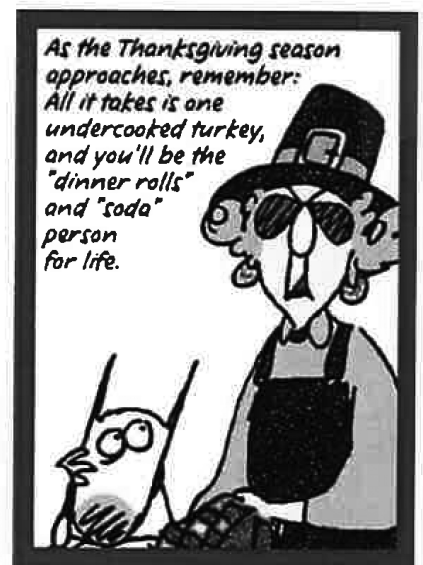

Cheesy Egg Puffs

- 1/2 pound sliced fresh mushrooms
- 4 green onions, chopped
- 1 T. plus 1/2 cup butter, cubed, divided
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 10 large eggs, lightly beaten
- 4 cups shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 2 cups 4% cottage cheese

In a skillet, sauté the mushrooms and green onion in 1 T. butter until tender. In a large bowl, combine the flour, baking powder and salt.

In another bowl, combine eggs and cheeses. Melt remaining 1/2 cup butter; add to egg mixture. Stir into dry ingredients along with mushroom mixture.

Fill 30 greased muffin cups 3/4 full. Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes or until a knife inserted in the center comes out clean. Carefully run the knife around the edge of muffin cups before removing.

These can be frozen in a freezer bag and reheated in a microwave.

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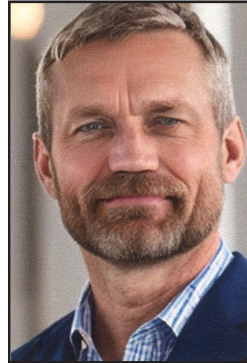
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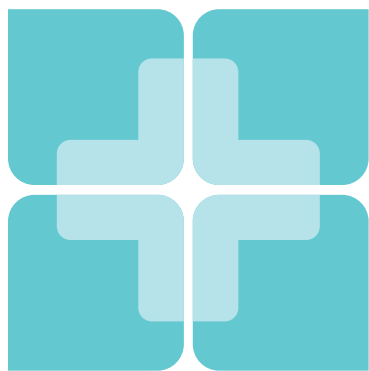
