President's Corner

It's already seeing a lot of play. We hope these improvements add value to your home ownership.

Turnaround Streets and **Child Safety**

We would like to bring to your attention a matter of safety that has recently come to our notice. It has been reported that several parents are allowing their children to play in the turnaround streets. While we understand that these areas may seem convenient for play, it is important to prioritize the safety of our children and our community. Recently, there was an incident where a child darted into the street and was nearly hit by a car backing out of a driveway. This is a serious concern, as small children are often in the driver's blind spot. To ensure the safety of all our residents, we kindly ask that you refrain from using a turnaround street as a playground. We have a designated playground available for your children to enjoy, and we encourage you to bring them there for playtime.

We would like to address another serious safety concern regarding our community's lake area. Recently, we have observed several instances where children have been playing near the water's edge unsupervised, and we feel it is crucial to remind everyone of the potential dangers involved.

In one instance, two small children, a toddler and maybe a 3-4 year old child, were seen running back and forth from their patio to the lake, throwing toys into the water. On another occasion, two older children, a boy approximately 8-10 years old and a girl about 6 years old, were standing on the concrete abutment where the water flows out, attempting to catch something with nets. The older boy left, leaving the younger girl alone at the water's edge, which poses a significant risk.

As many of you may remember, we have had tragic incidents in the past, including the drowning of a small child in our lake when there was no adult supervision present. We cannot stress enough the importance of adult supervision when children are near the water. We urge all parents to ensure that their children do not play at the water's edge without a responsible adult present. It is vital for you to be there to monitor their safety and be ready to rescue them should an accident occur.

Thank you for your attention to this important matter. Together, we can help keep our community safe for all our children.

Labor Day Facts

- 1. Origins in Labor Movement: Labor Day originated from the labor movement in the late 19th century, specifically in response to the harsh working conditions and long hours faced by workers. It was established to honor and recognize the contributions of laborers to the economy.

- 5. End of Summer: In the United States, Labor Day is often considered the unofficial end of summer. Many people use the long weekend to travel or enjoy barbecues, picnics, and outdoor activities before the start of the school year and the arrival of fall.
- 6. Labor Day and Retail Sales: Labor Day has become associated with significant retail sales and promotions, much like Memorial Day and Thanksgiving. Many stores offer discounts, and it is considered a major shopping holiday.
- 7. No Specific Traditions: Unlike some holidays that have specific rituals or customs, Labor Day has fewer defined traditions, although barbecues, parades, and community gatherings are common ways to celebrate.
