

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June Program





Bob Temarantz showed us some of his collection of tokens from the western states of Nevada, Utah, New Mexico, Colorado, Texas and eastern California. Bob started collecting tokens in the 1980s. Tokens were used in the small towns and mining camps from about 1870s to 1930s, and were frequently handed out as change for drinks (in the bars) as official coinage was in short supply. Tokens were made of brass, aluminum or, infrequently, copper.





Today the more desirable or valuable tokens came from camps that are now ghost towns, or from a business in a town at a time when well-known historical events occurred, such as the bar in Tombstone where Virgil Earp was shot.









Ed Dobbins explained the history of growing grapefruit in Arizona. After WWI the price of cotton dropped dramatically and Arizona farmers were looking for an alternative cash crop and started growing grapefruit trees. Grapefruit trees produce prodigious amounts of fruit and soon the market was flooded with grapefruit.

Other entrepreneurs figured out a way to use grapefruit juice to make a soda drink, which by the late 1930s evolved into Squirt soda. The old sugar beet factory in Glendale was re-purposed to produce the grapefruit juice concentrate, 1938-1977. The concentrate was then shipped to various bottlers around the state.

Rick Hopwood contributed to the presentation by displaying the highball glasses promoting a cocktail called the Glow-Ball, a combination of Squirt and whiskey.

Ed wrote an article about the history of Squirt in Arizona, published in Contractor and Community magazine four years ago. That article was rewritten and published in Phoenix Magazine, the issue of March/April 2023.

Thank you to Ed and Bob for these glimpses into Arizona and western history.

Historic Phoenix eatery MacAlpine's receives preservation grant

MacAlpine's Diner and Soda Fountain, one of the Valley's longest-running restaurants, is set to receive a \$50,000 grant from the National Trust for Historic Preservation that will help improve the restaurant's exterior. The \$50,000 reward is a part of the National Trust for Historic Preservation's "Backing Historic Small Restaurants" grant and is fully dedicated towards exterior improvements and renovations, according to MacAlpine's owner Monica Heizenrader. Nearly 100 years after the restaurant opened in 1929, it is inching towards a full-scale reopening after temporarily closing in 2020 due to Covid-19.

MacAlpine's, at 2303 N 7th St, reopened in a limited fashion in the spring with an entirely new staff. After starting by serving lunch from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. every Friday through Sunday, MacAlpine's has since opened during the same time on Wednesdays and Thursdays. Heizenrader says the restaurant is taking "baby steps" towards reopening, and that simply having an income is "phenomenal" for business.



"We're getting there. The next thing I'll add is Monday, Tuesday, so then we'll have lunch seven days a week," said Heizenrader. "After that, we'll add Friday and Saturday evening. And from there, we'll decide whether we're going to add breakfast next or more evenings."

Heizenrader mentioned that customers were crying on the day of MacAlpine's reopening after seeing the restaurant back up and running. The irreplaceable location has served customers such as Frank Lloyd Wright, Barry Goldwater, John McCain, Rose Mofford and Wayne Newton as regulars, according to Heizenrader.

The restaurant's retro-themed interior has preserved its history in a single space, one that Heizenrader hopes to replicate for the exterior. "When you walk through the doors, it's truly like you're stepping back in time," said Heizenrader. "We've tried very much to keep the ambiance focused towards that retro, nostalgic feeling, and with this, we'll be able to hopefully emulate some of that for the exterior."

To save the restaurant from closing in 2001, Heizenrader bought MacAlpine's along with her husband, Cary Heizenrader, who passed away after the restaurant closed during the pandemic. She now owns the restaurant with her daughters.

After having difficulties reopening the restaurant post-Covid, Heizenrader opened a GoFundMe to raise money for a return of operations. About \$35,000 of the \$93,500 goal has been raised.



The National Trust for Historic Preservation granted \$50,000 to 50 restaurants across the nation as a part of the 2024 Backing Historic Small Restaurants grant program. MacAlpine's is the second Arizona restaurant to be awarded a grant in the program's four-year history after Delgadillo's Snow Cap in Seligman was a grantee in 2023.
