


This Months Meeting December 12th





Felonies to be dropped in Confederate statue toppling case



Felony charges will be dropped against eight protesters accused of toppling a Confederate statue in North Carolina last year, and the demonstrators will be tried on misdemeanor charges, a prosecutor said Thursday.

The protesters were charged with felony rioting and misdemeanor property damage after the statue of an anonymous rebel fell Aug. 14 in the aftermath of a deadly white nationalist protest in Virginia.

"I only plan to try them on the misdemeanors," Durham County District Attorney Roger Echols said in an email. He declined further comment.

Eight defendants in the case appeared before a judge Thursday, and their trial was scheduled for Feb. 19. As each one's name was called, supporters in the courtroom said "witness" in unison to show solidarity.

The statue had been in front of a local government building. One Durham protester climbed a ladder to attach a rope while others pulled it down. Law enforcement officers watched and took video, but didn't take action during the protest.

A dozen protesters were initially charged. Charges were previously dismissed against three people because of a lack of evidence, and another entered a deferred prosecution deal to avoid a felony.

While statues elsewhere have been vandalized, the Durham case earned widespread attention because protesters succeeded in bringing it down. North Carolina, among the handful of Southern states with the most Confederate monuments, has a law preventing local officials from removing them.

In Virginia, a top Democratic lawmaker proposed a bill this week that would allow Virginia cities to remove or alter Confederate monuments. Republicans in the GOP-controlled legislature were doubtful it will pass.

After Thursday's hearing in Durham, two of the defendants said they believe that taking down the statue was the right thing to do, not a crime. They said supporters have been calling Echols' office to urge that charges be dropped.

Christmas Eve 2017

A Confederate soldier at Georgia cemetery was severely vandalized. (Doug Walker, Rome News-Tribune)

A statue of a Confederate soldier that stood high atop a Georgia cemetery was severely vandalized—with the statue's hands and rifle cut off and its face bashed in. Someone or a group of people entered Myrtle Hill Cemetery on Wednesday before damaging the monument, which was built in 1887.

“It looked like it was surgically cut,” Rome City Manager Sammy Rich told the Rome News-Tribune. “It’s just super disappointing that somebody would go to that much trouble to get up there, put a ladder up or whatever to reach it.”

Cemetery Director Stan Rogers estimated the value of the damages at \$200,000, the newspaper reported.

The vandalism comes amid a nationwide debate about whether Confederate monuments should be taken down. Across the U.S., at least 25 cities and towns have removed or relocated Confederate monuments.

The monument was removed and the city will try to determine whether it can be fixed and put back.

WASHINGTON & LEE UNIVERSITY REFUSES ADMITTANCE TO LEE CHAPEL TO RE ENACTORS IN CONFEDERATE UNIFORM ON LEE-JACKSON DAY IN LEXINGTON, VA.

In 2014, officials at W&L caved to the demands of six minority students and stripped the tomb of Robert E Lee of memorial battle flags that had adorned the grave for over 80 years, and told the Stonewall Brigade of the Sons of Confederate Veterans that they were no longer welcome to hold their annual Memorial Service at the Lee Chapel.

The following Lee-Jackson Day, visitors were threatened with arrest for carrying flags on to the property and W&L security prevented visitors from using the sidewalk to access VMI.

During this time, participants could still visit the LEE Chapel to pay their respects, as long as they didn't bring flags. That all changed this year, when visitors, for the first time, were refused admittance if they were wearing a Confederate uniform. We have over a dozen first hand reports, including one from a gentleman portraying Robert E Lee. He was told he would have to remove his uniform if he wanted to enter the LEE Chapel.

It seems that the sight of a period correct Confederate uniform is now enough to upset the students at the university which bears the name of the Confederate General.

God bless the eternal memory of Robert E Lee, and God save the South!



Confederate Armament



The weapon grew out of work by Ohio inventors William Joslin and Charles S. Dickinson on a hand-powered centrifugal gun, which they patented in 1858 - one of many 19th century attempts to harness "centrifugal" force – whether produced by hand or steam power. After the two had a falling out, Dickinson promoted the device under his name, patented his own version a few months later, and found funding to build a steam-powered gun in Boston in 1860. He brought the device to Baltimore and demonstrated it for the City Council in February, 1861. The machine was supposedly capable of shooting 200 projectiles in a minute.

In the wake of the April 19, 1861 clash between a pro-Southern mob and the 6th Massachusetts Militia in Baltimore, Maryland, word spread of an allegedly powerful steam gun said to have been invented and built by noted Maryland industrialist and states' rights advocate Ross Winans to oppose Federal troops passing through Baltimore to Washington in response to President Lincoln's call for volunteers.

Similar in size to a steam-powered fire engine of the day, the gun had a menacing appearance thanks to a large curved shield covering its inner workings.

Its mechanism involved a shielded barrel that rotated up to 250 times per minute. Shot dumped into the top of the barrel rolled down into it, and were held back by a spring-loaded gate that opened to allow one shot to be flung out per revolution of the barrel. Despite the effort invested in the project, it was unable to match the accuracy or power of the gunpowder weaponry of the time, and thus the steam gun project was abandoned.

The gun was taken from Dickinson and/ or his associates by City Police to be put in readiness for use if needed. Available evidence suggests that it was taken to the foundry/machine shop of Ross Winans and his son Thomas who the city's Board of Police had hired to make pikes, shot and other munitions items. Shortly after, the gun was taken from the Winans' facility and publicly displayed with other weapons being gathered by city authorities.

In the excitement of the times, Ross Winans' public involvement in states' rights politics in Maryland, his great fortune, word of the munitions work being done at his factory for the city, city defense appropriations, and the appearance of a menacing looking gun that had emerged from his factory became mixed in the press, and were carried in papers across the country.

The Steam Gun defended the Thomas Viaduct for the remainder of the Civil War after capture. After calm returned, the gun was taken again to Winans' shop for repair at city expense, then returned to Dickinson, who then attempted to take it to Harper's Ferry to sell to Confederate forces. Union forces captured the gun and its handlers, intact, in mid journey on May 11, 1861 at Ellicott Mills, Maryland and took it to their camp at Relay, Maryland.

While not a party to the attempt to escape with the gun, press accounts linking him to it, his pro-states' rights politics, rumors of munitions making for the South, and the real munitions work he had undertaken for Baltimore authorities led to Ross Winans' arrest and brief detention by Federal forces. He was released after 48 hours, after agreeing that he would not take up arms against the government.

Following its capture, the gun was tested by members of the 6th Massachusetts Infantry, before being sent North, via Annapolis, Fortress Monroe, and eventually to Lowell, Massachusetts, where it was presented to a mechanic's organization. Despite receiving significant political and media attention throughout the spring of 1861, it made no contribution to the war itself. It remained little more than a curiosity, eventually being scrapped long after the war.




