Pragmatism and Social Policy: A Consequentialist Approach to Social Equity – Robert Kraig, Ph.D., Executive Director, Citizen Action of Wisconsin

One of the major barriers to addressing chronic structural inequality is a lack of clarity about how to measure success. As a result, success is often defined as the creation and maintenance of programs and initiatives, rather than tangible impacts on relative and absolute social inequality. Using examples from social and environmental policy such as international climate mitigation goals, a planning method in Western Europe called "backcasting," and child poverty efforts in Great Britain from the late 1990s until 2010, Dr. Kraig will argue that planning backwards from long term outcomes should be at the heart of all social policy planning and public policy discussions.


