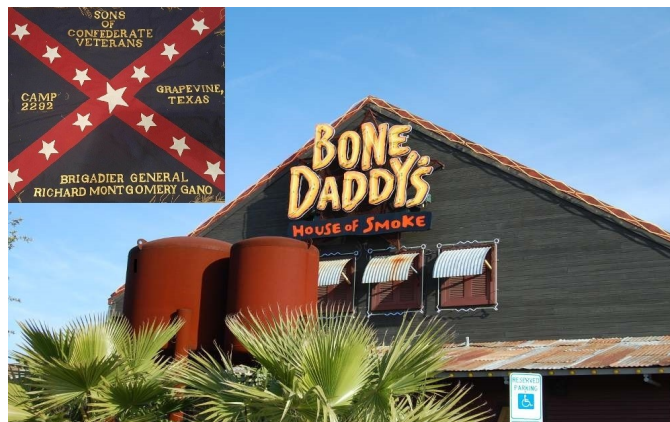

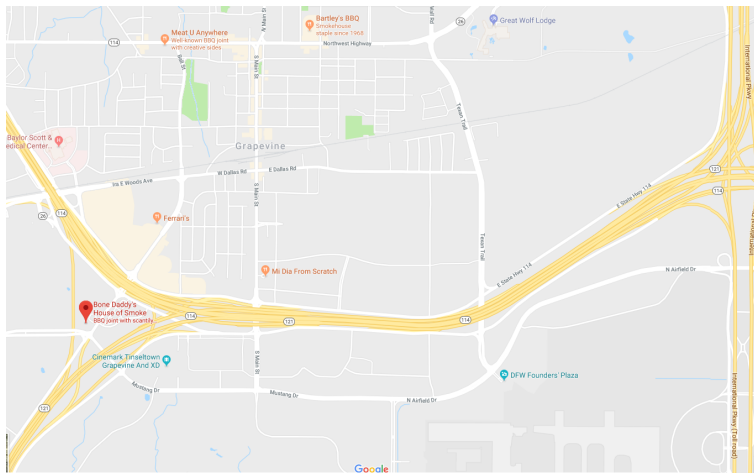

Camp 2292 News - Camp Installs Painted Iron Cross of Honor in Grapevine, TX



Robert Cobb was born in Calhoun County, Alabama on November 23, 1841. He was a son of Nathaniel Cobb and his wife, Lurany Teague. Robert was living in Calhoun County in 1860, but was working outside his father's family. He enlisted on June 4, 1861 at Montgomery, Alabama as a private in Co. H, 10th Alabama Infantry. He is shown present on all the rolls which have survived for his company. He was a corporal when he surrendered with his regiment at Appomattox Court House on April 9, 1865. By 1870 had moved to Dallas County, Texas. His wife, Mary E. Cobb, was born July 23, 1841 and died August 5, 1896. When she married Cobb, she was a widow with a son, T. J. Sheppard (1858-1938). In 1877, Robert Cobb owned 81-1/5 acres of the Jesse Doss survey in the Pleasant Glade Community near Grapevine. The 1880 census of Tarrant County records the fact that he had only one eye, perhaps as a result of an injury he received in the Confederate army. On July 14, 1885, Cobb was a presiding officer at the election of the trustees for the Pleasant Glade School. He died at his home south of Grapevine on January 25, 1908 and was buried in Parker Memorial Cemetery. He has a short obituary in The Grapevine Sun without any reference to his Civil War service. "Died last Saturday, Mr. Robert Cobb, an old and respected citizen of this community. He leaves a wife and three children to mourn his demise. We extend sympathy to the bereaved ones."

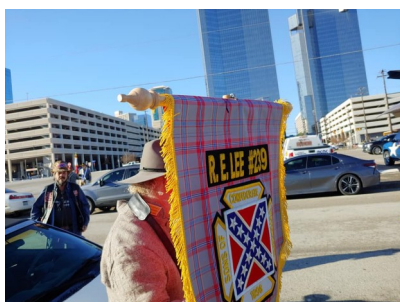

A Update From The Virginia Flaggers

In Virginia, a Louisa County judge denied a motion in a murder case to remove a portrait of Robert E. Lee from the Louisa County Circuit Courthouse.

Attorneys for Darcel Murphy, who faces the possibility of the death penalty if he is convicted for the murder of Kevin Robinson in March 2016, had argued that the portrait of the Confederate general in the courtroom could influence jurors during Murphy's trial. Murphy is African American, as was Robinson.

The display of Confederate symbols "violate the defendant's right to equal protection under the law," lead attorney Douglas Ramseur wrote in his 2018 motion to remove the portrait. "There is no greater offense to the Equal Protection Clause [of the Constitution] than government favoritism of one race over another."

Sanner agreed that the Lee portrait is much larger than any other portrait in the courtroom. But he described the image of Lee in his uniform, standing in front of a tree, as "benign."

"The concern of the Defendant in this case is really not what this portrait depicts, but who it depicts," he wrote. "Setting aside its subject, the portrait does not compromise the fair administration of justice."

The judge said, referring to slavery, that "those who played an active role in defending the indefensible face substantial difficulty in escaping the harsh judgment of history."

But he also noted that many people admire "the real or perceived qualities of General Lee." He noted that Lee is one of the few individuals to have a state holiday observed in their honor.

"It is difficult for the Court to accept that nothing other than the implied original and continuing racism of the Virginia General Assembly supports that distinction," Sanner wrote.

A HUGE win in Alabama, where the Alabama Supreme court REVERSED a lower court ruling on the Confederate monument in Linn Park in Birmingham, and UPHELD Alabama's historic monument protection law!

The Alabama Supreme Court ruled that the city of Birmingham violated Alabama's monument protection law when it placed a plywood screen around a Confederate monument in Linn Park in August 2017.

In a 9-0 decision, the justices reversed [a lower court ruling in favor of the city](#). The Supreme Court sent the case back to circuit court with instructions to enter an order that the city broke the law and must pay a \$25,000 fine.

The Legislature passed [the Alabama Memorial Preservation Act in 2017](#) in response to removals and calls for removal of Confederate monuments on public property.

The law prohibits local governments from moving, altering, renaming, or otherwise disturbing monuments that have been in place 40 years or more.

The stone base of the Confederate Soldiers and Sailors Monument has been in Linn Park since 1894. The marble shaft was added in 1905, when the Pelham Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy dedicated the monument.

Former Birmingham Mayor William Bell [ordered the covering of the monument](#). Bell took that step after a city councilman asked that the monument be removed.

Attorney General Steve Marshall [filed a lawsuit](#) asking the court to declare the covering of the monument violated the Memorial Preservation Act.

In January, Jefferson County Circuit Judge Michael Graffeo ruled that the law violated the city's rights to free speech and due process.

"Just as the state could not force any particular citizen to post a pro-Confederacy sign in his or her front lawn, so too can the state not commandeer the city's property for the state's preferred message," Graffeo wrote.

In a 44-page opinion today, Justice Tommy Bryan cited legal precedents and concluded that the circuit court erred in ruling that the city had constitutional rights to free speech and due process.

The ruling also addressed the amount of the fine. The law calls for a \$25,000 for each violation of the act. Bryan concluded that the city was subject to a single \$25,000 fine, rather than a fine for each day the monument was covered.

While we realize the fight is only beginning, let's take a moment to pause and thank God for these victories. Every win helps our momentum, encourages our supporters, and reminds those who would have every trace of our history and heritage removed that there are still plenty of us with PLENTY of fight left.

God bless all those who continue to fight the good fight, and God save the South!

General Gano Comes to Texas from Jack Bowen

What brought General Gano to Texas? This was a question I have asked several folks but never received a good answer. I read one article that indicated it was for health reasons. Well, this is reasonable if you consider that before coming to Texas, he was a physician at the Louisiana State Prison in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Now, before you think I'm against living in Louisiana you should consider that prison conditions at the time were not conducive to good health and well-being.

If you research the Gano family, you will find that Gen. Gano's father, John Allen Gano, besides being a minister was a very successful stockman, raising cattle and horses in Kentucky, so you can probably guess where Richard M. Gano will be going..

I found that General Gano kept written memoirs and I am going to give the reader a brief section from his memoirs regarding his move into Texas and settling in Grapevine Prairie. What I found interesting, and for some unknown reason, General Gano in his memoirs spoke of himself in the third person; therefore "I" becomes "Gano" or "Dr. Gano" or "R.M. Gano" or simply "he".

"Gano had become thoroughly satisfied with his trip over Texas. Texas being a great stock raising country, in which he especially delighted. He thought it was very poor farming country and subject to droughts, and indeed, some man told him that he couldn't raise any crops...nothing but grass...not even a garden. The state has since developed into a very fine farming country, also, good fruits and vegetables, and, as he could purchase good land in Texas from four to ten dollars per acre, and could sell his land in Kentucky at one hundred per acre, and also, having a growing family and needing a warmer climate for his health, he decided to move to Texas, against remonstrances of many friends. He moved by wagon and carriage with his brother-in-law, Dr. Welch, and his brother, Frank Gano, also his servants and some horses to Northern Texas. He stopped at Dallas, Texas, and inspected the country around, and located on the North end of Grapevine Prairie, which he purchases from Judge J.T. Morehead with improvements on the place and 60 acres in cultivation, for \$10.00 per acre. He had left his family in Kentucky to come out with his father-in-law, Dr. Welch.

His family landed about a month after he did, and, as they were driving up to the Grapevine home, and were within a mile and a half of the place, they passed a house and stopped for a drink of water. They told the old lady who they were, and where they were going, when she remarked, "you have got a fine home; there is a dining room in the house," from which one might infer that dining rooms were uncommon in that country.

They all landed in Texas late in the fall, in the year 1856, Dr. Gano having retired from the practice of medicine when he removed to Texas and engaged in stock raising, 23 miles northwest of Dallas. His farm was located in the Northeast corner of Tarrant County. Another son was born to him on March 15, 1858, and they named him Clarence Welch Gano, for his Grandmother."

Steven L. Warren's book, The Second Battle of Cabin Creek gives the reader quotes from General Gano's memoirs, but he points out that for some reason Gano's service with the Trans-Mississippi, Arkansas, Indian Territories, and Texas are missing. I highly recommend that you add this book to your library. Also, the Archives Collection at Abilene Christian University has a collection of archived material from the Gano family.

President Dwight D. Eisenhower In Defense of Robert E. Lee

August 1, 1960

Mr. Dwight D. Eisenhower

White House Washington, D.C.

: Dear Mr. President

At the Republican Convention I heard you mention that you have the pictures of four (4) great Americans in your office, and that included in these is a picture of Robert E. Lee.

I do not understand how any American can include Robert E. Lee as a person to be emulated, and why the President of the United States of America should do so is certainly beyond me.

The most outstanding thing that Robert E. Lee did, was to devote his best efforts to the destruction of the United States Government, and I am sure that you do not say that a person who tries to destroy our Government is worth of being held as one of our heroes.

Will you please tell me just why you hold him in such high esteem?

Dear Dr. Scott:

Respecting your August 1 inquiry calling attention to my often expressed admiration for General Robert E. Lee, I would say first, that we need to understand that at the time of the War Between the States the issue of secession had remained unresolved for more than 70 years. Men of probity, character, public standing and unquestioned loyalty, both North and South, had disagreed over this issue as a matter of principle from the day our Constitution was adopted.

General Robert E. Lee was, in my estimation, one of the supremely gifted men produced by our Nation. He believed unswervingly in the Constitutional validity of his cause which until 1865 was still an arguable question in America; he was a posed and inspiring leader, true to the high trust reposed in him by millions of his fellow citizens; he was thoughtful yet demanding of his officers and men, forbearing with captured enemies but ingenious, unrelenting and personally courageous in battle, and never disheartened by a reverse or obstacle. Through all his many trials, he remained selfless almost to a fault and unfailing in his faith in God. Taken altogether, he was noble as a leader and as a man, and unsullied as I read the pages of our history.

From deep conviction, I simply say this: a nation of men of Lee's caliber would be unconquerable in spirit and soul. Indeed, to the degree that present-day American youth will strive to emulate his rare qualities, including his devotion to this land as revealed in his painstaking efforts to help heal the Nation's wounds once the bitter struggle was over, we, in our own time of danger in a divided world, will be strengthened and our love of freedom sustained. Such are the reasons that I proudly display the picture of this great American on my office wall.

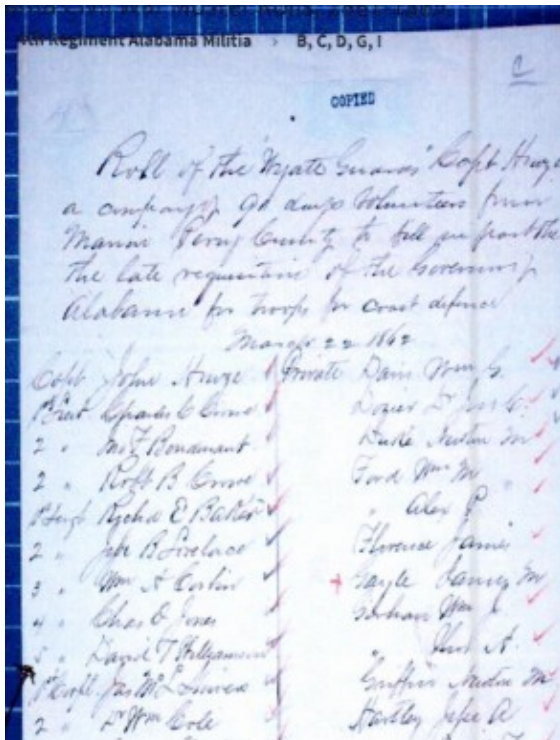
