
Notes on Stop Action

Stop Action was a sculpture I made in 2005 was an exploration of Eadweard Muybridge's techniques for archiving time. Today, Muybridge is commonly regarded as the inventor of motion pictures.

But, what Muybridge actually did, according to Edward Ball in his book "The Inventor and the Tycoon" was to encapsulate time through the ingenious use of parallax.

"Parallax is the apparent displacement of an object because of a change in the observer's point of view."—Wikipedia

This is exactly what Stop Action accomplishes, but in sculptural form.




Stop Action by Fred Truck, Urethane plastic, steel wire, wood, rubber O-rings, marble, absolut black granite, paint (2005)


Here's one point of view.





Here's another.
