### **What's a Conflict of Interest, and why does it matter?**

A Conflict of Interest (COI) occurs in scientific publishing when an author, or someone they're connected with, directly or indirectly financially benefits or appears to financially benefit from the publishing of a manuscript.

COIs can be concerning in science because external pressure or motivation could cause the author, their results, and their interpretation to be consciously or unconsciously biased – which can make a study less reliable. Researchers are expected to declare any and all possible COIs so the reader can have all the facts necessary to determine whether the research can be trusted.

Example COIs include (but are not limited to):

- A soda manufacturer publishes a blind taste test showing participants preferred their soda over a competitor's
- Student authors are testing how effective a new antibiotic is; the antibiotic is produced by a company one of the adult authors works for
- The research on a new antiviral medicine was funded by a pharmaceutical company developing new products
- The senior author's spouse is on the board of directors for a company that developed the location-tracking software a student author used in their research
- One of the authors on a study about the safety of a certain medical device was paid by the device's manufacturer to be an expert witness during a trial
