

President's Message

This year we had to accept the resignation of two of our board members for health reasons. Stephen Heaton has served on our board since 2014, several years as president and Gary Bullock has served as our Cemetery Chief Operations Manager since 2010. We owe a great deal of thanks to these two gentlemen for their long and dedicated service. We are fortunate to have 2 new nominees for board members. Ron Grice and Andrew Murray have long histories in the area and come with a variety of skills and experiences. The future of our volunteer Willowbank Cemetery Board is in good hands as we move forward. We look forward to working together as a team.



We have focused much of our energy this year on the cemetery site. The new columbarium, which was originally scheduled for installation in September 2024, has not yet arrived. After serious enquiries by our vendor to his sources overseas, we have learned that the purchase order was lost in the administration process. Recently reordered and at the same price, we have now been promised delivery in the spring of 2026. Jim and Tom are not yet accepting "orders" or deposits, but are keeping an informal list of potential interment rights purchasers.

The Spring Clean-up was a success, critically following the March ice storm. This event also gave us an opportunity to meet a number of nearby Willowbank residents. We found out that many people in the area love Willowbank Cemetery as much as we do and so inspired us to create a *Friends of Willowbank Cemetery* group. Such friends would be willing to help out with one-time activities in support of the cemetery such as the Spring Clean-up Day. The goal is to get the wider community involved and we feel this is a good way to raise the profile of our cemetery and thereby ensure its ongoing sustainability. The Friends of Willowbank would communicate through Facebook and an email list rather than just the twice yearly newsletters. We have arranged for a local contractor to repair a number of our older memorial stones that have toppled over or are at risk of toppling over either due to tree damage or ground settling. This will be an extensive project and is expected to continue for several years.

One of the changes most likely to affect our Interment Rights Holders is a policy change to increase the capacity of our in-ground plots. Prior to this change, the capacity of a standard 4'x10' plot was either (a) one full sized traditional casket interment and one cremation urn interment OR (b) two urns . We reviewed these capacities and determined there would usually be physical space for a third urn in a standard plot. This change would provide more options for our families and allow for a more efficient use of our available land. Accordingly, we have changed our policy so that



families can retain the original capacity of their existing or new plot or have the option, with an incremental cost of one-half of the standard price for interment rights, in their existing or new plot, upgrade the capacity to either (a) <u>one</u> full sized casket interment and <u>two</u> cremation urns, OR (b) <u>three</u> cremation urns.

In 2026 we are making plans for the installation of our new 48 niche columbarium, a complete review of our by-laws, renewal of our charitable status, development of a policy on the location of benches, tree care and maintenance, and repainting our memorial gateway.

Please accept my best wishes to you, our Willowbank families, for the holiday season and the new year.

Obituary for Alia Hogben

We would like to share the obituary of this notable and well loved member of our community. She will be greatly missed by her family, friends and colleagues:

Remarkable retired social worker and Muslim feminist Alia Hogben died at Brockville General Hospital on June 16, 2025, surrounded by her immediate family. She was one of those women who lights up a room, welcomes everyone with a warm smile and earns the love of countless people across the country. Alia never let her beauty go to her head and instead was very modest but was not afraid to stand up for people and issues she believed in.

Alia was a much-loved lady among her family, a former program supervisor with the Ontario Ministry of Community and Social Services and later the first executive director of the Canadian Council of Muslim Women from 2002 until 2018. Born in Rangoon, Burma, in 1937 and fleeing to India during the war, Alia first came to Canada in

1954 as a daughter of the High Commissioner of India from whom she inherited her great devotion to books and ideas.

In 1959, after a struggle with her family, she was allowed to marry William Murray Hogben whom she met at Carleton University in Ottawa, and they lived in Toronto with their children, Noorjehan India, Ameera Minna, and Omar William.

In 1973, Alia and Murray moved to Kingston and soon to their ever-expanding Marshview Farm, near Gananoque. Alia was involved with the Muslim Society of Toronto and the Islamic Society of Kingston. and became a very strong Muslim feminist and advocate for all girls and women. A critical Muslim, Alia did not bow to what she considered unnecessary male traditions. She also travelled widely around the world to Muslim women's conferences, including speaking to Musawah and as a representative of Foreign Affairs Canada from Damascus to Rome. Alia and Murray also visited from Morocco to India on various occasions, and she took a great interest in the wider world, including despairing of the current India and Gaza.

Alia received honorary doctorates from Queen's University and the University of Toronto and was appointed to the Order of Canada in 2012. Alia was then invited to accompany then–Governor General David Johnson on a delegation to the King of Sweden in 2017. In 2014 she was featured in a MacLean's Magazine issue on "The 50 most important people in Canada." Alia also wrote a number of articles for books and until recently a monthly column on women, Islam and other issues for The Kingston Whig–Standard.

Alia was one of ten children of Dr. Mohammed Abdul Rauf of Rangoon and Maqsood Jehan Begum Meer of Allahabad, India. She was predeceased by five of her siblings, Qudsia, Saleem, Naseem, Raheem and Ameen, as well as her beloved daughter Ameera in 2015. She is survived by her much-loved surviving children Noor (John Henson) and Omar (Wendy Fu) and by grandchildren Bibijehan, Shakoor, and Isra Henson, and by Reza Hogben, and countless grieving relatives. Alia was interred in Willowbank Cemetery. Alia will be forever missed by her husband Murray of the past 66 years. "From God we come and to Him do we return."

Mary See: The Sweet Smell of Success



Mary Wiseman was born on September 15, 1854 on Howe Island. Mary was 20 years old when she married Alexander See, with whom she assisted in managing a successful hotel on Tremont Park Island just off Gananoque. Their son Charles was born in 1882. Their daughter May became a nurse and daughter Bertha married and moved to Toronto. Charles went north to the Algoma district of Ontario during the 'Goldrush' of the early 20th century. He owned a couple of shops and was quite successful until the devastating Great Porcupine Fire of 1911 wiped out several towns and killed at least 70 people. He tried his luck again, this time opening a business in Toronto. Alex See died in 1911 making Mary a widow at 64. Not long after that a fire destroyed the Hotel on Tremont Park Island. Maybe because she had nothing left to lose, Mary agreed to join her son Charles and his family when he decided to pick up stakes in Canada and move to Pasadena, California.

No doubt Mary See's years of managing a hotel gave her the skills to produce food that would keep her clientele coming back for more. Her candy recipes in particular were big favourites.

Her son Charles recognized his mother's talent and opened up a small candy shop in Los Angeles in 1921. Mary See took pride in her candy and only used the finest ingredients and never skimped on quality. Her candies soon became famous and so production increased and more shops were opened. Even during the dark days of The Depression, when other companies used cheaper ingredients or reduced the size of their product, See's Candy maintained their quality control. They found that people were willing to pay for a special treat if the product was exceptional.

Mary See's Candy was so highly respected for its quality and brand recognition in Western United States that in 1972 Warren Buffett of Berkshire Hathaway invested a majority share in the company. He recognized that this




company was special and deserved to be supported to reach new levels of growth. Today See's has proven to be an exceptionally efficient user of capital, generating impressive return on



investment even during periods of economic downturn. A famous quote from Buffett relating to the purchase of the See Candy Company states, "Price is what you give, value is what you get." In 2019 the company delivered over \$80 million USD in pre-tax profit. Mary See died in 1939 at the age of 85 and her body was laid to rest with her husband Alex in Willowbank Cemetery in a plot about half way along the eastern boundary line.

In 1992 several members of the See family along with executives of the company travelled from California to visit the grave site and pay their respects to this remarkable woman.

The Baldocks at Willow Bank

Jane Ellen Dove, 29 year old spinster, blouse presser in the London garment industry, affectionately known as Jenny or Jeanie, emigrated from England to Canada in September 1909. Documented in the SS Lake Manitoba's passenger list was Jane's reason i.e. "to be married". And marry she did...within two weeks Jane became Mrs. George Baldock.George, a former British navy seaman, had grown up near Canterbury. He arrived in Canada in 1907. Descendants assume that George and Jane were acquainted in England.

In World War I, George served overseas with the Canadian Expeditionary Forces. Meanwhile in Gananoque, Jane cared for their three young children: Madge, Doris, George W.H. After the war, the Baldocks had two more children: Stanley and Lillian. Jane was 44 years old when Lillian arrived.

Eventually George and Jane farmed on land east of Willow Bank Cemetery on the north side of Highway 2. Little Lillian loved the cemetery, where George occasionally assisted. She held pretend tea parties among the grave stones and knew the names of many occupants.

George joined the Home Guard in World War II, serving locally.

Young George trained as a cheese maker, and married Betty Anderson.

"Baldocks", on the south side of Highway 2, grew to become a thriving concern: cheese, Texaco gas pumps, groceries, snack bar and tourist cabins. George and Jane moved to Brock Street,

Gananoque in retirement. Son George and Betty occupied an apartment above the shop until building a new home on the canal behind.

Jane, Betty and the Georges occupy the Baldock burial plot at Willow Bank Cemetery.

After widowhood, Lillian often toured Willow Bank Cemetery with me on our mother-daughter drives. One time, she and I were taken aback by a white apparition that suddenly arose from behind an older gravestone on the west side of the hill. We discovered the gentleman was real: a researcher in white coveralls recording the names of tombstone carvers.

Lillian used to muse that she might not live past 77, given that her parents, brother, and his wife died at ages 76–77. However, Lillian lived to almost 95. She and husband Herbert Hampton are inurned close to her parents (in the first columbarium).
