



### *Chaplains Corner - Studying History*

When was the last time you studied history? Was it in Elementary school, Junior High, High School, or maybe College? Did you spend your time memorizing dates, places, years, and people? When we study battles do we look and study what troops moved where and when, and how many there were, ground conditions, surprise movements and who carried the day and why? But, if you were like me you spent class time engaged in reverie, and how to get a date with the sweet looking girl on the front row of class.

However, about the age of six I got became a junior Alamo fanatic. Watching Fess Parker as David Crockett swat off hoards of Santa Anna's troops was bravery and patriotism at its best. Years later we were treated to John Wayne's, *The Alamo*.

Many years passed before I was able to visit the Alamo in San Antonio and I think at that time I realized that this mission and structure symbolized self-sacrifice, a hope and a dream, that 185 men would give up their life blood. I've seen Travis's *Letter from the Alamo* and in reading it we get a true glimpse of his feelings about the events that were going on around him at the time of the siege.

*"Thermopylae had its messenger of defeat, the Alamo had none"* is inscribed on the Alamo memorial on the Capitol grounds in Austin, but what does that mean? Hundreds of people walk by the monument daily and give it no thought, but to me it means something.

We, as members of Sons of Confederate Veterans have been given a guardianship of history, a guardianship of a righteous Cause. We must go beyond the study of battles but probe the thoughts of our soldiers, wives, brothers, mothers and fathers.

We, as members of Sons of Confederate Veterans, must understand that the cause for which the fought and died failed, but the motive that inspired them and the heroism they exhibited shall never fade from the memories of their people. God in his wisdom decided the battle against them, and God in his great goodness has made their love and sacrifice and courage a heritage of imperishable glory to their country.

*"Away, far off to us younger men and women, like phantom troops with muffled tread and silent drums on time's horizon, pass the armies of Lee, Jackson, and Johnston. Soon to our children they will be, but names and dreams and stories read in books. Only what they were and what they did in love and faith will last. It shall be built into the permanent and abiding life of our people; it shall be woven into the fair tapestry of our civilization—for when all other things pass and crumble into dust love and the deeds of love remain—love of God, love of truth and righteousness, love of one's native land."*

### **The Life of General Richard Gano Presentation**

#### **Presented by Marvin Applewhite**


Join us at our June 25 Program to hear Dr. Marvin Applewhite speak about this early influential Grapevine leader. Richard Gano moved to the Grape Vine Prairie from Kentucky in 1859. Gano was a physician, a minister, and entered the War of Northern Aggression in 1861, eventually achieving the rank of Brigadier General. He commanded many Grapevine men as captain of the “Grapevine Volunteers”, a company of mounted riflemen.



Dr. Applewhite is curator of the Applewhite-Clark Exhibit at the Texas Cowboy Hall of Fame in the Fort Worth Stockyards. His exhibit features General Gano and other well known Texas icons who were involved in the Texas Republic and its struggle to gain independence from Mexico.

### **Headstone Placed in Historic Grapevine Cemetery**

Recently without our camps knowledge a special headstone, designed by the Grapevine Historical Society, was placed for our museum skeleton which was reburied this February. The inscription was done by the Lucas Family Funeral Home and the cement work was done by the Wright Construction Company. The granite slab, donated by Debi Meek, is from the original Grapevine Sun Newspaper building built on Main Street in 1895.



If you wish to visit the gravesite, it is near the front of the Grapevine Historic Cemetery at the third entrance as you travel north on Dooley Street. (Between Wildwood and Normandy Streets.)

Re: Executive Order Pertaining to the Texas Division

Commander McMahon,

On February 1, 2018 an Executive Order was issued by my hand that placed the Texas Division under suspension outside the scope of the day to day operations of the Division until further notice. Once the suspension was issued and the request for information was received I turned the matter over to my Inspector-in-Chief whom investigated all the evidence that we had on hand. He went on to gather more information on his own and made a full report of his findings.

After receiving and reviewing his report I then sent it to the Disciplinary Committee Chairman to get his opinion of what if any action needed to be taken on the issues that have been hap-pening in the Texas Division over the past few years. We then made a decision that NO further action needed to take place at this time.

I would like to state a few obvious things that struck me when I reviewed all of the evidence and reports. We have ENOUGH enemies out there and should not be constantly bickering amongst ourselves. Furthermore, BOTH factions that have been doing the bickering have fault in these matters. Not one side, not the other, BOTH do. It is time that the Texas Division takes a long hard look at themselves and joins together once again to further the cause. It isn't about US it is and will always be about THEM the men that fought and died for the South during the war.

The following decision has been made regarding the Executive Order that I issued on the 1st of February. The Order has been resented effective immediately and all of the rights afforded the Texas Division, Sons of Confederate Veterans are restored. Furthermore, it is ordered that a copy of this letter be sent to all members of the Texas DEC immediately to be distributed to all the Camps in the Texas Division.

It is my sincere hope that the last three months have been a wakeup call for all parties in-volved and that as we all move forward that the men on both sides can behave like gentlemen. I am not saying we all have to agree all of the time or even most of the time but compromise is a good thing and both sides needs to take a long look in the mirror and think of the big picture.

I also hope that the Texas Division has a fruitful reunion in a few weeks because it has been brought to my attention that there are a number of amendments that are on the agenda that my help the situation in the future.

# COOKING CONFEDERATE

## Idiot's Delight or Idiot's Cake

This recipe was used throughout the Southern States during and after the War when times were hard, ingredients were inexpensive, and hard to come by. This recipe is fool-proof thence the name Idiot's Cake because only an idiot could mess up this recipe.

- 1 c. brown sugar
- 1 c. raisins
- 1 tbsp. butter
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 4 cu. water
- 7 tbsp. butter
- ½ c. white sugar
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- ½ c. milk
- 1 c. flour

Boil together the first 5 ingredients. Make a batter of the second 5 ingredients. Drop the batter in a greased pan by spoonful's. Pour first mixture over it and bake in a moderate oven until golden brown.

Commercial baking powder was not available to cooks of the past. Thus, they made their own. Here is a recipe from the past.

- ounce sub-carbonate soda
- 7 drachms (1 drachma=1 handful) tartaric acid

## Slosh

- 1lb fatback or bacon
- 1 c. cornmeal
- 1 musket ramrod
- Salt and pepper

In a large skillet, fry fatback or bacon until crisp. Remove from skillet and lower heat until grease no longer bubbles. Add cornmeal and stir.

Remove from heat and continue stirring 5-10 minutes until doughy. Roll cornmeal dough into long (8"-10") snake and wrap evenly around end of ramrod, being careful not to overlap.

Hold snake over open campfire and toast until crisp.

## WRITINGS FROM THE PAST

The following letter comes from Col. Vincent Marmaduke, of Missouri, and appeared in the January issue of *The Confederate Magazine*, January 1898.

### Telling the Truth to Children

“The honor and glory of this great struggle was with the South, and Southern soldiers ought, in justice to themselves and their dead comrades, to preserve the memory of it. While the North and Northern soldiers are inveighing against all manifestation of sectional feeling, they are erecting monuments to their successful leaders and telling the story very much to their credit and to our detriment.

The North had more than four soldiers to one in the South. Its armies were reinforced and assisted by six hundred ships of war, maned by thirty-five thousand sailors. It had unlimited credit, which meant an unlimited supply of money. It had factories to manufacture everything needed to arm and equip, to supply and maintain, its armies and fleets. It had railroads running in every direction for the transportation of its troops. It had intercourse with the whole world and could draw recruits for its army and navy from it.

The South had none of these advantages or had them only to a limited extent. But, notwithstanding all its advantages, it took the North four years to crush the South, and then it did it by a grinding process and without having gained a single decisive victory.

With all that laid aside, it is the duty of every enlightened Southern man to see that the truth—not biased and warped accounts—of the history of this past war is transmitted to posterity. The nobleness, the chivalry, the self-denial, the bravery, and the tireless endurance of the Confederate soldier should be instilled into every Southern child. No history should be taught them which pictures them as traitors and rebels. They should understand the great principles which were contended for prior to the war, which were settled by the highest tribunal in the country, the Supreme Court, favorably to the South, which the North would not except, appealing to a “higher law”, and which were finally referred to the arbitrament of the sword.

...Southern children ought to know of the imperishable grandeur of Gen. Lee, of the magnificence in battle of Gen. Jackson and Albert Sydney Johnston, of the daring bravery of Forrest, Morgan and of Cheatham. The renown of the Confederate soldier is not told in splendid monuments; it rests in the hearts of Southern people, and there it must be kept green and fresh forever. They want their children to receive facts. From facts no conclusions can be drawn derogatory to the courage of Southern soldiers or to the genius and military prowess of Southern generals.”

## Anecdotes from the Front

During one of the long and rapid marches which so often fell to the lot of Stonewall Jackson's "foot cavalry" two of the boys belonging to the old Stonewall Brigade, which always held a warm corner in the heart of its old commander. Fell into conversation. One of them remarked to the other: "Bill, I wish all those damned Yankees were in hell."

"I don't" replied Bill.

"Why not?" asked Jim.

"Because, if they were, old Stonewall would order the First Brigade after them."



Everyone agrees that discipline is absolutely essential in an army, but in the Confederate army some of our soldiers had an odd idea of discipline. While the private soldier would obey his officer's commands with the utmost exactness, he never for a moment acknowledged the superiority of the officer socially. He would fight like a hero and work like a stevedore, but he never gave up or forgot his manhood. On one occasion Gen. Cheatham found one of his men, an Irishman, committing some act of which he did not approve. He reprimanded him in the most forcible manner, and, in fact, it is said that the language was so forcible that the air turned a beautiful cerulean hue. When he stopped to get his breath, the Irishman said: "Bedad General Cheatham! If you wasn't a general, you wouldn't talk to me that way."

Gen. Cheatham was like the hero of Conan Doyle's novel, the "White Company:" he was always willing and anxious to accommodate any gentleman who was looking for trouble. He pulled off his coat and threw it on the ground, saying: "There lies Gen. Cheatham and here is Old Frank. Now pitch in."

The Irishman did pitch in, and it is related that for once in his life Old Frank didn't get the best of a fight.


