JUST THE FACTS

Snake season is alive and well in Southern Arizona
January 1, 2026 a Coyote Creek neighbor opened her door to pick up a package. When she reached for the package she was bitten on a knuckle by a rattlesnake. It was a "dry bite" determined after a visit to the ER. Snakes slow down when it's cold. Most reptiles move into state of dormancy called Brumation. Warmth gets them moving.
It's wise to stay aware

Dog owners, snake avoidance training could potentially save your pup whether your dog is on or off leash. If you are on your phone and walking your pup you might not see a potential threat to you or your dog by anything, let alone snakes. Snake bites are dangerous and anti venom is expensive.

If snake avoidance training is not an option for your pup ask your vet about a snake vaccination. They are not a cure all, but they buy you time to get to a vet.

If you are interested in snake avoidance training check with your vet for a recommendation.
