Thur, Sep. 4: Beginner Bird Walk

9:15-10:30 a.m. Meet at Elk Meadow Trailhead

Fri, Sep. 5: Basic Survival for Kids

Fri, Sep. 5: Wildlife Viewing Hike

Sat, Sep. 27: Star Party 8-10 p.m. Meet at the Visitor Center
