her. She never could have guessed what God's answer really was. The author adds some surprising facts at the end of the book. *Reviewed by Alice Hill*.

SHADES OF LIGHT by Sharon Garlough Brown, 813.6 Bro. Taken from the inside cover: "What a consolation this novel will be for those who have known the darkness! Too often

church people approach mental illness with fear, simplistic theology, and useless spiritual bromides. By telling Wren's story, Sharon Garlough Brown instead gently welcomes us into a companionship of sorrow where we can glimpse the dark beauties of grace. There's bracing truth here about the stubbornness of mental illness the spiritual and practical implications, the helpless ache of those who love but can't fix. But there's also beauty of soul which emerges for readers through Wren's sensitive dwelling in the paintings and writings of Vincent van Goh. And as we learn to dwell in Wren's world to enter that circle of sorrow we find at the center of it the compassionate, Gethsemane present of Christ." Newsletter article – March 2021

Hudson Taylor, a Nineteenth Century British missionary to China, is reported to have said, "God's work, done in God's way, will not lack God's supply." To know God's way, we need to know His Holy Word. Or to say it another way: you need to know your Bible.

St. Paul, before he spends two chapters on giving, wrote that every thought is to be taken captive to the obedience of Christ (2 Cor 10:5). Doctrine matters. And doctrine matters because the Scriptures matter. And the Scriptures matter because this is where we learn the teaching of Christ. Our thoughts must be brought into line with the teaching of Scripture so that our work is what God wants done and so that we do this work in His way.

A good tree bears good fruit. A bad tree bears bad fruit. We have been made good trees in holy baptism. We are fertilized and pruned for bearing good fruit by constantly hearing God's Word preached and taught in sermon and Bible Class and in receiving the life giving,

faith-sustaining food of the Lord's Supper. Remember your doctrine, hold on to the Lord's teaching, and your thoughts will be taken captive to the obedience of Christ.

Bringing every thought captive to the obedience of Christ is recognizing that God does provide. The Lord's Prayer teaches us to pray for daily bread. Praying this day in and day out reminds us that the Lord is the giver of our daily bread, and that we are to give thanks for His daily provision of it. God is rarely early and never late in His work, as Abraham learned on the mount of the Lord it will be provided. The Lord's generosity forms our generosity in return.

Thus, we set aside for the work of God a generous, first-fruits, proportion of the daily bread that God has given to us. This act of trust in the Lord's provision is the working out of our faith in Him. When budgetary discussions pop up our natural reaction is to point fingers. But remember your doctrine, and what your mother taught about pointing fingers. Our first natural reaction is not always right. In fact, when our thoughts are brought into captivity of Christ, our first reaction should be repentance. It should raise questions in our own lives. As good trees in Christ who are to bear good fruit, we should ask whether our thoughts have been taken captive by obedience to Christ. Have we given generously? Have we given our first-fruits? You know. And God knows. "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to show Himself strong on behalf of those whose heart is loyal to Him" (2 Chron 16:9).

God will provide. He always has and He always will. He gives His meat in due season. He has not left you as orphans but has grafted you into His own family. You belong to Him. Remember this, letting this thought dwell in you richly. And you will then be rich toward others.



LWML Reaches 2019-2021 Mission Goal!

Sing the Doxology, "Praise God from Whom all blessings flow!" The LWML, by God's grace, has reached the mission goal of \$2.1 million set for the 2019-2021 biennium.

This means that all mission grants selected for this biennium can be funded! God has great plans for spreading His Gospel story through those ministries. He has great plans for the 2021-2023 mission grants as well. Of the 65 completed mission grant submissions, 34 were selected for the 2021 LWML Convention ballot and approved by the LWML Board of Directors (BOD) and Presidents Assembly in January. The LWML BOD and Presidents Assembly will meet in March to approve the 2021-2023 mission goal – and after the end of the biennium (March 31, 2021) – any surplus mite offerings not given to mission grant recipients in this biennium will be added on top of the allocation for the 2021-2023 mission grants. What a joy and privilege it will be to pray, consider, discuss, and vote for those recipients!

LWML Treasurer Karla Koehler wrote, "We thank God for the many women and men who have generously shared their material blessings so that the LWML can share the love and forgiveness of Christ!" Let the trumpets sound and the cymbals crash, in praise to the Lord!



Serving The Lord In The Ukraine News From the Beaudoin's



The new year brings so many things with it: excitement, expectations, anxiety and hopes. Some people make resolutions, plans, or changes in their lives. No matter how long or short the duration of change, it makes us grow and refocus our lives. The Ukraine mission takes on these qualities of change in the new year.

We have great excitement for 2021 for our Ukrainian mission. We are excited to announce that Pastor Fedder and his family will be joining the mission. We are anxiously awaiting their arrival as they have been greenlighted. The support we receive from you at home further excites us. We get calls, texts, and notes of support from you. Your support often comes at times when we need a boost. Thank you for this! We are excited to be planning our home service, also. We will be coming home to tour our supporting congregations and presenting to new congregations. Tentatively, this is scheduled for the summer of 2021. Kipp and I enjoy sharing how God works in our lives and for the people of Ukraine. When we got here, we only taught the church workers. Now we teach church workers, church officers, seminary students, and the people of Ukraine. There is outreach online learning with Kherson and soon other cities. We are excited for these opportunities.

In the final week of January Kipp and I were invited to the village of one of our students, to meet her family and teach English. We went to Berezhany, Ternopil and Lviv. Svetlana, our student, arranged the whole trip and showed us around Ternopil, Ukraine first. This city was very different from Odessa as the architecture was more European within the center of the city. As we walked out of the city you could see the Soviet era buildings that are nondescript in their appearance and structure. These areas were bleak and had an air of hopelessness. The people in Ternopil were extremely curious about us and wanted to know why we were in Ukraine. Sveta showed us monuments and told us all about the city. You could see how hard the people work. We have met so many talented and very bright people here. It is evident that when the Soviets left Ukraine, the very structure of the economy was ravaged. There are factories that are shutdown, and the people must go to the neighboring countries to make a good living. Here is the opportunity for mercy aid that could be done to assist people with the essentials. Here in Western Ukraine the people have a strong sense of nationality. They want everyone in Ukraine to only speak Ukrainian. Where in the eastern part of Ukraine (and Odessa) they speak mostly Russian.

The craftsmanship of the Ukrainian people is everywhere from buildings to the embroidery work. Each area has different embroidery patterns, colors, woodworking, and architecture. The people here remind us of the people of Kherson and the Midwest in the United States. They are hardworking people who take pride in their work, family, and homes. They are the salt of the earth, very generous and loving!

Andrew, Sveta's brother, picked us up and drove us to their village of Berezhany. In Berezhany we were shown the village and introduced to an Orthodox priest who did outreach to the poor and those in prison. He was willing to share information on how he got started, and how the program grew. This was very helpful as he described the pitfalls of trying to have too large of a focus. So much was done with so little money. One hundred hryvnias, which is roughly four United States dollars, can provide relief to many. He wished us well in our mission.

Andrew and Sveta took us to their grandparents' home to meet Sveta's family. Sveta's family was generous and loving. They were so engaging and excited. We talked and ate for hours! The table was set with such precision and attention to details. There was so much love in that room! Over the next days we were shown the village of Berezhany and the city of Lviv. Each day included Bogdan's(Sveta's grandfather), Anna's (Sveta's grandmother), Sveta's mother, Sveta's, and Andrew's outstanding hospitality! They invited us back for Easter to celebrate with them the Lord's resurrection and glory. We can't wait! This trip showed us the needs and desires of the people for outreach. It helped to refresh our souls and focus our efforts and plans. We are excited for what 2021 has in store for us and the mission to Ukraine.

MEN & BOY'S FISHING — As a result of the Covid virus, we had to cancel our trip to the NW Angle of Lake of the Woods in 2020. Young's Bay Resort graciously held our deposits for the same period this year, which is now scheduled for **June 27-30**. Because of virus concerns, the Canadian border closure remains in effect. Consequently, we don't know if it will even be open for this year's June 27-30 reservation. In the meantime, block out these dates. Contact Greg Taylor or Dick Buech if you are unable to come this year or if you would like to attend. When you get your vaccine shot, try to get documentation that you received it in case that becomes a border crossing requirement. Also, don't buy an Ontario fishing license until it is clear the trip is on! We will hold an organizational meeting when it is clear we can go! Stay tuned!

Be confident but not cocky. 3. Sometimes we are put through uncomfortable situations for a better outcome. 4. How we need to lean on God when we are faced with temptation. 5. Patience is hard, but the reward is greater if we can be patient. 6. We learned how to forgive those that have hurt us, how to forgive ourselves when we do something wrong, and also ask others and God to forgive us.

In February Sunday morning youth group we watched a few movies and documentaries. One was "The Social Dilemma". It is about how social media along with big tech companies and how their algorithms work to make us addicted to social media, email, or just our smart phones. I highly recommend you watch it is found on Netflix.



We will continue with Sunday school and youth group Sunday mornings at 9:15. The Sunday School class has been learning the children's bells, they have been having fun learning!
