Known For Their Faith And Passion

The early Christians had a unique passion for souls. They demonstrated firm conviction and confidence as they declared their faith in settings that were often unreceptive to their message. Just imagine the impact of having a group of believers who are like-minded in faith and passion, and their surrender to the will of God, we have a situation that becomes the talk of the world! In earlier years Christians turned the world upside-down; today, the world turns us upside-down. Harnack, the German theologian and historian was profound when he said, "The Church influenced the world most, when it was most unlike the world." The power of Pentecost propelled the Church into action. The inception of the Holy Spirit moved the Church out of the comfort-zone into the witness stand. Grieving for a lost world, they caught the fire and became mighty witnesses for Christ. They were no longer fearful or timid as they proclaimed the power of the risen Christ with boldness.

The power of Pentecost shook the world with conviction. "They were pricked in their hearts." (Acts 2:37) According to Lake and Cadbury's commentary, a praying Church caught the world's attention, and people were cut to the heart. The hearers were convicted by the power of God and causing them to cry out, "What must we do?" The influence of the Holy Spirit was so strong, and the individuals involved were unable to resist its impact. The preaching at Pentecost unraveled the sins of those who heard it. But today, a social gospel has taken the place of the resurrection gospel. For example, Stanly High, former roving editor for the Reader's Digest, once delivered a scathing criticism of the shyness of much modern preaching. He stated, "That in too many Protestant churches he got a pat on the back when he really needed a swift kick in the pants!"

If it seems that the world is not talking much about Christians today, it may be because we Christians have become famous for things other than our faith and love for souls. Believers have a unique place in world evangelization. Regardless of our spiritual talents, regardless of our financial resources, the task of sharing the gospel includes us. There is a special place waiting for us—but will we accept it? We grow while we sacrifice. Our light shines brilliantly while we light the lamp of others. "He that findeth his life shall lose it: and he that loseth his life for my sake shall find it" (Matthew 10:39). When a Christian becomes sacrificial, he becomes an authentic disciple!

We need to be careful when we twist the Word of God to advance our own agenda to gain fleeting wealth. Yes, God blesses His children, and many use their blessings to support God's kingdom work. For instance, consider Job, who, once regarded as a prince of the desert, sat on his bed of affliction and declared, "Though He slay me, yet will I trust in Him; but I will maintain mine own ways before Him" (Job 13:15). John Welch, the Scottish intercessor is known for having prayed, "Give me Scotland, or I die," rather than simply asking for personal success, and no wonder his prayer enthralled millions of believers into a spirit of true intercession. Christians are not the wealthiest people on earth, but they have wealth unsurpassed beyond human calculation! We should place our trust in God and regard Him as the focus of our worship and adoration. When we have Christ, we've wealth beyond comprehension and He is sufficient for all our needs.

I'm currently reflecting on Amy Carmichael, the beloved Irish missionary to India, and her inspiring words, "If I covet any place other than the dust at the foot of the cross, I know nothing of Calvary love." What a majestic expression of one's love for her Lord and Master! Wasn't it the same Amy Carmichael who said, "Make me thy fuel, O flame of God." Master, please let us see things from your perspective rather than the perspective of the world! Jesus said, "Labor not for the meat which perishes, but for that meat which endures unto everlasting life..." (John 6:27)

It's very fitting to close this article with the profound words of C.S. Lewis, "Aim at Heaven and you will get earth 'thrown in': aim at earth and you will get neither."
