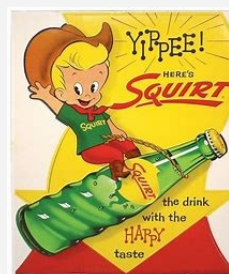

Not pictured—Lisa Helm, who also does not collect miniature liquor bottles, brought in several very nice miniature bottles and added to our knowledge base.



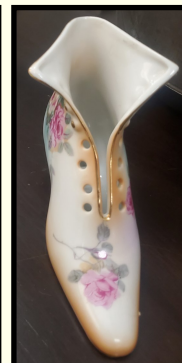
An unusual souvenir from Bill Johnson's Big Apple Restaurant, dating to about 1986, found by Ed Dobbins at a flea market.

Globe Trip Report

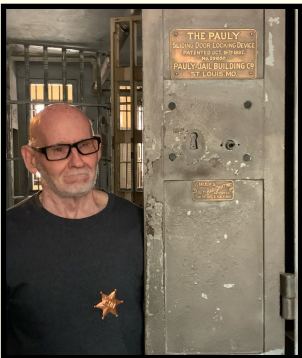

Our Club in the News



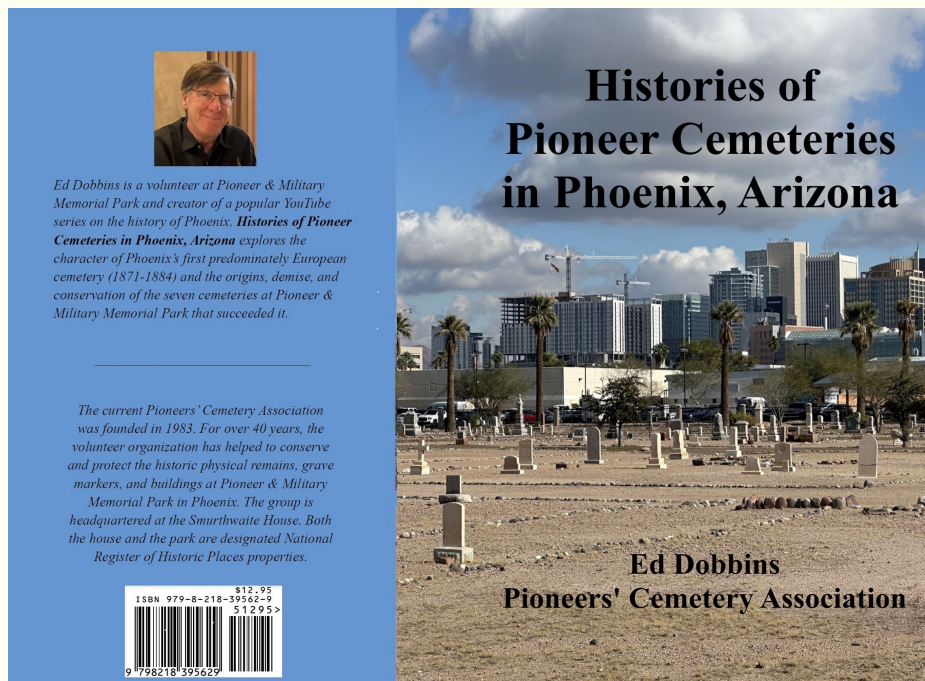

We thank Michael Polak for spotlighting us on this national stage. Thanks also to Betty Hartnett who has "collected" such great contacts and organizes this show. And, as always, we can be proud of our club members who really know their stuff about bottles and collectibles.

Another author and renowned collector is Ed Dobbins, who recently published a book titled *Histories of Pioneer Cemeteries in Phoenix, Arizona*. Ed, member of our club and our next vice-president, describes in his book the seven cemeteries that make up the Pioneer & Military Memorial Park located in Phoenix between 13th and 15th Avenues and between Jefferson and Harrison Streets, just west of downtown. He explores the history of the graveyard of the Original Phoenix Townsite, which closed in 1884, and the succeeding seven cemeteries that were in use from 1884 (when the town of Phoenix was incorporated) to 1914.

This short 50-page book is well written, interesting and full of photos and illustrations, and gives a glimpse into life in Phoenix at the end of the 19th century. It is a must-read for Arizona history enthusiasts.
