There is an old joke that says, "Old pastors do not retire or die – they just go on and on and on." As a pastor I do not necessarily see much humor in that, and it is not entirely true. As



of this moment I am not planning on dying soon, but I am attempting the retirement part – *again.* Since I retired the first time, I have served four churches in vacancy and full-time at First Lutheran for a time.

Over the time I have served you my voice has been getting progressively weaker. This was the reason I asked lay readers to share the scripture lessons. It reduced the amount of speaking. This was especially important before this Covid-19 shutdown when Sunday mornings were three straight hours of speaking. Due to the worsening situation with my voice, chronic kidney disease, and a pancreas situation which needs recurring monitoring, it seems that this is the time to pull back from active pastoral ministry.

Pastor Steve Breitbarth, of Chisholm, has stated a willingness to serve while the congregation continues with the calling process for a full-time pastor. The members of the council and the elders will be negotiating with him to work out the details. It bothers me to leave you at this time, but I hope you all understand why I am planning on ending my time among you at the end of May or the middle of June at the latest.

At the same time, I have known Pastor Breitbarth for over 40 years and I know he will do an excellent job of caring for your spiritual needs.

It has been an honor and my pleasure to have served you at First Lutheran for these past 28 months. That does not seem like a terribly long time, but it has been time enough to feel close to you as a congregation. When Sue and I and our only child at the time arrived here 47 years ago I fell in love with Grand Rapids immediately. The first day I laid eyes on this area I could not believe how beautiful

the view was as I came down the hill on 169 and saw Pokegama Lake. I would have never guessed that we would raise five children here and live in this beautiful area for nearly half a century.

As I served the congregations in Hill City and Cohasset, I quickly became aware of how First Lutheran Church was involved in starting and sustaining the ministries I came into. First Lutheran was "the mother church" and I was in awe of you. Pastor Bentrup became my mentor before people even talked about mentors. To this day I still enjoy keeping up with my friendship with Pastor Cloeter. The ties go way back, and it has been like coming full circle to be one of those pastors with their picture hanging on the wall in the council room.

In retirement Sue and I would ideally hope to move to be closer to three of our daughters who live to the west. Our eyes are set on Detroit Lakes – one of the four churches I have served in vacancy. This strange virus situation has negatively impacted the real estate market, so we are learning patience while we wait for just the right house to pop up. The times are under God's control and we are in His hands, but those are our plans and intentions for right now. May that same gracious God also hold you in His loving hands. God's blessings to you now and always.

Elder Justice Corner: COVID-19 Scams and Fraud

Please be aware of some of the COVID-19 scams that are targeting older adults. Unfortunately, people continue to use COVID-19 as a way to manipulate and target vulnerable populations.

Counterfeit Stimulus Checks: You might receive what appears to be an authentic check (but is actually fake) with a number to call for you to verify your information. Providing this information to them is simply a way for them to gain access to your checking account so they can take your money or use your personal information to secure credit cards and other documents.

IRS Scams: Someone calls you pretending to be from the IRS saying that they need your financial information in order for you to receive your stimulus check. Don't fall for this! The IRS has told us that they will never call you unless they are returning your call. They will also not contact you via text message or on social media.

Fake COVID Vaccines/Test

Kits: Someone might try to sell you test kits or other products that they say you can use to test for the virus or that will prevent the virus. These might be vaccines, pills with high doses of Vitamin C or some kind of air filter system that they say will remove COVID-19 from the air in your home. There is no cure or vaccine for this virus and testing is only available from your medical professional or through your local and state governments. And, none of these are delivered to your house.

Errands-Grocery-

shopping/Medication Pick-up: Be careful of someone you don't know calling to offer to run errands for you such as grocery shopping and picking up medications or other supplies. These individuals will take your cash and never be seen again, leaving you empty-handed.

Scams Targeting Your Social

Security Benefits: Someone is calling you to say that, due to COVID-19, your Social Security benefits will be decreased or suspended unless you provide personal information or send them money to maintain regular benefit payments during this period.

Whether by text, email or letter, any communication saying that you will not receive your benefits due to COVID-19 is a scam.

Online Shopping: Many of us are now going online to buy groceries, medical masks and cleaning supplies. Be sure to purchase these goods directly from an established store or internet service that offers contactless delivery. Some others may not even have the goods that you're trying to order Do not include this as a link, just list like the others.

Person in Need Scams: This is a variation of the grandchild scam. Someone might contact you claiming to be a grandchild, friend, or relative who is ill or stranded someplace and needs for you to send them money. They might also ask you to keep it a secret. Hang up and call the person they're pretending to be to see if they are okay. Do not send money unless you are sure their story checks out.

<u>Census Scam</u>: Census scammers may contact you by phone, email, regular mail or visit you seeking your personal and financial information. They may also tell you that this information is required before you can receive your stimulus check. Real Census workers will never ask for financial information and receiving your stimulus check is not connected with completing the Census.

WHO ARE OUR NEIGHBORS?

How have you been feeling over the last two and a half months staying home? Have you noticed one minute you are happy and then the next minute you feel anxious, angry, tired, confused as to what is going on? Why are we doing what we are doing? In my last newsletter article, I stated that we are all in the same storm but different boats. Each one of us is affected differently. Each one of you is experiencing something different. Perhaps you don't know why your feelings are all over the place, if you stop to think about it, we are all grieving. If you have ever lost a loved one you know all to well what grief is, and it can just hit you at any moment. We are all grieving the life we used to have and the things we used to be able to do.

Grief has stages and you don't experience them in order. The five stages of grief are denial and isolation, anger, bargaining, depression and acceptance. Keep in mind that we all grieve differently and not in the same order.

Here are some scriptures that talk about grief.

Psalm 34:18 The Lord is near to the brokenhearted and saves the crushed in spirit.

Matthew 5:4 "Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted."

Luke 6:21 "...Blessed are you who weep now, for you shall laugh."

God gave us free will. He wanted us to be able to make our own decisions and choose right from wrong. Although in a perfect world we would never sin, but sin was

passed down to us from Adam and Eve. We all have the right to choose for ourselves. Right now, our choices have been taken away and that can make some of us incredibly angry, bitter, hurt, anxious, scared, same may even feel happy. When our feelings start to overwhelm us, we need to stop and pray. Psalm 46:10 Be still and know that I am God. Stop what you are doing and be silent. Even if you don't know what to pray for, just be silent. God knows what is on your heart. Ask him for peace and love. When we get angry it is easy for us to take it out on our loved ones. But before we speak what if we walked away and was just silent? Sometimes I can feel the blood start to boil in my veins and I want to pounce, but I ask Jesus to keep me calm, give my heart peace and show love and kindness and not anger.

These times are uncertain, and we don't know what the future holds. For some of us that can be particularly challenging, some of us love living in the moment and do not care what the future holds. I cannot tell you what the outcome of this pandemic is. What I can tell you is I am starting to see how we are dividing instead of coming together. Since we are being told to stay away from others, is that driving us apart? I pray that is not the case.

I came across a study on the Art of Neighboring and I thought what a great way to share the love of Jesus with our neighbors and go back to how things used to be. You know when you could call your neighbor for a cup of sugar or stop over just to say hi. We have seen so many crimes on the news that we fear our neighbors now. We lock our doors, our vehicles, we keep ourselves isolated to the outside world. Some of you I am sure are wonderful neighbors. For those that forgot what it is to be a neighbor I invite you to join my class starting June 3rd at noon for six weeks. This will be a virtual class on Zoom, but it does have a book that we will work through. There will be a cost of \$10.75 to cover the cost of the book and materials. Please RSVP to me as soon as you can as I only have 10 copies on hand. I will order more if needed.

THE ART OF NEIGHBORING

Hmm, is there an art to be a good neighbor? Are you a good neighbor? Romans 13: 8-10 Owe no one anything, except to love each other, for the one who loves another has fulfilled the law. For the commandments, "You shall not commit adultery, You shall not murder, You shall not steal, You shall not covet," and any other commandment, are summed up in this word: Love does no wrong to a neighbor; therefore love is the fulfilling of the law. The Bible tells us to love our neighbor as you love yourself. Who is our neighbor? When we think of our neighbor as everyone around us, we don't take it seriously to learn more about them. We tend to put them in a generalized category. That would be too many people to get to know, right? What if we focused on our actual neighbors? Now in order to love them you must first get to know them. Think about your eight closest neighbors, do you know their names? How well do you know them? Do you feel comfortable calling them if you need help with something or to borrow a cup of sugar or a couple of eggs?

The last few months have had a dramatic. change to us all. Have you felt comfortable checking in on your neighbors to see how they are doing? I know I am asking a lot of questions, but I wanted you to really think about your neighbors and how well you know them. Think of the impact you can have just in your own neighborhood. In the book "The Art of Neighboring" a group of pastors went to their Mayor and asked how they could change the city. The Mayor said that so many people rely on government subsidies that if they could just rely on their neighbors that would help lighten the load on the programs. Think about how you can have such a huge impact by just being a good neighbor and living the way the Bible tells us to live.

To some this does not come easily. So, for that I am going to hold a virtual study on how to get to know your neighbor.
Starting June 3rd at noon, I am going to hold a virtual class on The Art of Neighboring.
We are going to dive into how we can get to know our neighbors and where to start. For six weeks we will meet.

Week 3: The fear factor

Week 4: Motives matter

Week 5: The art of receiving

Week 6: Peacemaking



Call to order: Dwight K. called the meeting to order at 5:30PM.

Opening devotion and prayer: Pastor Zeige shared a devotion and prayer referencing the Benediction and emphasizing the word "keep". God is still in control and He is keeping us strong and faithful.

- ***Motion was made, seconded and approved to go forward with the first quarter budgeted funds in the amount of \$750.00 to be set aside for the National Youth Gathering.
- 9. Organ Repair Funding Jennifer stated that the tear down was to take place on May 7th & 8th, but was postponed because of a Covid19 issue within the company. Payment of \$20,000 will be given to them at tear down. Greg T. stated that the money for the final payment is available from the Revolving Trust Fund and the committee will be looking at that.

New Business

- ***Motion was made, seconded and approved to authorize Shirley to set a date in October for the Memorial Blood Drive
- ***Please note that Shirley clarified that this will be an American Red Cross Blood Drive not a Memorial Blood Drive. The date has been scheduled for September 3rd.
- 2. Vacancy Pastor Report Les stated that Pastor Steve Breitbarth has agreed to be our Vacancy Pastor. He would like to have a Zoom Meeting with the church council and elders to ask questions to be sure we have the same expectations.

- 3. Return to Church Plan Les stated that it depends on what restrictions are still in place. Jessica has been looking at the insurance guidelines.
