



Chaplaín's Corner

Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight. Proverbs 3:5-6

I memorized these verses years and years ago, along with John 3:16 and other verses that good little children in Sunday School learn. In my five-year-old mind, I associated the proverb with a mental picture of a road stretching out for miles until it merged with the horizon. That was the "straight road" that I could so easily understand-clearly marked, unswerving, and, most importantly, unchanging. All I had to do was trust God and keep following that path. Little did I know, right?

At times, the journey has felt more like an anecdote that I remembered reading about a man traveling through a thunderstorm. Through the mud and sheets of rain, the poor traveler felt that he would lose his way entirely. The thunderclaps seemed right overhead, jolting his senses every few moments. Only the flashes of lightning helped him keep to the road. Finally, after a particular loud crash, the man fell to his knees and cried, "O, Lord God, if it's all the same to you, I would like a little more light and little less noise!"

The major and minor uncertainties I've encountered-and will encounter in the future-often leave me with that sentiment. I think back to the promise of paths made straight and grumble that the signposts would be a lot easier to follow if they were in neon. We all ask, is this the career path you want me to take, God? Is this the woman you want me to marry? Should I buy this house? Are we supposed to settle at this church? Am I supposed to go here or there? Do this or do that? God, I could easily use a lightning bolt to clarify things!

It's easy to forget that the proverb reserves the promise until the last quarter of the verse, not the first. Review the wording of verse 6 with me. "In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make your paths straight."

I memorized this verse years ago, but I'm still learning it by heart. It's easier to visualize myself making "progress" towards a goal than it is to stop and refocus on inner attitudes. It doesn't occur to me that part of the plan is simply standing still, waiting, and listening. I demand lightning bolts to see God's working rather than taking responsibility for the part assigned to me. My part lies in the trusting, the repudiating of self, and a settled confidence that he will work all things for his purpose. Then...the path is straightened. We may not even realize it this side of heaven, but the promise is that he guides our feet when our eyes are on him.

I fully believe that the Lord guides us in specific ways-through the Word, through the counsel of godly mentors, through nudges of the Holy Spirit- and yet we get caught up in the road metaphor a little too much. We're so distracted looking for the path that we forget a lifestyle of worship. To an extent, it matters less what we're doing than how we're doing it. As Paul wrote, "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God." 1 Corinthians 10:31

The Old Camp in Graham, Texas

Last December, we celebrated our newest SCV Camp in Graham, Texas. However, while browsing through the 1893 Volume of *Confederate Veteran Magazine* I ran across the following letter to the editor from Capt. A. T. Gray of Graham Texas: "Our Camp is not a large one. The county was a wilderness during the war, and has been settled since 1875, and Confederates here hail from every State in the South and represent almost every battlefield fought under the stars and bars; and could you be with us in some of our reunions and listen at the tales of valor told by these boys in gray, it would do you good. Our Camp sent up, through Gen. Cabel something near \$100 more than two years ago to aid in the building the grandest monument to be erected in commemoration of the grandest name on the pages of American history---the leader of a people who has few equals and no superiors in ancient or modern times. Having served in the Thirty-first Tennessee Infantry under Stewart and Strahl, I have a right to speak on behalf of Tennessee soldiers. Send along the **Confederate Veteran**; we like the name."

The 1893 Volume of **Confederate Veteran** is the first Volume printed. If you notice in Capt. Gray's letter, he mentioned that they sent "\$100 more this year than two years ago", so this would indicate that the Camp in Graham, Tx. was in operation during the early 1870s.

VA Flaggers Update

CONFEDERATE AIR FORCE FLIES AGAIN!

This afternoon, a banner plane pulling a massive Confederate Battle flag and the message "GOD BLESS ROBERT E. LEE" flew over Monument Avenue and LEE Circle, where crews, under orders of Virginia Governor Northam, are working to dismantle the massive base to the Robert E. Lee monument, once the crowning glory of what was formerly known as the "Grandest Avenue in the South". It now resembles more of a burned-out war zone, with the remains of the beautiful memorials covered with profanity and cop-hating graffiti, which democrats in the City of Richmond and the Commonwealth of Virginia refuse to remove, lest they upset the hate-fueled rioters who turn to violence when they don't get their way. Reports from the ground included cheers and salutes from citizens, and a few vulgar gestures and shouts of obscenities from haters.

The Virginia Flaggers hired the banner plane, funded by our supporters, to send a strong message. VA Flaggers Update Cont.

The Virginia Flaggers have been very busy and we are thrilled to announce that we have signed leases and building permits IN HAND for TWO new roadside memorial battle flag sites in Virginia!

These are great sites, with excellent locations and historical significance, in a community where a Confederate monument was removed. One will be a major project for us (financially and construction-wise), a mega flag, with an 80' pole that will fly a $20' \times 30'$ battle flag! Construction will commence NEXT WEEK. Pray that everything will go smoothly and we can beat the winter weather and get them both completed quickly.

Like many of you, we are experiencing extreme supply chain issues. Material for pipe is in very short supply. In fact, we have several other projects that are ready to go, but we can't find the pipe we need to build the poles...and all materials and labor costs have nearly doubled. We have no intention of letting it stop us, but it certainly has made things take longer than usual, and cost a lot more. If you have any connections that may have access to used flag poles, or steel or aluminum pipe, please contact us!

In the meantime, we appreciate your continued and generous support as we continue to stretch every penny to fund new construction and maintain and supply flags for our 30+ existing flag sites.



Tommy was older than any of the other privates and had traveled over nearly all the States as a common laborer, mostly with his shovel or hod. Never was Tommy wanting in a reply to any question asked; he needed no time to "frame" his answer. The only besetting sin of this true man and soldier was his love for the jug. No kinder man ever lived. He was liberal to a fault and had impoverished himself that other might not suffer.

When General Lee's army was encamped around Fredericksburg, Va., with the Federal army waiting to attack as soon as they could cross the river, General John Magruder, a splendid officer, and brave commander, issued an order that no intoxicants should be sold within the Confederate line nor sold or given away to any Confederate soldier. General Magruder was himself a hard drinker, and this, and this alone, kept him down to the rank of major general. A few days after this order Tommy was detailed as a guard at General Magruder's headquarters and was on duty near the General's tent when a conversation arose between the officers as to why the pay of the Confederate army was fixed at odd numbers, a private receiving \$11 per month, a sergeant \$17, a lieutenant \$91, a captain \$121, and a general \$301. So, another soldier was sent to take Tommy's place, and Tommy was ordered to headquarters more as a joke than for information. When Tommy came up, it was plainly seen that he had been drinking, and he thought that was why he was ordered to headquarters. General Magruder said: "Sir, I see you have been drinking. Will you tell where you got the whiskey?" "O, Gineral, I'm afraid you will put me in the guardhouse, and I think the damn Yankees are thinking of taking Fredericksburg, and I would hate to tell some of my good friends in town I did not fire a shot in their defense." "No," said the General, "I will not punish you if you will tell where you got your whiskey." "AH, Gineral, that sounds so kind of you to say that that that matters not where I got the whiskey; so, I will tell you the God's truth where I got the liquor." "Yes, if you will tell me truthfully where you go the whiskey, I shall see that no punishment is given you. Now tell me, where did you get the whiskey?" "Well, Gineral, I took a stroll around the hills beyond the clump of bushes, and I saw some horses hitched, with no attendant looking after them. When I was with a racer in Kentucky some years ago, I learned to love horses, and one of these animals was a beautiful bay. Ah! He was of royal blood, I bet. I want up to him and rubbed his head and neck. He seemed to know I was his admiring friend. On going around him I discovered a canteen hung to the saddle, and the divil take my curiosity, I small of the canteen and fond about three drinks of good whiskey. My curiosity to taste was up, and I took a small drink. Ah! Bad luck to whiskey. I made me want more, and I drank the entire contents of that canteen, not more than three fingers, though, you see."

Here the General put in: "Well, you are telling a long-winded story, and the one who owned the whiskey or horse you have not divulged, and you seem to want to hide. Out with the truth. Whose horse was he canteen on!" "Ah! My kind Gineral, I do not know the owner; but I have for the last six month seen you ridin' that noble animal." When this came out the entire office force began to laugh, and one said: "General, Tommy is too much for you." "But" said the General, "he has not only got off for being drunk but has gotten drunk on my whiskey."

As Tommy started to leave, the General (who enjoyed the joke on himself) said: "Tommy, I sent for you not knowing you had been drinking; but some one said you could explain why soldiers' pay was put at such odd numbers. Now, you get \$11 per month, and I get \$301 per month. How do you explain that?" "Ah! Gineral, that is aisy. I get \$10 a month for the work I do as a private and \$1 for the honor of being a soldier, and you get \$300 for the honor of being a gineral and \$1 for the work you do." I now must tell you that General Magruder never passed our company at any time on the march or in camp and saw Tommy that he did not raise his hat a salute the private who explained so fully the odd numbers that Congress fixed as the pay for its officers and soldiers of the line.

Editor's Note: This poem appeared on the over of Confederate Veteran Magazine, the April 1916 Issue. What made this so interesting to me is that I heard my mother mention Aunt Fannie. Aunt Fannie Downing was the youngest of eleven children born to Thomas Downing, Jr. and his wife Elizabeth. Fannie is the sister to my Great Grandfather Ruben. Five of Fannie's brother served in the Confederacy: Edward R. (10th Mississippi), Daniel (1st Mississippi Light Artillery), James (12th Mississippi), Benjamin (21st Mississippi), and William (1st Mississippi Light Artillery).

Aunt Fannie was born 11/29/1855 and passed on 9/23/1955. She is buried at the Reeves Chapel Cemetery in Hinds Co. Mississippi.

I don't know if this is coincidence, but my records would indicate that Aunt Fannie is the author of "Dixie."
