
doesn't happen that fast.

We also know that they will look a whole lot better if we don't ignore them by providing fertilizer, water at times, weed control, and pest control. But there's a big difference between yard maintenance and spiritual maturity. For yard maintenance, we can generally take a break during the winter. But in order for us to continue to grow spiritually, we can't take a break. Not even in the summer. So I want to encourage you to continue your spiritual growth! Continue the disciplines mentioned above to do everything in your power to be a mature follower of Jesus!


