

Facing Parkinson's Disease Diagnosis with Hope

It was the last Friday in July of 2014. I was loading my vehicle to leave Nashville, where I attended an annual work conference, for a trout fishing trip on the Little Red River in Arkansas, "the call" came. It was my neurologist, the one I sought treatment for soreness in my right shoulder and a slight shaking in my right hand. She said, "I have some news. Could you come to my office today?" After explaining my fishing plans for the week, she relented and delivered the news that would begin a great interruption in my life, "Mr. Parker, you have early-onset Parkinson's Disease".

As the other fisherman rendezvoused and we embarked on the six-hour drive to Arkansas, my mind raced with the gravity of the neurologist's diagnosis. I wasn't about to throw a wet blanket on my friends' trips with this news, especially since my wife and daughters did not yet know. After the longest six-hour ride of my life, happily distracted by good friends, Kyle Nolen, John Sims and Josh Webber, we arrived at our cabin on the Little Red River.
