Are they detrimental to our well-being? Not necessarily so. Are they a waste of time and energy? They certainly take much time and require a lot of energy to accomplish. That often is why people are so frequently exhausted around the holiday season.

This brings up an important point. Are our traditions and activities based on being a worldly holiday or are they things that make it a holy day? How we answer that question determines our priorities and our values.

Let me say it again, there is not necessarily anything wrong with our traditions, but are they valuable in the eternal perspective? Who doesn't like to decorate the house or apartment? I've seen large trees and tiny trees, but nearly everyone has a tree. Do we even know why? Who doesn't like to string up lights to make the place look festive? We recently heard of a man who fell off his roof putting lights on his house, breaking his collar bone and nine ribs as well as a punctured lung. Who doesn't make every

effort to have a gift or gifts for everyone we cherish? I have noted for many years that offerings to the church in January slump significantly because of credit card debt. Who doesn't enjoy gathering with family around Christmas? Yet we hear that the season brings on the highest degree of depression than any other time of the year. Who doesn't resolve not to eat too many cookies or take that second helping of mashed potatoes and gravy as we stuff ourselves with turkey or ham? Then we spend weeks trying to lose the extra pounds we put on.

I don't want to sound like Scrooge, but do you get the point? There is so much we do out of habit or for others who do not always appreciate the slippers we gave them. Don't give up all the traditions you have participated in for years and years, but at least recognize them for the things we do that are less important than the true reason for the season.

The glitter of lights and ornaments should never overshadow the low estate of Bethlehem's manger. It is important to remember that the wise men gave gifts to Jesus, not to each other. The "let us go see" attitude of those humble shepherds should transfer to our readiness to gather together to worship the new-born King Jesus — even if it interferes with our family supper hour. While we spend so much time racking our brains to think of just the right present for each person on

your gift list, don't forget to present yourself to Jesus as a humble follower, a believer, a faithful servant.

We live in a society today where more and more people resent the greetings, the music, and the spotlight being put on our Christian values that they don't buy into. We can either sit quickly in the corner so as not to offend anyone or we can be true to our Lord and true to our own beliefs and be a person who is unashamedly willing to let the light of Jesus shine through us. Having Jesus as our Savior is eternally valuable. As Pastor Cloeter's bumper sticker said years ago: "Jesus, Don't Leave Earth without Him."

It is not my intention to put a dent in anyone's Christmas traditions. It is my hope, however, that this message does stir up your attention to make sure you focus on the true value of Christmas. See Jesus in everything we do!



Very busy year. Good to see progress made. Selling of the parsonage, parade involvement and outreach into the community, Family Camp, AV system up and running and training in progress. Now the call process is beginning with the call committee being formed.

7. Pastor's Report - Pastor Wm. Zeige Enjoys preaching and teaching. In addition to the weekly Wednesday Bible Studies, Pastor has been doing a Bible Study at Grand Manor for 38 years and meets with members of Our Redeemer and First Lutheran every other week. Nineteen members have been receiving private communion because they are unable to get out. He tries to see them every month. There are 16 students in confirmation. Four of them are in their third year and will be confirmed in the Spring. There have been 4 baptisms, 4 deaths, and 3 weddings. With his vacation, Pastor and Sue have been able to celebrate their fiftieth wedding anniversary, attend a granddaughter's high school graduation, and attend a granddaughter's confirmation. His plans are to retire at the end of the year and stated that he would be available for part-time vacancy until their house is sold.

8. Children's Ministry Program
Coordinator Report – Jessica Pellinen
This year has been very busy.
There are 24 students in Sunday

School. Release Time has a total. of 29 students registered. Youth Sunday dates have fluctuated. In January we should be back to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Sunday of each month. November 3<sup>rd</sup> will be Youth Sunday and the Christmas program will be on Wednesday, December 18th. There are youth/family events planned for each month from September to January. VBS didn't have as many adult volunteers this year, but the youth stepped up to volunteer. There were only 3 students who had no ties to our church. Ideas or suggestions on how we can better utilize our resources are welcome. In July, Jessica and 2 vouth attended the National Youth Gathering in Minneapolis. The next youth gathering will be July 9-13, 2020 in Houston, Texas. Jessica stated that she will be attending a national conference in Minneapolis November 14-16 that focuses on Rural and Small-Town Ministry. - B. **Board of Elders**: Les Flem The Elders have been leading a few worship services in Pastor's absence. He asked the question, what can we put on hold or what can you help with while we are short staffed?

  Goplin The board has a major
  need for volunteers. We reach
  out into the community through
  projects such as the house build,
  coat drive, gingerbread gifts.
  Anyone is welcome to help with a
  specific project.
- D. Board of Missions: Mary Buech -The Thanksgiving offering will go to the Second Harvest Food Bank. In January we will be supporting new missionaries, Kip and Tami Baudoin in the Ukraine. Mary also mentioned a special ministry that her brother is involved with. It is a Christian organization to improve the lives of Uganda's orphaned children. All funds totally go to the children's programs. There is a choir that tours in the US and it may be possible for them to come to Grand Rapids.
- E. **Board of Stewardship**: Doug Carlson – We are in the midst of the three weeks of Pastor's stewardship messages: The

Stewardship of Obedience, The Stewardship of Relationships, and The Stewardship of Time Management. There is a vacancy on the board. This board does not meet every month. There is also a need for more counters. Doug stated that they are gathering information about automatic withdrawal for offerings and will do a survey to see how many would be interested.

- F. Board of Trustees: Gary Rosin —
  The year has been very busy and all construction and repairs have been completed. Organ repair is scheduled for next year. The Lift is still not working. The company has been very difficult to contact and they have not shown up for repair appointments. This needs to be resolved and we possibly may need to have a lawyer send them a letter.

- H. Revolving Trust Fund Committee:

come in other than the general funds. These funds can be either designated or undesignated. Contingency fund loans can be used when offerings are down and are to be paid back. The Church Council has the ability to ask for the loan. The Radio Fund was changed to Media Fund. We are one of the few churches that have Revolving Trust Funds.

- I. Wiebe Grant Committee: Greg Taylor This grant is for the Youth and there have been no requests in the last quarter.

  Next year they will be researching Day Care possibilities.

  - 4. Constitution The new Constitution and By-Laws have been approved by the Congregation and the District.

**Adjournment –** Meeting was adjourned at 2:15PM.

Pastor closed the meeting with prayer.

NOTE: When nominations were being made there was a question as to if congregation members who were not voting members could be nominated.

After the meeting was adjourned it was discovered in the By-Laws 3.8.1 All elective offices of the congregation shall be reserved to members of the voters assembly who are at least 18 years of age. Shirley Mattfield and Erik Karkela are not voting members but they will be asked to attend the next congregation meeting and request to become voting members.
