# Notes from the Pastor's Desk

But the LORD God called to the man and said to him, "Where are you?" <sup>10</sup> And he said, "I heard the sound of you in the garden, and I was afraid, because I was naked, and I hid myself." <sup>ESV</sup> Genesis 3:9.

She had come into the church about ten minutes after the service began. Slipping in the front door she sat in the back so that she might not be noticed. After the sermon was preached and the congregation

began to sing, she began to gather her belongings and head for the door. She wanted to stay anonymous, hidden, and in her mind... safe. She had been burned, hurt, and betrayed before by ministers and churches. In fact, she struggled with why she felt compelled to go into another church, even if she was determined to remain anonymous.

The greatest hurts in our lives come when those we trust wound us when we are vulnerable and exposed. The scars that are left on our memory from pastors and church members remain for a lifetime as we think back on the failures and hostility we faced when we needed them the most. These memories can even send us down the slippery slope of not just seeing the individuals that hurt us through the lens of pain, but we tend to transfer our hurt and spite on to the whole of Christianity.

The reality is we are all broken and have made tremendous mistakes in our lives, some of which we are still living with the consequences. This is true regardless of whether you are a pastor, member of a congregation, or never dared enter a church again. We all are as Adam and Eve, hiding in the thicket, trying to prevent our shame to be seen. We long for covering, so we clothe ourselves with self-righteousness, anger, judgmental stares, and we use words to deflect attention from ourselves and extort those around us we have deemed "worse off." I wish this was only true in the churches, but it is seen in the workplace, at home around the dinner table, and it prevails on social media. The reason why it hurts so much when it comes from a church is because that is the one place we have been promised to be welcomed, embraced, cared for, and forgiven for our failures: not exploited and victimized.

When God found Adam and Eve hiding in the garden because of their shame, he did not stand them up in front of all creation and humiliate them. He did not berate them, call them names, scoff at them, or turn his back on them. He immediately, after explaining the consequences of their actions, began to explain His plan to restore them (Genesis 3:15). Yes, our Lord sent them out of the garden, but that was only for their protection from the Tree of Life. He did not want to chance them having to live eternally with their sin. Instead, He removed them and moved to them, where they were at. He met them in their vulnerability, their weakness, and not just them but also Abraham, Jacob, Moses, David, Elijah, Luke, Paul, and the whole world including you and me. Think of the woman caught in adultery, the vertically challenged tax collector, or the thief on the cross. Did He hurl insults or stare judgmentally at them or did He move in compassion to their need?

Spiritual and religious trauma is a real thing. So many Christians from all denominations are haunted by the sins committed against them by their past churches. They feel as though they must go it alone when it comes to their faith or stay anonymous if they could bring themselves to go to another church. Some wounds run even deeper, where the pain they carry has petrified their heart toward the faith. It is part of our calling in this time and place to reach out to these children of God estranged by the past actions of their fellow brothers and sisters in Christ. Every day is an opportunity to show how God does not turn His back on us or them, but supplies us what we need, primarily the forgiveness only found in Christ. The church is a place where incredibly imperfect people come to an incredibly gracious God to be restored by Him.

That woman, who came to church a few minutes late and planned on leaving before the service concluded, forgot about the elderly man she walked by in the entrance of the church when she took her seat. But he did not forget about her. You see, he is a Vietnam Vet, and still remembers being spit on in the airport and called names. How his friends turned on him as if he were evil, and even the church he went to at the time, including the pastor, treated him with disdain. He spent many years away from the church and had done "the anonymous Christian" life he was witnessing in this woman. That's why when she got up, he had already poured her a cup of coffee and was waiting by the entrance. He didn't ask her to stay but walked her to her car. But in that 3-minute conversation things were said that she couldn't get out of her mind all week. That's why she went back the following Sunday and after the service stood in the parking lot drinking her coffee with him learning his story. To her amazement, a few years later she was the head of the mercy team at that congregation.

Church ministry is not about the big sanctuary, the huge numbers on Sunday morning, or the perfect appearance of the lives of the members. It is about the broken individual that makes up the body of Christ. It is about the pain their conscience is feeling, the hurts of their past, and the victory found in our Resurrected Lord for them. Church ministry is about God using each of us, just as he did the Vietnam Vet, to touch the lives

and daily trials of His children, one moment at a time with His grace. His grace is what controls us; not our self-righteousness, judgment, or our anger to deflect attention away from our vulnerability and shame.

There are a lot of hurting and isolated people out there reeling from the hurts caused by people in the church. Please pray for the opportunity to speak with them, even if it is only for three minutes, and give them a glimpse into your vulnerability and how Jesus met you there. Give them a taste of genuine faith, as you live out your calling to be the image of Christ in this world (John 13:34-35). If you are reading this and have been relating to the woman in the opening story, please know you may feel alone in your pain, but you are not alone in your experiences. Please find someone to talk to and if you have no one, know that my office is always open if you would like to visit. Through it all, may God be given all the glory!

On a different note! I wanted to thank you all for the generous and gracious outpouring of love that you have shown my family and I since we arrived and even before that. The meals that you provided were amazing, and the reception after my installation was phenomenal. All of the notes, the brief chats, and greetings we have received have been so warm and welcoming. Thank all so very much. You have blessed us in so many ways already, and we hope to be a blessing to you and your family as well.

# LUTHERAN INDIAN MINISTRIES

Pastor Rick McCafferty (Iñupiat) was unloading his vehicle in preparation for one of our Sacred Ground training workshops when a young man approached him, saying he'd been in town for a few days to take care of some business but needed to get back to his family. He was without transportation and asked Rick if he might get a ride.

Rick spoke with his ministry team and they all agreed to help. Before leaving town, they stopped at a nearby church where the man could pick up some food for his family. During the ride to the reservation, a stranger became a friend as the man shared his story of struggle, addiction, and steps toward recovery. While his story was uniquely his own, it also sounded sadly familiar to Rick, resembling similar stories of others we serve.



Upon arrival, the team unloaded food and water, while the children chattered excitedly ... happy to see their dad, hungry for food, and delighted by the appearance of unexpected guests. Rick and his teammates left the reservation in tears. They agreed they had experienced a divine encounter orchestrated by God Himself. During Rick's three weeks in the area, he visited the family multiple times, sharing food, grace, and hope in Christ.

"I am so thankful to our God for bringing me out of my own hopelessness many years ago and into the healing grace of Jesus Christ," says Rick, "so that I can — through the Holy Spirit — be a blessing to my Native people. I am thankful for our donors, for faithful and steadfast support, which allows us to stay on the front lines of ministry and to hear Native youth, men and women exclaim

(as they did at a recent baptism), 'I'm going to heaven!'"

# Letter From The Beaudoin's In the Ukraine (Our Missionaries)

February and March have been busy months for us. With the start of the Lenten season, quarantine lifting a bit, and our students inviting friends to class our

days fly by. The progress the students have been making is impressive. They have been more diligent about coming to class and doing their home tasks. There has also been more student participation in the lessons. The adults seem to enjoy the games more than our younger students. Classes are filled with laughter and joking. At the end of the lesson, they all bang on the tables. This is the custom instead of clapping. Seeing their faces and the confidence growing in them makes us feel so good. God and faith have been coming into the discussions. We have both been asked "Why are you teaching in Ukraine?" We answer that God brought us here. That usually opens a whole discussion.

There have been birthday celebrations after services on Sundays. These are filled with laughter, food, sweets, and stories. We've had three celebrations this month. The congregation gathers, toasts the guests of honor celebrating their birthdays, and then we eat. After we eat everyone watches a film about Jesus and the apostles. It is a series and quite good. The episodes bring up points for discussion from the congregation members. We enjoy these opportunities of fellowship with the congregation. Sharing these moments has brought us closer to the people we serve. Now we are asked to go shopping, or out for coffee. When we see our members around town, they come over to greet us. Vigorously they shake our hands and say "hello" and "how are you" in English. This gives us encouragement and has forged some very strong friendships.

We have two new programs in the development stage. One is an English class centered around cooking. One week we will prepare an American dish and the next week someone from the group will teach the class how to cook one of their favorite dishes. The second is an English speaker's discussion group. Each session we will speak on three topics. There has been interest in this group. The members want to practice while we are in the United States for home service. This way their English-speaking skills would not atrophy while we are away.

Humanitarian aid is one of our focuses for the mission going forth. Members of the congregation have expressed that they would like to provide mercy aid to the community. The congregation already supplies patients in the hospital with clothes that have been donated. There is an interest in expanding this to the homeless and elderly. We were approached about using the cooking class to feed those in need. We could do this by

having the cooking class participants hand out meals on their way home from the class. These along with the Orphan Grain Train program are goals for the coming months. We would need volunteers from the congregation to fill out the paperwork that powers the supply of food and goods to the area. The congregation is very active and we don't believe that getting volunteers will be an issue.

We are looking forward to the coming months of fellowship and faith as Easter approaches. We will have been here for one year on March 13th and the time has flown by!

We are excited about the summer camps, new programming, and reaching out to the community in the coming months.

Thank you for your support! May God bless you and may the joy of the Resurrection fill your lives and hearts.

"There are three conversions necessary to every man: the head, the heart, and the purse." Attributed to Luther, though yet to be located in his vast writings, this statement echoes what Jesus taught about hearts and treasures. He said, "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." (Matthew 6:21; Luke 12:34)

But which conversion comes first? I submit that the order is this: first the head, then the purse, then the heart. Let's explore this topic.

Our Lord Jesus Christ dwelt among us to save us. He took on our flesh, fulfilled the demands of the law in our place, became sin for us, and suffered torture and death on our behalf. He did this in order that we would be free from sin, death, and hell. He gives us what He accomplished through Baptism, Absolution, and the Lord's Supper. And so, He doesn't just do it for us but gives it to us. He makes what He did ours by making us His. Thus, we are called by His name: Christians. We have a new life in Him.

Through the preaching of Law and Gospel, God grants us repentance, a changing of our minds. It is a conversion of the mind. We are called to turn away from our sins and turn toward Him for forgiveness, life, and salvation. For when God calls us away from something, He is, at the same time, calling us to something.

And thus, He calls us to a new life, with new deeds. This is the conversion of the purse. Jesus said that "it is easier for a camel to enter through the eye of a needle than for a rich person to enter the kingdom of God." (Matthew 19:24) "For where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." Notice that our hearts follow our treasures, not the other way around. As Christians, God calls us to invest our treasures in His Kingdom to ensure that the gospel is preached and the sacraments are administered. He calls us to share all good

things with the one who teaches us the doctrines of Christ. He calls us to be generous in giving to the church, for it is more blessed to give than to receive.

So where is your treasure? If it is not invested in the kingdom of God, then the only response is repentance - a conversion of the heart - and to begin doing just that. And as our Lord promised, where your treasure is there your heart will be also.

This is not to say that you earn your way into heaven. It is simply to say that as Christians, those who have been made to be temples of the Holy Spirit, who have been given a new life in Christ, who are dead to sin and now alive in Him, we are actually to live – think (conversion of the mind), do (conversion of the purse), and be (conversion of the heart) – a new life in Him. And when you fail, know that God in Christ loves and forgives you and still calls you away from that and to Himself.
