Rule #17 Use of Common Elements

The common elements of the association are for the exclusive use of the association members and their immediate families, lessees, resident house guests and a guest accompanied by an association member or member of their immediate family.

Rule #18 Noise & Nuisances

No noxious, offensive or unlawful activity shall be carried out on in the community nor shall anything be done thereon which may be or may become an annoyance or nuisance to other owners. No person shall create any plainly audible noise that disturbs the peace, quiet, and comfort of the adjoining units or neighboring inhabitants or persons. Furthermore, noise of such character, intensity or duration detrimental to the life or health of any individual is prohibited. All noise, including and without limitation, is described as talking, singing, barking, television, radio, record player, tape recorder, iPod or musical instruments, and shall be kept at such volume level that said noise is not audible as aforementioned after 10 PM Monday through Thursday and 12 AM Friday and Saturday. Children shall not play on or about common areas of the Association in an unruly or exceptionally noisy manner.

Reminder

Be sure to change your banking information to reflect the below amounts

5% INCREASE IN MAINTENANCE = \$311/mo. to begin July 1st If received July 6th or later, a \$20 late fee will be applied (5-day grace period)

SPECIAL ASSESSMENT = \$255/mo. to begin July 15th (\$88 for insurance and \$167 for roofs)

If received on July 16th or later, a \$20 late will be applied. There is no grace period.

Coyotes

Several have been seen of late. Crystal Lake requested a speaker from Florida Fish & Wildlife to speak to their residents and opened it to the general public.

Coyotes resemble a small German Shepherd and weigh 15-30 lbs. If you see several in a pack it will be the mother, father and their pups. Each family has their own 3-5 mile radius. Frighten them away by walking toward them aggressively, make loud noises and make yourself appear larger by picking up your dog or waving your arms and they will retreat. You could carry a whistle, air horn or some other type of noise maker.

They are active at dawn, dusk and nighttime. Do not let your pet out loose at these times and it's best to not walk small dogs at this time. NEVER feed them and don't leave food outside for your pet(s). They eat whatever is available including fruits, nuts, seeds, dead animals, rodents, garbage, pet food, domestic cats and small dogs. Teach your children to recognize and not run from coyotes. If approached children should move slowly into a house or climb up on a swing, tree, deck and yell.

Fourth of July Fireworks

The tradition of fireworks on the Fourth of July in the United States dates back to the country's early years and has its roots in the celebration of independence and national pride.

On July 4, 1776, the Continental Congress adopted the Declaration of Independence, declaring the American colonies free from British rule.
