Chaplains Corner - The Most Important Bones in Your Body

I have been fascinated with archeology ever since my class days as a student at The University of North Texas (it was called North Texas State University back when I attended) and I chose as an elective Archeology 101. On the first day of class our professor, Nelson Leo, came into the classroom with a shovel across his shoulder, slammed the shovel down on desk, and with the voice of authority announced: "If you get out of this course with a good grade, you are going to have to dig!"

I have never forgotten this emphatic introduction to the study of archeology. Professor Leo "The Lion" was trying to make a point, and we clearly, very clearly, understood what that point was. Archeologists have an interesting job. They dig where past history took place. The archeologist's goal is to find all kinds of stuff: pottery, building materials, weapons, coins, but especially bones!

Bones are important-and we are full of them. Babies are born with 300 bones, but when they reach adulthood that number is reduced to 206. Some bones, like skull bones get fused together, reducing the total number. The 206 bones in an adult include the following: hands-54, skull-8, vertebral column-26, legs-8, arms-6. If you didn't have these, it wouldn't function. There are three additional bones every person needs in order to enjoy life. They will keep us moving forward in a productive way, especially when the tough times roll. You will not find these three bones listed in any medical book. They are: *backbone*, *wishbone*, and *funnybone*. The *backbone* stands for the strength and courage we need when we face challenges or have difficulties to overcome. Paul, the apostle, faced numerous difficulties-he was severely beaten more than once, stoned, shipwrecked, bitten by a snake, imprisoned, and so on- but he kept going with courage to accomplish the mission he had been assigned by God to accomplish. He had backbone. It is the only way any of us will get through the kind of things we will likely have to face in life. A strong backbone is important.



If having a long face is what it takes for a person to be considered dedicated Christian, Maude and Claude, the mules my

grandfather Will plowed his fields with back in the 20's, were the two finest Christians I knew.



DALLAS UPDATE



From Plaintiff Chris Carter *(Carter v Dallas) on the Return Lee v Dallas oral arguments before the 5th Court of appeals in Dallas:

We had a good day in the Texas 5th Circuit Court of Appeals. Judge Bill Whitehill's questioning was direct, concise and objective. A great deal of time was spent on the Dallas City Council's violation of Texas Open Meetings Act. They only gave citizens 6 days notice of the Sept. 6, 2017 meeting to remove the Lee statue. The requirement is 30 days. Furthermore, according to City Council rules, they can not vote in an emergency meeting, which they did. Judge Whitehill also had questions regarding political jurisdiction.

As usual, City attorney Charles Estee was ill prepared. However, unlike in Judge Moye's trial court, Judge Whitehill did not let him get away with vague, generalized answers. Finally, Estee stated that all our claims regarding the Lee Statue were moot because the statue had been sold and transported out of Dallas. Judge Whitehill curtly informed Estee that if the City lost this appeal and then subsequently lost in trial court that the return remedy would be that the City would be required to REPLACE the Lee Statue. Estee was speechless. When he stomped out, he said, " until next time. " I replied, " there's gonna be a lot of next times. "

"We Say Grace and We Say Ma'am" By Tom Daniel



I'm afraid we may be looking at an upcoming generation of Southern children who don't know what it means to say "sir" and "ma'am."

It's an interesting concept, but Southerners are certainly known for politeness, and that includes the habit of saying "sir" and "ma'am". If a Southern child simply says a terse "yes" or "no" (or, heaven forbid, a "yep" or a "nope"), a nearby adult will quickly follow-up with "yes, what?" or "No, what?" And the child who had momentarily forgotten his manners had instantly reply with "yes, sir," or "no, ma'am." The child can also consider it a good day if the adult didn't include a resounding thump as part of this exchange.

But here's the funny part. While we Southerners consider it offensive and rude to NOT refer to an adult as "sir" or "ma'am," Yankees basically consider it insulting to do so, and think of them as fighting words. Unless they've had a military background, Yankee women especially take it as insulting and derogatory to be called "ma'am" by anybody.

However, the real sticking point to a Yankee is that the act of simply saying "sir" or "ma'am" is subservient. They never teach their kids to say it, because they would view that as training them to be servants. So, when you hear a Yankee say "sir" or "ma'am," it has usually been colored with a highly disrespectful and sarcastic tone of voice. Southerners, on the other hand, view "sir" and "ma'am" as obligatory expressions of respect, and we routinely train our children to say it. I know it's not acceptable to whop kids anymore, but how many of us grown Southern adults have experienced some painful open-handed slaps to the back of the head from our mamas for the moment of insanity of uttering a profane "Uh-huh" to an adult? OUCH, I can still feel it. In fact, the affronted adult in this example might even take it as a bigger insult if the Southern mama didn't whack the kid right there. It was generally expected.

So, the chain of misunderstanding goes something like this. A typical Yankee woman encounters a rude salesclerk somewhere who keeps calling her "ma'am" with a nasty little flat tone added for deeper impact. The salesclerk fully intends it as an insult, and the woman takes it that way. An hour later, she asks a typical Southern child a simple question, and the child answers, "Yes, ma'am," which the Yankee woman hears as insulting instead of polite. She says something snippy and sarcastic back to the child, who is utterly confused at this point, because that's the way he's always been trained to talk to adults.

Yankees consider politeness to be a weakness and a character flaw. I know that's a pretty broad generalization, so sue me. I lived in Iowa for three years, and my wife and I have mountains of anecdotal data to back that up. Oh, Yankees will be polite to their boss, or anybody else above them for that matter, but it would be a major Yankee faux pas to express respect to an equal or less. You just don't do it. And if you choose to do it, then it suggests to them that you are accepting a subservient status.

The solution? Make the Southern kids stop saying "sir" and "ma'am," obviously. That's not the way Yankees talk, so nobody should talk that way. You don't think that's what's really happening out there?

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
