
(Lessons learned continued...)

Keep showing up....

One thing I have committed to since my unplanned life-changing events of Parkinson's and Cancer diagnosis is to focus more on encouraging others. In addition to this newsletter, which I pray has encouraged you, I was prompted to use the contacts in my phone (1,700 at last count) and just pray for one of them "randomly" each day, and if led to, send a text just to let them know I was thinking of them and that I prayed for them that day. I send this out as God leads me to, after my devotional each morning, so it is unpredictable to me. Since I believe nothing catches God off guard, then the following story should not have surprised me. As I said, the contacts in my phone are former coworkers, friends, family, and former clients (picture your contact list). Much

of the time I'll receive no reply or a cordial reply, but sometimes, sometimes I'll be blown away by the unmistakable fingerprints of the divine in a situation. Several months ago, I sent a text to a former coworker whom I hadn't seen or spoken to in about twenty-three years. I'm convinced my job is to send the text, God's job is to get it where it needs to go. After sending the text I went about my day which included mowing and trimming the yard.

I wear AirPods as hearing protection while I walk behind the mower and could hear notifications come in, but didn't check them until I finished mowing. Before trimming, I looked at the phone and saw a reply to the text I sent my former coworker. The reply was, "I think you have the wrong number, but god bless". I shot a quick "be blessed" text back then placed the phone back in my pocket and began trimming the lawn. It takes about 15-20 minutes to trim my yard, but for "some" reason I couldn't get the "wrong number" text out of my mind. I typed a reply and while I cannot share everything, here is a screenshot of the ensuing conversation:
