





Chaplain's Corner - Seed Store

Many years ago, I remembered reading a story from the book Parables by Megan McKennna. She tells the story of a woman who wanted peace in the world and peace in her heart and all sorts of good things. The world around her seemed to be falling apart. There are wars, hatred, biterment, resentment, name calling, one disaster after another, and it seemed as if people could not get along with each other. Just reading the newspaper or listening to news on TV depressed her.

One day she decided to go shopping at the mall and randomly entered one of the stores. She walked in and was surprised to see Jesus standing behind the counter. She knew it was Jesus because He looked just like the pictures she had seen of Him painted by artists.

She finally got up the nerve and asked, "Excuse me, but are you Jesus?"

"I am!"

"Do you work here?"

"No," Jesus said, "I own the store."

"Oh, what do you sell?"

"Just about anything!"

"Anything?"

"Yes, anything! What do you want?"

"I don't know," she replied.

"Well," Jesus said, "feel free to walk up and down the aisles, make a list of the things you want, and then come back and bring me your list."

So, she walked up and down the aisles. She saw displayed peace on earth, no more war, no hunger or poverty, peace in families, no more drugs, harmony, clean air, careful use of resources, and many other wonderful things. She wrote furiously and by the time she got back to the counter she had a long list.

Jesus took the list, skimmed through it, looked up at her and smiled. "No problem." He said. He then bent down behind the counter and picked out the things she requested, stood up, and laid out some packets.

When she asked what these were, Jesus replied. "Seed packets. This is a catalog store."

"You mean I don't get the finished product?"

"No, this is a place of dreams. You come here to see what you need looks like, and I give you the seeds, so you can plant them. Then you nurture the seeds and help them to grow. Later, someone else reaps the harvest of what you have sown."

"Oh!" she said, disappointed. Then she left the store without buying anything.

This "parable" describes the way we sometimes pray. All the resources in heaven's storehouse are available to us. God, the Son, said so. God, the Father, guarantees it. We however, want our blessings to come as finished products. And we want the immediately-if not sooner!

We ask God for: a loving family, a specific neighbor, co-worker, healing relationships, those that are experiencing grief and loneliness, physical healing, and prayers for our SCV camp and SCV, and many other positive and wonderful things. He gives us seeds to plant that will bring these things to pass. Not being willing to plant the seeds that will make possible that for which we pray, we walk away unblessed, wondering why God didn't answer our prayer.

God hears every prayer, but He answers in accordance with his will. Sometimes He says "Yes," sometimes He says "No," and sometimes He says, "Not Now!" When God doesn't answer our prayer in the WAY we request, and, on the SCHEDULE, we assign to Him, we think He hasn't answered at all. Texas Division News - SCV Texas License Plates and the CofC Capitol Plaque

Texas House Speaker Joe Straus took aim once more at a Confederate plaque in the Capitol in remarks Monday to the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce. The speech was part of a luncheon honoring the outgoing speaker's public service.

We reported last year when Straus called for the State Preservation Board to remove the plaque from Capitol grounds. The board, which Governor Abbott heads, is responsible for maintaining and preserving the Capitol, including its Confederate symbols.

During a gubernatorial debate Friday, Abbott said the plaque should be removed, but that it's up to the Legislature to decide to remove it.

So what we thought was a battle won is now a battle we're gonna have to fight all over again.



Texas Agriculture Commissioner Sid Miller is sponsoring a proposed Texas license plate that glorifies Confederate soldiers to help raise money for the Sons of Confederate Veterans — reigniting a decade-old debate over whether there should be a novelty plate to benefit the group.

The new design includes a rebel soldier clad in a gray Confederate uniform carrying a Texas regiment's flag. The license plate design does not include the Confederate battle flag.

As first reported by the Dallas Morning News, Miller wrote a letter in support of the license plate design and, as Agriculture Commissioner, offered to sponsor it. He told the paper, "I couldn't see anything offensive about it."

Kim Olson, a retired lieutenant colonel running against Miller in the November general election, said the agency should be focused on agricultural resources instead of sponsoring Confederate license plates.

"This is not something I want to go to the mat for. I want to represent folks in agriculture," said Olson. "We have bigger fish to fry."

The Sons of Confederate Veterans has sought to establish a license plate since 2007. Its first design featured the Confederate battle flag and sparked criticism from people who said the plate was offensive and loaded with racial undertones. The state rejected that design in 2011, a decision the U.S. Supreme Court upheld in 2015. The court ruled that government agencies do not have to approve messages "with which they do not wish to be associated."

Texas Division News Cont. - SCV Texas License Plates

The Sons of Confederate Veterans claims about 3,200 members in Texas in its March application for the specialty license plate. The group estimates about 1,000 such plates would be sold in the first year. Of the \$30 fee collected for the specialty plates, \$22 would go to the Department of Agriculture as the sponsoring agency. The department would give that money back to the Sons of Confederate Veterans in the form of grants "for supporting charitable causes and related activities," Miller told the DMV in a letter.

The purpose of the special license plate is to "remember and honor our Confederate ancestors" and to make the commemorative plate available to people interested in Texas' participation in the war, according to the application.

The group asked Miller to sponsor the effort, said agency spokesman Mark Loeffler.

"He agreed, provided the new design would be substantially different than the prior attempt. The 'Confederate battle flag' is now gone and the only flag in the design is a representation of a Texas regimental flag that was carried by Texas Confederates during the war," Loeffler said in a statement. "Commissioner Miller strongly believes that Texans benefit from learning about all our history and not hiding or ignoring parts that might now be considered offensive."

Paul Gramling Jr., Commander in Chief of the Sons of Confederate Veterans, said he's hopeful this plate will be approved, and blasted the Supreme Court's 2015 decision, which he said was based on "prejudices."

Manny Garcia, Texas Democratic Party Deputy Executive Director, called the proposal "tone-deaf."

"Not only is Sid Miller an embarrassment to Texans, but he is also incapable of talking about critical issues in his own department; hungry kids, struggling farmers, and rural communities left behind," Garcia said.

The Texas Department of Agriculture has sponsored several other plates, including for the American Quarter Horse Association , Order of the Eastern Star and the Grand Lodge of Texas, according to Loeffler.

The Sons of Confederate Veterans has specialty license plates in a handful of other states, including Louisiana, Tennessee and Alabama, Gramling said.

National News - TENNESSEE LAWSUIT TO DETERMINE WHERE - NOT IF

The future of Franklin's public square has been a disputed topic the past couple months among city leaders and the county court system.

While Franklin aldermen voted unanimously Tuesday to support placing markers about black history on public property in downtown, a judge has yet to determine who owns the public square.

Both the city and the local chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy chapter claim ownership.

In 1899 a resolution was passed empowering the County Judge to execute - in the name of Williamson County - a deed to a square, of such dimension as may be needed to the Franklin Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy for the purpose of an erection of a monument on the Public Square to the memory of the Confederate soldiers." But the deed did not include dimensions for the piece of land.

After the monument went up, the United Daughters of the Confederacy placed a small fence around the monument along with a Flag.


Photographs from 1913 show an elevated patch of land with four Union cannons surrounding the monument. Tennessean archives show that the Union cannons were added in 1909. The cannons were placed by the Daughters with the help of the now defunct Interurban Railroad Company, which ran a trolley line from Nashville to Franklin until 1941.

In 2010, city officials reached an agreement with the Daughters for the monument's upkeep. In 2014, a local group spearheaded efforts to remount the cannons.

In August, black pastors and leaders from the Battle of Franklin Trust brought forward a plan to place four markers depicting black history on the steps beside the Confederate monument. The Daughters threatened to sue over the plan, because the signs would alter their property and the monument. So the city filed a lawsuit to determine who owns what on the public square.

On Tuesday, the city voted to approve the use of "public land" for the project "in and around the city square." The exact location of the markers will be determined once the ownership and what is and is not "public" has been determined.




How Do I Join The Sons of Confederate Veterans?


