Stephanie Ford gave a great presentation on "Foreign Confederates".


Warren Johnson spoke about the Dallas Lee statue.





HONOR OF GREATER VALUE THAN RICHES

Dallas, Tex., June 17, 1907

My Old Comrades: Being unable from ill health to attend the great Reunion at Richmond of the brave men who followed the flag of the Confederacy until it was furled and laid away, and knowing that I was growing old and feeble, and that I had been honored continuously as the Commander of the Trans-Mississippi Department for seventeen years, I deemed it but right and proper that I should return the commission you gave me in 1890 in order that you might elect a younger more vigorous man to command the Trans-Mississippi Department. But my comrades from all the great States and Territories of the South and West, the greatest country that the sun shines upon, by a unanimous vote have reelected me. No greater honor, my old comrades, could be conferred upon me. It fills me with love and affection for the old heroes who followed the honored flag of the Confederacy until it was furled and forever laid away. I thank you, my old comrades, from an honest heart for this great honor, of which I feel prouder than if I had been elected President of the United States. I promise you it shall be the effort of my life to keep the camp fires burning during my life, and that I shall continue to do all I can to perpetuate our noble association and to urge the gallant old heroes, "the unpaid soldiers of immortal principle," to keep in touch with each other the few short years left to us.

Recollect, my old comrades, that the great column of gray, every member of which received his baptism of blood and fire over forty years ago, the echoes of whose guns were heard all over the civilized world, arousing the people to throw off the yoke of tyranny, and to contend for a republican form of government, is fast growing smaller, and that but a few years can intervene until taps will be sounded and all will have crossed over the river to the great beyond to hold our great reunion on that eternal shore. Let us then ask a kind Providence to spread his sheltering wings over us, so that we may meet in reunion these remaining years.

Thanking you again, my old comrades from every part of our great Southland for the great honor you have conferred upon me, I pray a kind and merciful God to continue his blessings upon our noble association and to bless you and all dear to you with good health and all the pleasures and comforts incident to a long and happy life. May God bless you all for many years to come will be the daily prayer of your old Commander.

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — San Antonio district officials are cleaning out mascot costumes, athletic gear, banners and other memorabilia after removing a Confederate reference from a high school's name.

The [San Antonio Express-News](#) reports that the North East Independent School District plans to auction off hundreds of items from the former Robert E. Lee High School starting Monday. The move follows the district's decision last year to change the school's name to Legacy of Educational Excellence High. Some artifacts will be saved for a future display in the school's library, such as a statue of the Confederate general. District officials have spent weeks sorting through memorabilia associated with the Confederacy ahead of the first day of classes in August.

The nearly 1,600 items will be auctioned online from July 16 through July 30.

He then worked as a Software Engineer designing battlefield simulators and retired in 2002. Sweeney was a 15-year veteran of the SCV.



Texas's Tallest Confederate




The above group of Confederates was taken at the reunion of Ross Ector and Granbury's Brigades and Douglas's Texas Battery at Jacksonville, Texas, August 8 and 9, 1906. The tall man is H. C. Thurston of Mt. Vernon, Tx., who was a member of the 4th Missouri Cavalry, C.S.A., Marmaduke's Division, Trans-Mississippi Department. He stands seven feet seven and a half inches tall and is seventy-six years of age and weights two hundred and twenty-five pounds.

It was stated that Comrade Thurston was the tallest man in Texas, at that time, and one of the tallest men in the world. His tallness had been exhibited in many states of the Union by different circuses. Tiring of the circus life, Thurston settled down at home and enjoyed attending many Confederate Reunions, as you may imagine wherever he went he always drew a great deal of attention. In the photo the man on the right is 6'8" tall and the man on the left is 6'6" tall. At reunions Thurston always wore his trademark beaver stovepipe hat, which made him seem taller.

Thurston got tired of hearing "tall jokes" at his expense. There was a fellow -about 5'6"- who Thurston hadn't seen before walked up to him and with a smirk on his face asked, "Say, big fellow, how's the weather up there?" Thurston looked way down on him and spewed saliva all over the area and said, "It's raining."

A week after Henry Clay Thurston returned from the Confederate Veterans Reunion in Memphis in June 1909, he passed away quietly at his home on July 2nd.

“Suspend Schools to Pick Cotton”

My Dear Sir: Pardon the liberty I take in addressing you. Circumstances have caused me to travel, within less than two weeks, almost entirely across the Cotton Belt of the South, and I have found cotton conditions so alarming everywhere that I feel impelled to try to sound a warning through most influential sources and to suggest the best, if not the only, possible remedy. The immense draft of laborers from the farms by improvements in cities and the building of steam and electric railways, together with the prolonged rainy weather, has delayed the picking of cotton so that it seems impossible to save it except by united effort.

The particular suggestion that I desire to make is the suspension of public and private schools for several weeks, and that all school children be urged to help save the cotton with which the South is so greatly blessed. Urge farmers to pay the highest prices, and appeal to parents of wealth as a patriotic duty to induce children to help save the cotton. It is a condition as seriously threatening as if our cities were on fire; it is indeed appalling. Every Southern patriot should cooperate in saving the millions and millions of values in cotton that may be utterly ruined before it can be saved by the usual methods.

In many instances this appeal was published. It may not be too late yet for action of this kind. The fact that there is a very large cotton crop does not relieve the Southern people of the duty to save all the cotton they can. Let it be housed and await the rise in price. Such action is right.”

Cooking Confederate - "What's for Supper?"

"Possum and Sweet Taters"

1 Possum (see instructions)

Salt

8 Sweet Potatoes

2 tbs. butter

1 tbs. sugar

4-6 strips of bacon

1 tsp. thyme, marjoram or both

Pepper, red or black, ground

First catch a young fat possum. This in itself affords excellent sport on moonlight nights in the Fall. Remove the fur either by skinning or by soaking the possum in hot lye water, being careful not to get any on the hands. Clean, take off the head and feet (unless you want to cook it like whole pig), and wash well. Salt the possum well inside and out and freeze overnight either outdoors or in the refrigerator compartment. When ready to cook, peel 8 sweet potatoes and boil them tender in slightly salted water to which 2 tablespoons of butter and 1 tablespoon of sugar have been added. At the same time, stew the possum tender in a tightly covered pan with a little water. Arrange the potatoes around the possum, strip with bacon, sprinkle with thyme or marjoram, or with pepper, and brown in the oven. Baste often with the drippings. Served hot, it sure is a "dish fo' a king".

Editor's note: In my readings concerning rations to our soldiers I cannot find any comments about eating 'possum. Food rations to our troops during the final stages of the War were difficult to come by and when the beef cattle and hog supply was exhausted then there was mention of roasting a rabbit, if you could catch one. I remember many, many years ago there were bumper stickers saying, "Eat More Possum", so I'll assume that possum was a cheap source of protein for many in the South after the War and for many years after.




