I've had Holy Communion on my mind this week. We will share in the Sacrament of Holy Communion during our worship hour this Sunday, just as we do on every first Sunday. As you gather on Sunday, or as we regether. I'd like you to take notice of the white cleths.

are worshipping together, I'd like you to take notice of the white cloths covering the Communion elements. Have you ever thought of why they are covered with a white cloth?

First, there is no scriptural basis for covering the elements. Scripture is simply silent on the subject. Scripture certainly speaks to the practice of the Sacrament and gives guidance on its administration, but the covering of the elements with a cloth is never mentioned. So why do we do it?

A study of church history shows that early on the church began covering the elements for communion. Some have suggested that it is an attempt to make known that which had been previously veiled. Or it is an act of reverence and respect. Both are good options for a theological understanding of covering the elements. But it also has a practical application. It keeps the bread and wine clean and undefiled. That's right, the big practical reason for the coverings... to keep the flies away. They keep the bad stuff out!

Our Methodist understanding of Holy Communion is that it is a Means of Grace. We believe Grace is present in the elements and in our consumption of them. We believe that by regularly experiencing the broken body and poured out blood of Jesus, we receive Grace. We believe the more Grace we receive, the more we begin to take on the love of Jesus and incorporate it into our lives. And that helps keep the real bad stuff out!


