

Pastors Corner

Many people make New Year's Resolutions. During Biblical Times, the Babylonians would make promises to their gods at the start of each year. The Romans would begin each year by making promises to the god Janus, for whom the month of January is named. This tradition has many other religious parallels.

If you have made a New Year's Resolution, what are you planning to do? The Old Testament Reading for Sunday, January 3, is from 1 Kings 3:4-15. The reading begins with God speaking to King Solomon with this request, "God said, 'Ask what I shall give you.'" Just imagine that, God is telling King Solomon that he can ask God for one special Blessing, it can be anything-the sky's the limit. If God came to you with this request, what would you ask for? Would you ask for more money? More and new friends? A new house or a new car? What do you suppose King Solomon asked God for? He didn't ask God for money, friends or a new chariot, but he asked God for wisdom, "Give your servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people, that I may discern between good and evil, for who is able to govern this your great people?" Just imagine that, King Solomon could have asked for anything but he asked God for Wisdom. The wisdom to not only make the right decisions but also the wisdom necessary to lead God's People with sensitivity, compassion and empathy.

How many times haven't we gotten so wrapped up in our own personal needs and wants that we tend to overlook the wants and needs of other people? To me the words of Jesus, ring so true, Matthew 7:12 "So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them" and the words of Hebrews 13:2 "Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for thereby some have entertained angels unawares".

As God's People let's begin the new year, 2021, with Matthew 7:12 and Hebrews 13:2 as our New Year's Resolution!

A very faithful reader writes: Merely by coincidence, two newly shelved books in our library by completely different authors, have a similar theme – two young pregnant girls from disastrous backgrounds with no chance of ever having a hope-filled life:

BEFORE I SAW YOU by Amy Sorrells, 813.54 Sor and DEAR CAROLINA by Kristy Woodson Harvey, 813.6 Har.

After reading these, it reminds me of Gen. 18:14 where God says "Is anything too hard for the Lord?"

FLIGHT RISK by Cara Putman, 813.6 Put. "Cara Putman does it again. A plane crash, murders, a traumatized teen, and a crack lawyer who will do whatever it takes to protect her family and her clients. Throw in a little romance and **FLIGHT RISK** is a brilliantly woven story that takes the reader on a breathstealing ride. I highly recommend this book." Lynette Eason, author of The Blue Justice Series. "In her legal thriller, Putman weaves a story that proves what you read in the news isn't always what it appears to be. Separating truth from what is perceived to be true takes her characters on a journey with twists and turns that will keep the reader turning the pages, anxious to see how it all fits together." FRAGMENTS OF FEAR by Carrie Stuart Parks, 813.6. Par, is one of the 2020 new books. LCMS Stewardship Ministry Newsletter article – January 2021

It's a new year. It's a time when we take stock of the year past in order to improve the year to come. It's a time when we sit down to plan and implement what we want to accomplish and even change. Part of that is planning our stewardship for the coming year. Often, we find this difficult and daunting and even joyless, but it doesn't have to be. In fact, it is really quite simple and full of joy. So, here are some tips to make that planning less stressful. You begin by answering these three questions:

- Who are you?
- To whom do I give?
- And how much?

So, who are you? The Table of Duties in the *Luther's Small Catechism* informs us. Are you a hearer of God's Word? Are you a citizen of society? Are you a member of a family? Stewardship covers these three estates: church, society, and family. We don't particularly struggle to give to society or family. Our struggles, our difficulties, and our questions arise in giving to the Church.

So, what is our duty as members of the Church with regard to giving? Again, the Table of Duties, gives us a guide. If you are a hearer – a member of the Church who receives instruction – St. Paul taught: "Let the one who is taught the word share all good things with the one who teaches" (Gal. 6:6). This means the local congregation is primary. Your pastor is the one called to preach the Gospel to you and administer the Lord's blessed sacraments to you. Your congregation is the place where those things happen. Thus, when God calls us to give to the Church, He has the local congregation in mind. For "the Lord commanded that those who proclaim the gospel should get their living by the gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14).

How much do we give to the local congregation? Our only instructions are to give:

- Regularly (1 Cor. 6:1–2);
- Proportionally (1 Cor. 16:1–2; 2 Cor. 8:12);
- Generously (2 Cor. 8:20);
- Of our first fruits (Gen. 4:4; Prov. 3:9; Lev. 27:30); and
- With a spirit of eagerness (2 Cor. 9:2), earnestness (2 Cor. 8:7), cheerfulness (2 Cor. 9:7), and love (2 Cor. 8:23).

In other words, giving to the Church is not to be an afterthought, given after everything else is spent. In this way, it is deliberate. We give regularly – weekly, biweekly, monthly,

quarterly, or yearly – keeping in mind our own strengths, weaknesses, and limitations. We set it aside beforehand – before anything else is spent.

From those first fruits, we set aside a proportionate and generous amount. Ten percent was the standard for the Israelites. This was a command for the ancient Israelites. We can give as much as we want, but ask yourself: Do we really want to be less generous than was commanded of the Israelites? Is the job of the New Testament Church bigger or smaller than the job given to Israel?

And how are we to give it? We give it with eagerness and earnestness. We give it cheerfully and with love, not out of compulsion. For through the preaching of the Gospel and the administration of the sacraments, God has made us His children, forgiven us all our sins, given us grace upon grace, promised us life everlasting with Him in His kingdom, and filled us with His own Spirit, the Holy Spirit. This makes giving a joy, as Jesus said, "it is more blessed to give than to receive" (Acts 20:35).

It's that easy. And it is joyful. For in stewardship, our gracious and giving Lord invites us to take part in the work that He accomplishes here on earth, providing for the ongoing preaching of the Gospel as well as those who are in need. Taking part in that makes all our work holy – work that is done in service to the Lord as priestly members of His kingdom.

Newsletter from Tamara Beaudoin Focus

I had my newsletter ready to go out. After returning home I was rereading it and doing some final editing when I realized the focus was all wrong. I was focusing on the pandemic, my job, missing our holiday traditions and our family. Focus is where you pay particular attention to, or where you apply your efforts and thoughts. Where was I focusing? On me.

See, on my way home, when I looked up from my feet, I saw a man lying on the sidewalk sleeping. He had a blue tarp for a blanket. Next to him was a dog, carefully watching each person as they passed. Then I looked to my right. Next to the parking lot there were people laying under trees sleeping. Some young Ukrainian people saw the look on my face and said "Ameri-caan-skee". First, I was angry, then I thanked God for the focus.

Right now, we all are experiencing hard times. We are going without family, friends, traditions, maybe jobs, food, spouses and security. One of the devil's weapons is fear. Yes, I am afraid. Seeing people sleeping on the ground in winter, and most of them elderly, scared me. This COVID-19 virus scares me. Fear can be paralyzing or motivating. I know that God is with us and will never leave us. I got motivated!

When I got home, I started talking to Kipp about what I saw. It crushed me when he said, "We need to focus our efforts. If we try to do everything, nothing will get done. One step at a time." Kipp is so good for me! So, we brainstormed how to focus our efforts and still do what we can for the people of Ukraine. We floated an idea around some of our friends, and it got rave reviews. We are working the details out and getting permission from Bishop Maschewski. Keep tuned for further updates.

Kipp is teaching a teen discussion group that started with three students and now has six. This group has potential of growing quickly and making a big impact. My English beginner's group is static with attendance of 10-15 people each session. Both Kipp and I take it personally when class attendance is light. Realistically, we know other factors affect attendance, and we remind each other of that often. Our private lessons have picked up as well. I moved four of my students over to Kipp as they can now converse and read well. Our college students told us that a professor at the university announced to her students that there are free English lessons being taught by Americans at the cathedral. That's where we got seven new students from. A Ukrainian sailor is now attending my beginner's English class and said he would spread the word to his shipmates. This is such a joy!

Youth News

"in all things" National Youth Gathering 2022 Houston, Texas It has been 1½ years since Abbie Serfling, Tijanna Lattimore and I attended the National Youth Gathering in Minneapolis. It does not seem like it was that long ago. In a short 1½ years is the next National Youth Gathering held in Houston Texas.

In only 1½ years we need to prepare and get ready to attend the next gathering. Who is going to attend in 2022? Will it be your youth, will you be a chaperone? The National Youth Gathering is held every three years around the United States. The 2022 Gathering theme is "in all things" based on Colossians 1:15-20. He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. For by him all things were created, in heaven and on earth, visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or authorities-all things were created through him and for him. And he is before all things, and in him all things hold together. And he is the head of the body, the church. He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in everything he might be preeminent. For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of the cross. The main talking points of these verses and what will be emphasized throughout the gathering are:

- 1. Christ is the Creator of all things and became a creature Himself, entering into His own creation.
- 2. Christ reconciles all things to himself through his death and resurrection.
- 3. Christ (risen, ascended, complete, sovereign) reigns over all authorities inside and outside the church.
- 4. Christ transforms the lives of all his people into his image. (The Lord and Master of all became the servant of all to show us how he would have us live [by the Spirit's enlivening power] in service to him and others.)
- 5. Christ promises to return to restore all things and make his reign explicit for all to see.

The National Youth Gathering (NYG) is an experience like no other for the youth. They come together with thousands of other youth and adults to proclaim the Lordship of Jesus Christ and God's saving grace to His people through Christ. Those that attend will grow in their personal relationship with God and grow in their fellowship of Word and Sacrament in Christ's Church. The Youth Gathering is a vehicle by which the Church reaches out to, cares for, and affirms young people, both churched and unchurched. It

also equips youth and adults for ministry and vocational service in a variety of settings in their congregations, communities, and world. Youth Gatherings celebrate the meaning of Christian joy in all of life's situations, including transitions and crisis. It also recognizes and affirms the diversity of God's people.

Any youth that is at least 14 years to 19 years old on July 9th, 2022, or entering his or her ninth-grade year at the time of the gathering may attend. Any young adult age 19-25 is encouraged to apply to be a Young Adult Volunteer (YAV). The YAVs get to work behind the scenes and help the Gathering run smoothly.

You might be wondering why we are talking about the NYG when it is still 1½ years away. Well, we need the youth that are interested in going to start praying about this trip. Praying about this trip to determine if they are willing and wanting to commit to growing in their relationship with God by attending. We will soon need their commitment to attend. It takes a lot of work in planning and preparing to attend an event like this, especially with it so far away. Knowing who is interested and committed to go, will help in the planning stages as we look at transportation options. A commitment form will be mailed out to all youth that will be eligible to attend in late January early February. If you have friends that would be interested in going, please let me know I would be happy to send them information. We will not turn anyone away. It also takes a lot of money to go, starting to fundraise now eases the burden in the future. This could be a huge blessing for families if they do not have to pay anything out of pocket.

You may be wondering how COVID-19 will change the event. As of right now they are planning to move forward with the gathering, the planning team is in constant contact with Houston officials and will keep a close eye on the pandemic at hand. If anything needs to change, they will communicate with us on what that will look like.

For everyone else that cannot attend, please pray for the youth that are thinking about attending. We have 19 eligible youth from First Lutheran that can attend in 2022.
